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TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

CLEVELAND'S PROCLAMATION.

"While the American people should every day remember with praise and thanksgiving the divine goodness and mercy which have followed them since their beginning as a nation, it is fitting that one day in each year should be especially devoted to a contemplation of the blessings we have received from the hand of God, and to a grateful acknowledgement of his loving kindness; therefore, I Grover Cleveland, president of the United States, do hereby designate and set apart Thursday, the 30th day of the present month of November, as a day of thanksgiving and praise, to be observed by all people in our land. On that day let us forego our ordinary work and employments and assemble in our usual places of worship, where we may recall all that God has done for us, and where, from grateful hearts, our united tribute of praise and song may reach the throne of grace. Let the union of kindred and the social meeting of friends lend cheer and enjoyment to duty, and let generous gifts of charity for the relief of the poor and needy prove the sincerity of our thanksgiving."

PENNOYER'S PROCLAMATION.

"I do hereby appoint the fourth Thursday of the present month as a day of thanksgiving to Almighty God for the blessings he has bestowed upon this commonwealth during the present year. God has indeed been most beneficent to our state and nation, and yet unjust and ill advised congressional legislation having made gold alone full legal tender money,

has so dwarfed and paralyzed business that the bounties of providence are now denied to hundreds of thousands of people within the national domain who are not only without employment, but also without the means of procuring food, raiment, or shelter. While therefore, the people of Oregon return thanks to God for his goodness, I do most earnestly recommend that they will devoutly implore Him to dispose the president and congress of the United States to secure the restoration of silver as full legal tender money in accordance with the policy of the fathers of the republic, whereby our industries may be revived and the honest toilers of the land may procure their daily bread, not as alms, but as a reward for their labor." SENATOR SHERMAN made a very interesting speech on the financial condition of the government in which he stated that he concluded to introduce later on as a separate measure his proposition authorizing the issuing of \$200,000,000 in five years three per cent bonds in denominations of \$50 and multiples thereof instead of offering it as an amendment to the Voorhees bill, as he had at first intended. He sharply criticised the democrats for not having provided for an issue of bonds in the pending bill and said that the gold reserve fund was not being illegally encroached upon by the administration to pay the current expenses of the government. He also positively stated that the secretary of the treasury had no authority under the act of 1875 to issue bonds for any other purpose than to maintain the parity of United States notes with gold. He said in conclusion: "If you leave the secretary in the present condition of affairs unarmed with the authority to borrow money on the credit of the United States, you neglect your perfect duty when it is plainly called to your attention. Under existing law there is no power to sell any of those bonds except for the purpose of having gold enough to redeem U. S. notes. And no secretary of the treasury will dare issue either of these species of bonds (4, 4 1/2 and 5 per cent) even if the law permitted him to do so." A sensation followed Senator Butler's asking Senator Sherman if the secretary of the treasury had asked for bonds and the latter's intimation that he believed he had. It staggered the democratic senators who are kept in the dark as to the intentions of the administration.

SPEAKING of the debt we owe the Grand Army veterans the Chicago Journal aptly says: They saved the union. Let that be the people's answer to the confederate politicians who are now in control of affairs. Who shall compute the value of their services in dollars and cents? Who shall dare deny that in their declining years every one of them is entitled to such as he may seek from the nation that owes it all to him? The people will not be deceived by the hypocritical cry of fraud. They know that the men who have raised the cry would like to see the whole pension list abolished. There is no sincerity in them."

The threatened attitude of the democratic party toward the protective tariff now in existence in this country, brings out the following statement of the disastrous effect upon the condition of the laboring men in Ohio, furnished from authentic sources:

Decrease in labor employed since November 5, 1892, is 4 per cent.
Decrease in weekly wages since November, 1892, is 7 1/2 per cent.
Decrease in business since November 5, 1892, is 58 per cent.
Number of hands out of work is 21,392 in 95 factories.
The loss in total weekly wages is \$224,377.62 in 95 factories.

THE British income tax system, which it seems will shortly be in vogue in this country, now amounts to fourteen cents on every five dollars of income. It has just been raised two cents so as to provide that free-trade country with \$750,000 more of annual revenue, and it is found to be the easiest method of "raising the wind" among poverty stricken administrations. In these free trade times of little work and small pay such a direct tax on wages of \$750 per annum and over would come hard upon the people.

The populists in Kansas have so injured the credit in that state that eastern capitalists are withdrawing their bonds as fast as they fall due. The populist legislation has been so bitter and vicious to all capital that they cannot afford to take the hazard of losing more money.

THE OTHER SIDE.

"To err is human," and whether through inadvertency, ignorance, or bias of mind, the said human product ever with us, work evil, in matters where truth only should have recognition, frequently seeking and obtaining a hearing through some local publication for the sole purpose of moulding public sentiment in its favor. Misrepresentation and untruthful statements are thus often printed over an assumed or anonymous signature like "A Laboring Man" under a communication of such purport, in your paper of Nov. 3rd on first page. Said production is a very feeble effort at apology for the assignment, an unwarranted and cowardly thrust at imaginary enemies, a spontaneous outburst of the diseased imagination of a servant, who seeks to shield his identity under the signature "A Laboring Man," an apology due to the reading public for infringement on their time to read matters that can only be of interest to the creditors, but I most gratefully ask your kind indulgence while I briefly refer to the article mentioned.

Referring to first sentence of the article by "A Laboring Man" I will say that the mill is not "closed," but on the contrary the assignee will saw, plane and sell lumber just as before the assignment, and a debtor being required to pay claims that are over due, does not "add dark gray to history."

Sentence No. 2: The yards were not destroyed by fire, nor was the lumber on the yard destroyed. On the contrary, the lumber on the west yard was all saved, and some of it used in the construction of the new mill, while another lot of the same shed lumber was sold to Mr. Stone and other parties. The loss by fire was not so great as generally supposed, for the mill was very old and badly decayed and the saving of the lumber, the boilers and other machinery, together with the insurance money, made a great help in offsetting the supposed loss.

Replying to sentence No. 3, we would add to "pluck and energy," (the ingredients said to have been used in the construction of the new mill), one other important factor, namely, what money certain individuals were foolish enough to loan without security. Sentence No. 4, not correct, for there are several mills in the state far better than "Corvallis can boast."

Sentences 5, 6 and 7, no comment necessary at this time. Replying to sentence No. 8, which refers to "fast recovering," etc., it is only necessary to say that the contrary to that statement was the true condition, as any person familiar with the management for the last fifteen months must know, and as the statement of liabilities now show about \$10,000 more than statement from same source showed, four months ago, with accounts nearly all collected up to date, and no money on hand nor no bills paid, must show that the claim of "fast recovering" is not true.

The next sentence, "N. 9," is absolutely silly for comment, for "he succeeded in making the advancement" in nothing to help his business, or anything else, except to increase liabilities. In sentence No. 10, "A Laboring Man" suddenly leaves his subject and starts out on another question, which may lead the reader to believe that "A Laboring Man" belongs to the detective service and had just made the discovery that we have in our city persons that rot and destroy." Now if this is true and known to "A Laboring Man" to be a fact as he has stated, it is his duty to report those destroying characters to the police authorities, and file his complaint in the office of the honorable police judge. Should he neglect such important duty, he is equally guilty with the "destroying angels."

The remainder of "A Laboring Man's" article is a peculiar conglomeration of "literary vomit," which conclusively demonstrates the practical exhibition of his consummate ignorance, stupidity and servitude. After making a distempered rehearsal of friends and enemies and enemies and friends, he boldly makes a threatening declaration for another party, how he "would have dealt with them according to their true character, namely his enemies." It is remarkable that "A Laboring Man" should make such an unnecessary exhibition of his unpardonable mendacity and exaggeration. He says in sentence No. 14, "there was no cause why," etc. Now if there was any cause in law, equity or rules of business, it was a just cause and no other. The fact of "A Laboring Man's" ignorance of that cause, together with the biased condition of mind and personal solicitude for the debtor and imaginary "injury that would be done this city," does not justify him in writing opinions without knowledge of facts. He did know, however, that his distempered literary vomit was full of his own original mendacity and very cunningly hid his identity by signing it "A Laboring Man." The assignment was the voluntary act of the assignor. It was not "forced upon him by parties that sought to injure him, thinking they would be benefited thereby." There are no "endeavors" nor "assertions of enemies" in the case, nor do we think it reasonable to suppose that the assignor's enemies would loan to him money without security. He has no such obliging enemies, and the position taken by "A Laboring Man," is unreasonable, impossible and ridiculously false. After nearly two years of delay on over-due obligations, and in the forenoon of the day proceeding the attachment, the assignor received by the hand of private conveyance a written ultimatum, which contained three propositions, either and all of which were easy, simple, just and fair. He was politely invited to report in person on the same day his acceptance or otherwise, as he should decide. Although perfectly friendly relations prevailed, he knew and had been so informed, that this matter must have his personal attention at the date named. For some reason, presumed to be satisfactory at least to himself, he failed to report, ignored the ultimatum and accepted the consequences promised him.

In his notice of the assignor's property "A Laboring Man" makes a very unwarranted declaration when he wrote "his property will show his ability to pay two dollars to the one he owes. Now, the sentence is very bad etymology, and grammatically conveys only the idea that "he owes" some "one," and that "this property shows his ability to pay two dollars" on the account. He certainly did not intend to convey the idea that his property was worth double the amount of his liabilities, and that creditors would receive double the amount of their respective claims, for that would be too friendly. From my long and friendly relations and personal acquaintance with most of his cred-

itors I incline to the opinion that they will ask nothing more than did the Egyptians who had loaned to parties bound for the promised land. They had been on Friendly terms long enough to learn that the early modification would ease their anxiety, and possibly save them a journey into the Red Sea. I have no knowledge of the identity of "A Laboring Man," but think it safe to presume that he is not of the rank nor life in the flight from Egypt.

Mr. Editor, while hoping to possess an acute sense of gratitude and humane spirit of forbearance, still I am not entirely wanting in the vindictive courage necessary to resent an insult, correct an error and expose a bundle of lies. In your valued paper of the 27th ult was an article without signature, in which my name was used in connection with the assignment, and but for this fact alone I should not have troubled you with this communication. I desire to say that what I have written as touching the affairs of the assignment is substantially correct, and only wanting in amplification, which will be willingly and voluminously supplied by the writer, if wanted or found necessary. It may not be long before friendly communications of this nature will become popular in this locality, but I will only add that in this brief article I have written only what can be sustained by evidence from best sources.
