A SHOOTING MATCH.

Fifteen Shots Fired and No One Injured.

If Corvallis were to enter the present police force, Ed Scott, "Doc" Allen, "Cupid" Warren, "Pasco" Williamson and Joe Ripley in an international pistol shooting contest there is no doubt she would take the booty prize.

A shooting affray, just to make things interesting, took place here Monday evening last, for number of shots exchanged and poor marksmanship, stands as a record-breaker. Ed Scott, a local desperado, was being taken to the office of the police judge to answer to a charge of disorderly conduct, for which he had been arrested by Officer McLagan. When near the residence of B. R. Job, Scott jumped away from the officer and began firing at him with a pistol from behind an electric light pole. McLagan was in the middle of the street and returned the fire. The fusillade attracted considerable attention and Chief Taylor arrived on the scene and took a few shots at the prisoner. Frank Williamson and Deputy Sheriff Ripley also came to the rescue and blazed away at Scott with their revolvers, but strange to say, no one hit him. "Doc" Allen also got in some fire work with a pistol. He shot up Third street and hit the city hall, two blocks out of range. By this time it was getting altogether too tropical for Scott to tarry longer, so he took up Third street to the Congregational church. Here Taylor took another shot at the fugitive. "Cupid" Warren, who was in hot pursuit, let a bullet fly at Scott and soon after captured him in the alley back of Mrs. J. B. Lee's residence. When overtaken Scott showed a determination not to be taken and vigorously resisted all attempts to arrest him. After receiving a severe beating over the head he was taken to the jail, where an examination was made by a physician, who found that Scott was bleeding profusely from numerous scalp wounds received in the melee at the time of his capture, but was not seriously hurt. Wednesday morning Scott was taken before Justice Wilson, when he was bound over in the sum of \$2000 to await the action of the grand jury. Scott is a tough character and is continually getting into some scrape in which he usually figures with a knife or pistol. It is to be hoped that he will be unable to secure bonds and that when his trial comes on next November he will be promptly convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for ten years. Every day he is allowed his liberty the lives of residents of this county are in danger and if he is ever released from jail the chances are he will have no hesitancy in killing all who have assisted in his arrest.
