If possible the Dr. will secure a supply for his pulpit here, if not, the Sunday school will meet at 10 a. m., and the Balaavor society at the parsonage at 6:30 p. m., and the preaching service be omitted.

The program for the musical feast of next Tuesday is of a high order and yet suited to gratify the popular ear. Mr. Parsons realizes that the chief duty of entertainers is to entertain, and the concert can be enjoyed by the educated musician and those that can't tell a musical note from a punctuation mark. The hope that is to succeed the concert is looked forward to by those who are not keeping Lent with pleasant anticipations and Mr. Parsons' music is proving a strong temptation to those who are observing the religious and fashionable season of abstinence.

A. Hodes is in receipt of a curious looking letter from Joe Dutton, who left here last fall for British Columbia. The letter is written upon a strip of birch bark and seems to answer the purpose quite as well as the best linen paper. Mr. Dutton states as his reason for using it, that he is forty miles distant from supplies and on account of the birch bark costing nothing, he prefers using it, as he is now practicing the strictest economy. Times there, he says, are extremely dull and prospects for an improvement are by no means flattering. Mr. Dutton's present address is Logan, Alberta, Canada.

While operating a buzz saw at the planing mill last Saturday, P. F. Sheagreen met with an accident from which he thinks he was fortunate in escaping alive. In working the machine his left thumb became fastened in the powerful feed rolls and came near drawing Mr. Sheagreen after it. Fortunately his presence of mind did not desert him, and by almost superhuman efforts he succeeded in extricating the member from its perilous position, but not, however, until the flesh had been so lacerated that amputation of the thumb at the first joint, was found necessary. Under the care of Dr. Pernot the patient is doing well, and will likely be able to resume work within a week or ten days.

W. S. Parsons, who was indicted by the last grand jury for larceny by baillee and who was subsequently discharged has begun a suit for damages against John Stewart, who figured in the criminal proceeding as prosecuting witness. In his complaint, Parsons alleges that he was detained in jail 57 days, and as a result of the prosecution his good name has been damaged \$1,500 worth. By reason of losing his situation and being for considerable time out of employment he was damaged in the further sum of \$200. He also avers that he employed an attorney to defend him against the charge of horse stealing, preferred by Mr. Stewart. The amount of these items, making a total of \$1,700, he asks to be assessed against Mr. Stewart together with judgment for costs of the action.

In her usual charming way Mrs. J. M. Bloss entertained about twenty ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps at her home Thursday afternoon. A paper was read by Mrs. Isabelle Horner on "Women in the Civil War." This was followed by another paper by Mrs. P. Chipman, her subject being "Paul Vanderwoort," of Omaha, Nebraska, who is the only male honorary member of W. R. C., as far as known. Mrs. F. M. Johnson read an account of the work being carried on at the Ohio Cottage, a soldiers' home at Madison, Ohio, which is supported by the W. R. C. Another interesting feature of the afternoon was a reading by Mrs. F. L. Miller on Mrs. John A. Logan and her visit to the Minnesota Soldiers' Home. Mrs. Bloss followed with some timely remarks along the line of W. R. C. work. After partaking of a delicious luncheon, the company adjourned to meet at some future time at the residence of Mrs. J. B. Horner.

Chief of Police Wells says he is disappointed to be less lenient hereafter with violators of the city's laws. He claims that last Friday he arrested J. R. Abbey for riding a bicycle on the sidewalk on Madison street, and instead of taking the offender before the police judge at once, requested him to call on Judge Porter at three o'clock that afternoon and pay his fine. This, the chief says, Mr. Abbey agreed to do, but instead of paying the penalty for his offense, he pleaded "Not guilty," and was discharged. Owing to a slight misunderstanding as to the time set for hearing the case, the chief was not present to substantiate the charges which he had preferred, and the court being unadvised as to the facts in the proceeding, was loath to hold the defendant after hearing his version of the affair. However, it will not be good policy for bicyclists to take Mr. Abbey's case as a criterion. Mr. Wells says it is his intention to enforce the bicycle ordinance without fear or favor.

As fine a monument as has been erected in this part of the country was put up at Corvallis to mark the resting place of the late John Campbell, who was killed in the train wreck on the Oregon Pacific Railroad. The work was done by Frank Wood Jr., of this city. The monument was a Barre granite obelisk eight and one-half feet in height, and besides the inscription bore a monogram of the Order of Railroad Conductors, being the letters "O. R. S." interwoven with a railroad conductor's punch. This is on the face of the monument. On the reverse side is the three-link emblem of the I. O. O. F. and the globe and tent of the order of Macabees, the letters being inlaid in gold. The monument is pronounced by all who have seen it to be a fine work of the sculptor's art. Another elegant monument, also made by Mr. Wood, has been erected at the grave of J. A. Howard at Lebanon. It is also a Barre granite shaft, and is finished with a spire and cap, surmounted by an urn.—Albany Herald.

There will be a large vote polled at the annual school election next Monday. A director will be chosen to succeed Mr. W. E. Yates and a successor to E. E. Wilson, clerk, is to be elected. For the latter position, Will Buchanan is the only candidate so far announced. The interest centers on the directorship contest. S. L. Kline had been urged by a number of citizens to accept the place and rumor had it that he was to be the A. P. A. candidate, but as will be seen by a card published elsewhere, Mr. Kline has refused to allow his name to be used. The only other candidate spoken of for the place is Prof. F. Berchtold. He is not the candidate of any particular class or sect, but is simply running as a citizen and a school patron. His long experience in educational work makes him well fitted for the place to which he will no doubt be elected by a large vote. The ladies have already begun an active campaign in his behalf and on election day they will likely be out in full force.

The "smoker" was one of the most successful events ever given in Corvallis and the guests are loud in their praise of the fire boys as entertainers. Much credit is due to the committee, consisting of B. W. Johnson, O. C. McLaughlin and H. L. Holgate.

A pleasant feature of the evening was the presence of Titus Ranney, one of the charter members of the Corvallis fire department and who worked on the tongue of "Big Six" fire engine, for five years. He had also worked on that historic engine at Stockton, California, in 1852, twenty years before it was brought to Corvallis. Mr. Ranney was called for and spoke briefly of the organization of the department.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING.

The annual business meeting of the school board of district No. 9 was held at the court house Monday afternoon, at which time the directors made the following report: To the legal voters of school district No. 9, Benton county, Oregon:

Your board of directors will respectfully report as follows:

That school in the district for the year ending May, 1895, was continued upon the plan and according to the report submitted by the directors at your last annual meeting.

That the following is a general statement of the business done by the board since the annual meeting of 1895:

That in the month of May, 1895, the following teachers were employed by the board for the ensuing year, they all beginning their service as such teachers September 23, 1895, and continuing the same to present time:

Principal, S. I. Pratt, at a salary of \$75.00 per month; 1st grade, Mary Newton, \$40 per month; 2nd grade, Alice Horning, \$40 per month; 3rd grade, Gertrude Vaughn, \$40 per month; 4th grade, Clara Duncan, \$40 per month; 5th grade, Jennie Spencer, \$40 per month; 6th grade, Augusta Turner, \$40 per month; 7th grade, Mary Nelson, \$40.

That during the year the board took advantage of cut rates of insurance in Corvallis, and placed policies to the amount of \$13,000 on the school building and furniture in the Phoenix and Home Insurance companies at a cost of \$25.35 premium.

That Judges Burnett and Wilson were authorized to represent the district in the district's claim for taxes due it from the O. P. R. C. Co., and they secured from the referee a report granting the district \$390.45, which it is hoped will be available soon.

That the board has contracted with W. A. Jolly for 20 cords oak wood for coming year at \$2.25 per cord, and with Mr. Bogue for 60 cords fir wood at \$2.10 per cord.

That the school is in a healthful condition and the teachers are faithful in the performance of their duties. Very respectfully submitted, W. E. YATES, Chairman.

The school clerk has received from taxes \$1371.29; from county treasurer from the apportionment of the state school fund \$3930.63. There was \$84.42 turned over by the former clerk and these amounts, with \$5.35 derived from other sources, make the total amount of school funds received during the year, \$3995.79.

The present clerk out of this fund has paid \$815.54 teacher's warrants endorsed "not paid for want of funds" by the former clerk and \$2320.25 salaries incurred during the present school year. Other disbursements have been: Interest on special indebtedness of the district, \$120; interest on bonded indebtedness, \$900.50; repairs, \$49.10; apparatus and supplies \$132.05; wood, 183; janitor, \$283.67; insurance, \$25.35; miscellaneous, \$74.57; cash on hand to balance \$461.67 of which amount \$118.63 belongs to the general fund.

The outstanding indebtedness of the district at this time is a trifle over \$1250. The judges appointed by board, under the law of 1893, for the election to be held at the court house next Monday are, John Ray, W. O. Heckart and D. C. Rose.

REPUBLICANS MOVING.

Candidates Discussed—Political Matters Generally.

The cold weather hasn't cooled the ardor of politicians. States are being made and smashed with such rapidity that it is almost impossible to determine who the favorites are. Some of the candidates of a few weeks ago have evidently felt of the popular pulse and finding that it did not beat affectionately for them, have gracefully retired. There seems to be but little talk concerning the supreme judgeship. Probably Mr. Bean can be renominated if he so desires.

For congressmen from this district there are a multitude of aspirants on the republican side. Several counties have favorite sons to present at the Albany convention and some of them more than one. There will be at least three up from the capital stride of the Salem Hog. Ford, Geer and Gatch are the Marion county would-be's, while Speaker Moore's name is also mentioned. Warren Truitt will have the backing of Polk county. Washington county folks will present the name of Thomas Tongue. Brownell will control the votes of the Clackamas delegation. Josephine county is supposed to favor H. B. Miller. Lane county has a supreme judge and the secretary of state, but it is said she will present the name of A. C. Woodcock at the congressional convention. Harman, of course, is the Douglas county favorite. The counties that have no favorite sons for the honor are Yamhill, Tillamook, Benton, Lincoln, Coos, Curry, Lake, Jackson and Klamath and their delegations without much doubt will favor Harman. He will also be likely to have some support from counties with candidates of their own, so that on the first ballot, he will lead by a large vote. Harman, without much question will be the nominee.

Benton county will present the name of W. E. Yates for prosecuting attorney of this judicial district. Brown, of Douglas county, the present incumbent, will likely be the only opposing candidate. But that county already has the district judge and the congressman and has a candidate for member of the state board of equalization. Benton county has no representation in the state or district offices, and is fairly entitled to name the district attorney.

In county matters things are decidedly mixed. Lincoln county will probably be given the privilege of naming the candidate for joint representative, but who the party will select as representative from this county is a matter of considerable doubt. It is understood that there are one or two aspirants who represent the Portland market in Benton county. They will hardly fare very well, however, at the coming convention. Benton county wants a representative to represent Benton county, not Multnomah politicians. There are others who have been talked of as material that are opposed to the machine. So far those spoken of as possible candidates are C. E. Moore, Wm. Hartless, R. M. Davieson, Dr. Loggan, M. V. Leeper and E. R. Lake.

For sheriff on the republican ticket, Wm. Knott, Milt Barlett, Frank Buchanan, Geo. W. Smith, Ed Williams and F. J. Chambers are mentioned. Some of these are not avowed candidates and it is impossible to estimate the strength the various aspirants possess.

During the past week Geo. Lilly is being urged for the clerkship. Bert Borsverson has been in the field some time and has worked up a strong following, especially in town, while it is thought Lilly will have considerable support from the outside precincts. Both are competent and would make good officers. W. W. Bistow is also said to be a candidate, but some are urging him for school superintendent.

There are four names mentioned so far in connection with the assessors'hip. They are Marion Hayden, of Alsea, Louis Edwards, Willamette, and G. M. McDonald and N. E. Newton, of Philomath.

L. E. Beach and Johnnie Gellatly are the only persons so far spoken of for the nomination of recorder. The latter is doing some effective campaigning and will doubtless come to the convention with a strong support. Both these gentlemen possess the qualifications necessary for the position and either would be a strong candidate.

For school superintendent, Geo. Denman seems at present to be in the lead. W. V. Bristow, W. B. Haines and W. C. Fischer are spoken of for the position, but are not known to be avowed candidates.

Ben Jolly and John A. Buchanan, two of the best republicans in the county are spoken of for commissioner. The nomination of either would be equivalent to an election and either would be a safe man for the taxpayers.

Republicans will, no doubt, select wisely the various candidates and prospects are flattering for the election of the whole ticket by good majorities.
