

THE state board of equalization costs the state but little. It is in session only a few days each year. Its members are elected by the people. They are chosen from various portions of the state. As a rule, they are men of experience and acquainted with values in their respective localities. Their duties are to so adjust and equalize assessments that val uations will be uniform throughout the state. Experience of the past emphasizes more and more each year the necessity for their work. During the past few years the board has rendered services which have proven of incalculable benefit to the state as a whole. It is a noticeable fact that the only wail of any consequence against the board comes from Multuomah county. There, such flagrat abuses of the assessment law are practiced that it has been found necessary to make large increases in her valuations each year in order to make the assessment equitable and uniform throughout the state. Portland's influence will be exerted to the utmost to secure the board's abolishment. Their success will be a disaster to the remainder of the state. 


