

FUTURE OF OREGON REPUBLICANISM.

The Oregonian is attempting to pave the way for a populist victory a year from next June. It says the republican party cannot face the people with the smell of the last legislature clinging to its garments. It quotes freely articles from democratic and populist papers, concerning the extravagance of the recent legislature, and in turn its editorials are copied by every populist paper in the state. It has almost wholly ignored the comments of state republican papers on the doings of the legislators, and in fact there seems to be a common understanding between the populists and Mr. Scott's paper. The Oregonian is busily engaged in loading the populist guns for the next campaign. Perhaps they expect to hoist Mr. Scott as their senatorial candidate to defeat Mr. Mitchell two years hence.

Whether the republican party will be in shape to ask for the support of the people at the next election will depend upon the class of men who will have control of its affairs. If that faction of the party, that was responsible for the extravagance of commission and omission of the legislature, controls the nominations and policy of the republican party it will surely meet with decisive defeat. That faction was the ring that had control of the upper house, whose head was Joseph Simon, whose organ was the Oregonian, and whose candidate was J. N. Dolph. Many meritorious bills were introduced in and passed by the house, fulfilling the pledges of the republican party and its candidates, only to be smothered in the committee rooms of the senate, where Simon's power was supreme. The principal bill, looking towards economy, that was defeated by the house, was the one relating to the salary of the district attorney of Multnomah county, and the campaign waged in its behalf was so bitter and disgraceful that most of the respectable members of the house felt constrained to vote against it. The majority of the republican members of the house were in favor of economy and of pledged reforms, and their legislation was along this line. If this element is in the ascendancy during the next campaign, the republican party of clear conscience and conscientiousness of power to fulfill its campaign pledges, can ask the support of the people in expectation of receiving it. But if Joe Simon and the class of men under his control, and with whom the Oregonian is identified, make the nominations of the party and dictate its policy, the republicans of Oregon will enter the campaign handicapped beyond all possibility of victory.

The Simon machine will make a desperate effort to regain its hold upon the politics of the state. Should it fail to receive recognition from the republican ranks, it may, by treachery, seek the defeat of the republican ticket by an alliance with some other party. This has always been the tactics of the Simon machine as shown in the defeat of Waldo, Cornelius, Thompson and others. It is this treachery, this rule or ruin policy, that has so disgusted the republican citizens of Oregon with the Simon combination. It is firmly believed that the influence of the machine has been so lessened by recent events that it will have power neither to control the nominations nor defeat the candidates. There are many bright, active and intelligent members of the party throughout the state, who are strongly opposed to the machine element, and who will be on guard to checkmate any move that the machine may make to regain its wonted power.

It looks now as if Simon's influence had been annihilated. If this be true, the republican party has thrown off its shackles and can go into the next campaign as the party of the people, certain to do their will and sure of their hearty support.

From Sundry statements from Dolph papers and politicians it seems there will be a strong effort made to give the next republican nomination for representative of this district to some man other than Hermann. These people will not succeed. With them it is simply a matter of revenge, because Hermann did not fly to Dolph's rescue during his late dilemma. The state never had a better representative, or a more popular one than Hermann. He has always been elected by large majorities over strong opponents. A fight against him, from the source indicated and for the reason mentioned, will bring to his support a strong element which might otherwise not be unfavorable to some other candidate. People of Benton and Lincoln counties are more interested in the prosecution of Yaquina bay improvements than in that of any other work before congress. Mr. Hermann has proved himself an active and efficient friend of Yaquina, as is particularly evinced by his recent bill providing for a re-survey of the bar by U. S. engineers, called forth by the adverse report of Capt. Symonds on the utility of Yaquina bay.

The New York World figures out that the bond syndicate has made \$8,418,757 out of its job, which sum in a savings bank would grow to \$27,538,676 in 30 years, the lifetime of the bonds.

BLAME RIGHTFULLY PLACED.

Among the leading republican papers of the state which, like the GAZETTE, are industriously working to place the blame for the extravagance of the recent legislature where it rightfully belongs, is the Hillsboro Independent. The following editorial comment from the last issue of that paper contains many irrefutable statements and should be perused with care:

"It seems to the Independent that the Oregonian ought not to be too previous in lashing the late legislature. Now, it would come with good grace from this paper because it is inclined to stand in with the 'faction,' but for the Oregonian to denounce the members of the late session is too much like walloping one's friends. One act severely criticised is the appropriation bill. Without saying it is extravagant or economical let attention be called to the personnel of the ways and means committee. That committee was a joint body composed of ten members, five from each house. As is well known, the senate was dominated and organized by that portion of the party for which the Oregonian was spokesman. Simon was president of the senate and appointed the standing committees. Wright, a member of the 'faction,' was defeated for speaker of the house, but the house part of the committee was more identified with economy than the other. On the committee from senate were Bancroft, Patterson, Galbreath, Dawson, all supporters of Mr. Dolph, and Raley, democrat. From the house were Paxton and Smith of Polk-Dolph men, with Wright, Gates and Hoffer of the 'faction'—six against three, with Raley to hear from. Now, what the Oregonian 'reformers' chose to put in the appropriation bill went there and there it stayed. It is much easier to control appropriation to an economical point with the items off the bill, than when they are on it. If there have been extravagant appropriations then Mr. Simon in the appointment of the committee is responsible for them. The Independent is not the only one that thinks thus. The Corvallis GAZETTE last week had a well written and timely article on this same topic, which appears in another column. There are some other papers in the state that might do well to think before they join in what now seems to be a clamor that is popular.

A LITTLE enterprise on the part of people of Yaquina would result in the establishment of a important industry and add materially to the resources of the county. From the Sound is shipped weekly to the Portland market five tons of fish and the supply for the valley towns comes from that market. There is no reason why Yaquina should not enter in competition with the Sound fish industry. They can secure as favorable express rates to Portland as the Sound people, and of course the Yaquina fish are preferable as they arrive in better condition. A steamship should be provided for the business, which will enable those engaged in the enterprise to be independent of either wind or tide. It is estimated that by careful management the fish will net two cents per pound. If the business is properly attended to and the supply can be depended upon Yaquina could soon control at least three-fifths of the trade, or six thousand pounds per week. The industry would require the employment of several men throughout the year and would net the promoters of the enterprise \$500 per month, or \$6,000 annually. A shrewd manager would soon develop a direct trade with several valley towns, and in other ways enhance the importance of the industry. Probably when the new organizers of the Oregon Pacific are assured of the confirmation of their purchase, they will take the matter in hand and aid any enterprising company in establishing the business. Nature has liberally endowed Yaquina with resources; what she needs is push and enterprise on the part of her citizens to enable her to make the best of her opportunities.

An editorial in the Pendleton Tribune of February 28th contains more brazen, false, outrageous statements concerning the wrongdoings of the legislature, and the responsibility thereof, than its foster mother, the Oregonian, dares to express. It did not attempt to follow up its statements by proof, contenting itself with lying generalities. It endeavors to fix blame for all harmful legislation and failure to pass good bills upon what it terms the 'bolters.' One expression in particular, shows the effrontery of this petty organ of the Simon machine: 'For the non-fulfillment of every promise concerning the smashing of unnecessary commissions,' it says, 'the bolters are to blame.' That paper knows that statement to be absolutely false. The house contained twenty-seven of the thirty bolters. In fact the bolters controlled pretty much all legislation of the house. The senate was controlled by the Dolph men, only three members of that body being identified with the anti-Dolph movement. There was a general demand all over the state for a repeal of the act creating the railroad commission. A bill for this purpose passed the house and received the unanimous support of the bolters. In the senate, however, it was given a dose of Simon's sleep dope, and thereafter knew no awakening. This little cuckoo paper says the bolters are responsible. Since the legislature adjourned, the Oregonian has been wiser and does not directly charge the so-called crimes of the legislature upon the bolters, but its little slop carrier, ignorant of facts and devoid of honor, is attempting to help the real obstructors of honest legislation, in their cry of 'stop thief.'

FOOL legislation is not peculiar to any one state. A Connecticut legislator has introduced a bill requiring a child to be named within three days of its birth.

STATE REPUBLICAN LEAGUE.

Convention to be Held in May to Send Delegates to National Convention.

The executive committee of the state republican clubs met in Portland Saturday and after due deliberation decided to call a state convention to elect delegates to the national league convention at Cleveland, June 19th. In accordance therewith the following call was prepared and will be forwarded to the several clubs throughout the state by Secretary Wells:

To the Republican Clubs of the State of Oregon:

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Young Men's State Republican Club, called by the president and held at Portland March 9, 1895, it was decided to call a special meeting of the club, to be held at Portland, Wednesday, May 22, 1895, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The state club is composed of local clubs represented in proportion to their actual membership. Every republican club being permanently organized with a constitution and bylaws, is entitled to representation in the state club, whether on the club's present official list or not. Clubs are entitled to one representative at large and one for each 25 members or fraction thereof greater than fifteen. Secretaries of clubs are requested to fill out the enclosed certificate of membership and list of delegates chosen to represent the club and return it to the secretary of the state club as early as possible. By doing so the work of organizing the convention will be greatly facilitated and delegates will not be subjected to inconvenience or possible loss of their certainty as to the number of delegates to which their clubs are entitled. All credentials must be signed by the president or vice-president and secretary and all proxies must be in writing. Clubs organized between now and the convention will be entitled to representation the same as the old clubs.

The object of the meeting is to elect delegates to the eighth annual convention of the Republican League of the United States, to be held at Cleveland, Ohio, June 19, 1895; to consider the advisability of changing the name of the state organization to 'The Republican League of Oregon,' in order to conform to the title generally used by the state clubs belonging to the national league; to devise a means of revenue for maintaining and extending the state organization and to further in any other way the interests of the republican party in the state of Oregon.

Oregon has never been adequately represented at the national league conventions, and should this year be present with the entire eighteen delegates to which she is entitled. This will be the most important meeting of the league since its organization, and will be the first great gathering of republicans preparatory to the presidential campaign of 1896. The leading republicans of the United States to the number of 5,000 to 10,000 will be assembled at that convention, and Oregon should be fully represented. The state is entitled to six delegates at large and four from each congressional district, making fourteen to be elected. The president and secretary of the state club, the national vice president for Oregon and the national executive committee for Oregon are delegates ex officio, making a total of eighteen. Clubs are urged to request to elect a full set of delegates to the state club, and those delegates are urged to attend in person, so that the meeting shall be fully representative of the republican sentiment of the state.

Special rates on the railroads will be secured for delegates.

THE Oregonian will probably not be found in the republican ranks next spring. It will take the 'gold cure' and lead the hosts of populism. It will then be in its natural element. As a calamity howler it has no equal. The nearest approach to Scott in this respect is Madam Lease, of Kansas. It is understood the Madam will stump the state for the populists next spring, and will leave her babies in the care of Prophet Scott of the tall tower, who will instill into their youthful minds his direful tales of the present times.

WHEN Harrison was inaugurated in 1889, the interest-bearing public debt was \$89,853,990, and when he retired in 1893 it was only \$58,029,100. On February 1, 1895, it had increased to \$684,323,710, and when the next bonds are sold it will amount to \$746,723,710. Figures speak louder than words.

THE people of the state of Oregon are to be congratulated upon the fact that a senator has finally been elected. The newly elected senator may not have the experience nor the conceit of Dolph, but he will doubtless have more regard for the wishes and desires of his constituents.—Post-Intelligencer.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

County court met last Wednesday at which time the following proceedings were had:

In the matter of road supervisors for the year 1895 it was ordered that the following appointments be made to fill vacancies caused by the resignation of certain persons heretofore selected: Geo. H. Waggoner, dist. No. 31, instead of Ed Williams, declined; Wm. McGee, No. 49, instead of Horace Lilly, resigned; John Harris, No. 4, instead of T. C. Baker, declined; Geo. Harris, supervisor dist. No. 11, instead of James Robinson, declined; Eugene Palmer, supervisor of road dist. No. 3, instead of George Beamis, declined. The petition of M. T. Starr and others asking that certain changes be made in the boundaries of road district No. 29 came on for hearing, and it appearing that the prayer of the petition should be granted it was ordered that said boundaries be changed so as to read as follows: Commencing at n. e. cor. sec. 21, thence west to main channel of Muddy stream, thence up said stream in a southeasterly direction until it intersects the west line of sec. 29, thence south to south line of Benton county, thence east ten miles, thence north to place of beginning.

The application of W. J. Hopper to place his mother as a county charge was taken under advisement until next regular term.

A petition from Mrs. E. Emrick praying that the court make and execute to her a quit claim deed quit claiming all the interest of Benton county in and to lots 1, 2 and 3, block 22 in county addition to Corvallis was granted. Years ago a tract of land was deeded to Benton county, the funds arising from the sale of which were to be expended in the erection of a court house. Subsequently the land was platted as the 'county addition to Corvallis.' Owing to a defect in some of the descriptions made by the county board, a cloud has since rested on numerous titles. Wherein these descriptions were faulty was in deeding, for instance, block 22, 'in Corvallis,' instead of block 22, 'in county addition to Corvallis.' To cure this defect the prayer of Mrs. Emrick's petition was granted.

Bills of L. M. Hunter for \$84 for extra clerical aid and bills of A. Kyle and C. M. Parker were all rejected.

Pursuant to an advertisement, the bids for furnishing wood for the courthouse were opened and Ellsworth Irwin was awarded the contract for thirty cords of fir wood at \$2.20 per cord, and J. C. Murray, 30 cords of gray oak at \$2.20 per cord. The other bids were as follows:
