COLLEGE FOOTBALL.

Acting-President Berchtold, of the Oregon Agricultural College, in his remarks at the concert Friday evening, strongly favored college athletics. He showed that even football, the roughest and most criticised of all college games, is highly beneficial in various respects.

The professor is certainly right. Football is rough, perhaps rougher than necessary, but we can not expect young men to content themselves with tiddledewins and croquet. Football is not a sissy game; but we don't want sissies in our colleges. The roughness of football does not tend to make the players coarse or brutal any more than the killing of men in war imparts murderous instincts to the soldier. Cowards can not play football, and brave men are not bullies. The game develops the manly spirit; it trains a man physically and quickens his mental faculties. Wellington once said the battle of Waterloo was won on the Eton football grounds.

Football has this advantage over other athletic sports that finds favor among college men: The players contend against personal opponents; they strive man with man. Racing comes nearest to football in this respect, but the former sport is far behind in point of interest and in the general development of the performer. Football is purely an amateur sport. Efforts to popularize football as a professional game have signally failed. While not exclusively a college game, it is more so than any other, and matches between teams of athletic associations are never so interesting nor so popular as those between eleven of rival colleges.

Football develops the college spirit, and this college spirit is a form of patriotism. It develops the student's pride in the institution with which he is connected, and the young man who has a jealous pride in his college will make a safe citizen.

FACTS AND CONDITIONS.

The free trade press and its allies, says the American Economist, the mugwump independent organs, tell us that good times are upon us and denounce any further discussion of the tariff question. The following facts are apparent in relation to our industrial, financial, and commercial situation:

The receipts of the treasury have fallen behind the expenditures at the rate of about \$50,000,000 per annum. We have increased the national debt by \$162,000,000 thus far under this administration. The treasury is not paying the appropriations made by congress, and has adopted all sorts of subterfuges to prevent such payments, such as the establishment of a supreme court in a bureau of the government at Washington. Our exports have fallen off more than \$120,000,000 per annum, as compared with the last two years of the McKinley law. Our imports are increasing. We are importing the common articles of agricultural and of mechanical and industrial production, the things which can be produced by American

labor, and we are sending abroad our money to pay, in this indirect way, the labor of Europe, Asia, and Africa.

While this condition exists, labor in this country is yet largely unemployed and, outside of a few branches, is being remunerated at a figure far below the McKinley times of 1892. If this be prosperity we have it.

REPUBLICANS WIN.

The result of Tuesday's elections shows plainly the popular distrust in which the democratic party is held. The tidal wave of two years ago was continued, which augurs well for the success of the republican national ticket a year hence. States that have heretofore been regarded as doubtful are now surely republican, while the present doubtful states have heretofore been safely democratic. Even Maryland rolled up a republican majority that is astonishing. Tammany carried New York city as was anticipated, but the state is surely republican by a large majority. New Jersey is also republican. Kentucky is still in doubt, with chances in favor of the democrats. In this state the republicans only expected to elect their candidate for governor. Both parties are claiming Utah. Virginia and Mississippi are safely democratic, but everywhere the republicans are successful. By the result republicans will gain two United States senators as successors to Gibson, of Maryland, and Brice, of Ohio.

The majorities as given by yesterday's Oregonian are as follows: Massachusetts..... 63,000 New York..... 70,000 New Jersey..... 20,000 Pennsylvania..... 150,000 Maryland..... 10,000 Kentucky..... 1,700 Mississippi..... 50,000 Illinois..... 30,000 Ohio..... 111,000 Iowa..... 60,000

The figures for Kentucky and Mississippi are democratic and the others republican.

DURING the past month sixty-eight soldiers were cared for at the soldiers' home in Roseburg, and at a cost of twenty-two cents per day. This largest number of men ever having been in the home at one time, were maintained for a less aggregate sum of money than for any previous month since the home was opened. It can be said that one state institution is conducted on business principles, and it will be commended by many journals in this state, excepting of course, the Roseburg papers, which are a common enemy of this present band of trustees.—Florence West.

State Board of Horticulture Rules.

RULE 14. This rule is hereby changed and made to read as follows:

The fee for the inspection of apple, pear, plum, peach, nectarine, cherry, apricot, nut-bearing trees, and all other trees, shrubs or plants, shall be as follows:

Thirty cents per hour, including the time from leaving home, inspection and return home of the inspector, and actual traveling and other expenses.

When nursery stock, trees or plants are found infested with insect pests or diseases, a charge of 40 per cent. will be added to the foregoing rates to pay expenses of the quarantine officer for supervising disinfection and subsequent inspection.

On all fruits, the fee for inspection shall be \$1 on any sum up to thirty-five dollars, and two dollars on any sum over that amount, and five dollars for car-load lots.

Inspection fee must be paid in full before certificate is granted.

RULE 15. All persons growing nursery stock, trees and plants for sale or to be offered for sale, are hereby required to report to the commissioner of the district in which said nursery stock, trees or plants are grown, for inspection, during the months of September, October or November of each and every year, and the commissioner of such district, or his duly appointed deputy, shall inspect such nursery stock, trees or plants, prior to shipment and delivery.

When said nursery stock, trees or plants are found by said inspecting officer to be worthy of a certificate setting forth the freedom of such nursery stock, trees or plants from live injurious insect pests, their eggs, larvae, pupae or fungus diseases, the said inspecting officer shall then issue to the owner or owners of said nursery stock, trees or plants, a certificate of inspection.

The condition under which this certificate is granted is, that the party or parties receiving such certificate shall be compelled to disinfect by fumigation with hydrocyanic acid gas, as described in rule 9, all apple trees or other stock grown on apple roots after lifting the same and before delivery to purchaser or carriers; and in case said fumigation is neglected, said certificate of inspection shall be void and of no effect.

The fees for inspection of nursery stock, trees or plants, and issuing a certificate therefor, shall be three dollars and actual expenses per day, and must be paid by the party or parties before said certificate is granted.

All fees so collected shall be reported at the regular meeting of this board; and no member of the board, while engaged in inspection for which fees may be collected, shall charge the per diem allowed by law.

Observe the Contrast.

EDITOR GAZETTE: As individuals and collectively as a people, a community or a nation, we are subject to and bound by the acts and doings of our legislatures and representatives. They are simply our agents, and under present existing rules and conditions, can bind us forever. We may say our representatives are responsible to us for their acts. If some one asks wherein they are responsible we can only say if they do not vote or work for the interests of the people we will not re-elect them. How consoling this must be after the most valuable franchises, rights and privileges have been voted and conveyed from the hands of the people into the clutches of a few avaricious and greedy corporations for all time to come.

The nation, state or city is our farm. At present we give our representatives, legislators and aldermen absolute unlimited control or power over it. Power to mar it. Power to mortgage it and fasten upon posterity a ruinous debt, reserving to ourselves only the privilege to not elect them again and perhaps with we never had.

The constitution is our pasture fence. Our nation and state is our carriage; our representatives and legislators are our horses. With the present arrangements we harness our horses, hitch them (often wild colts) to our carriage, climb in for a ride without lines or whip, and trust ourselves to the tender mercies of a kind Providence which is supposed to always have special care over half-witted people. Our horses may balk or lie down and flop over and get tangled in the harness as did our friend Tom or may wildly tear over the pasture, down steep gulches, over rocky hills, and finally bring our empty skulls, (we have no brains to spill) cripple and disfigure us, for life. Why shudder at this, have we not the comforting assurance that our bones or mislead remains may be found somewhere within the confines of the ten rail and 10 cent fence in constitution. With the initiative and referendum we could avoid such dastardly and cowardly results and beat all times masters of the situation, and, keeping the reins of government in our own hands, we might then say our representatives are our tailors and shoemakers. We will still have to pay them as now, but should they make a mistake we will not then as now have to wear the unsightly garment or the corn-pinching shoe. We might, too, call them our cooks and provide them with a bill of fare through the initiative that we may not be compelled to eat and swallow every unwholesome and dirty mess they may set before us. With the referendum we could say "no thank you," and by the initiative compel them to prepare our meals to order. The people are fast finding out that making laws by proxy is even more unsatisfactory than making laws by proxy, and are now proceeding to make laws as they make love, in person, which is simply the initiative and referendum.
