In his neighborhood, he said, they were the first items to be read each week, and the impression prevailed that they were written by Jim Osburn. It is needless to say that Mr. ———'s neighbors patronize Spencer.

Willis Vidito, one of the substantial farmers of Alsea valley, was in town Saturday. Mr. Vidito is a staunch republican, and one of the party's effective workers. He says the republicans have a splendid ticket this year, and it meets with general approbation in his precinct where it will be given a handsome majority in June.

E. R. Lake, candidate on the republican ticket for joint representative of Benton and Lincoln counties is spending a few days this week among his Lincoln county constituency. Already Mr. Lake conceded a handsome vote in this county, and if the voters of Lincoln county remain true to their colors his majority will be a significant one.

Saturday night the Corvallis "three linkers" celebrated the 77th anniversary of Odd Fellowship, at their hall in Fisher's brick. An interesting program in keeping with the occasion was rendered and included addresses by W. S. McFadden and President Bloss, a recitation by Miss Mary Newton and music by Spangler's orchestra. The affair ended with a sumptuous luncheon.

Ex-Superintendent Clark, of the O. C. & E., is expected to return to Corvallis in a few days, where he will visit for a time before leaving for his old home in Chicago. In a recent letter to Manager Stone, Mr. Clark stated he had just returned from a trip to the Sandwich Islands which he greatly enjoyed. From San Francisco he will go to Los Angeles for a brief stay, when he will leave for Oregon.

Miss Luella Dixon, a daughter of Joseph Dixon, died last Thursday at the family residence a few miles west of town. The funeral occurred the following day at the home of the deceased, and the remains were interred in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. Rev. Kelley, of the Evangelical church, conducted the services. At the time of her death Miss Dixon was in her 21st year. She was born in this county, and her death was the fourth to occur in the same family during the past two years.

At 2 p. m. next Saturday a meeting of fruit growers will be held at the court house for the purpose of hearing the secretary of the bureau of information for shippers, of the Northwest Fruit Growers Association, and the manager of Oregon Fruit Union, discuss the subjects of marketing and shipping fruits, eastern markets and their needs, cooperation in the shipment of fruit and its benefits to Oregon growers, a national fruit union, etc. All fruit growers are earnestly requested to be present.

It is not the usual thing for a transportation company to be in prime favor with the people from whom it expects patronage. The O. C. & E. company, however, is decidedly popular with the people of the Willamette valley and this popularity is made manifest daily. The other day a prosperous farmer from Buena Vista visited a prominent hardware store in Corvallis and purchased a plow. But before he concluded the bargain he insisted upon knowing what boat the firm patronized. They said the "Albany" and sold the plow.

The city election is to be held May 18th and for the purpose of appointing judges and clerks to preside at such election the council held a special meeting Monday night. As a result of their deliberations, appointments were made as follows: 1st ward—Caleb Davis, D. Carille and Emory Allen, judges; Fred Overlander and Geo. Smith, clerks, 2nd ward—Bryant Young, Frank Turney and C. F. Hotchkiss, judges; Wm. Howard and R. M. Everett, clerks, 3rd ward—R. M. Davidson, John Ray and James Osburn, judges; Chas. Hodes and F. A. Alexander, clerks.

County Clerk Hunter has been confined to his room since the adjournment of the circuit court a week ago last Saturday. For several weeks he had been at his office day and night, attending to his official duties and also the extra work incident to a regular term of circuit court, and when court adjourned he went home with a severe cold and a raging fever which came near resulting seriously. He has been under the care of Dr. Pernot, and at this time is considerably improved although he is bothered with a severe cough which will keep him indoors possibly for several weeks.

S. T. Jeffreys came up on the steamer Albany Sunday night and returned to Portland yesterday. He reports Multnomah politics much mixed. The election of Penneyer as mayor is a foregone conclusion and owing to the strife between the two republican factions of the county there is a favorable prospect for the election of Geo. Chamberlain, the democratic nominee for circuit judge, and M. L. Pipes, who is named on the same ticket for prosecuting attorney. Clarence Avery is named on the same ticket as a candidate for justice of the peace—a position worth about \$2,000 per annum. Clarence has a large personal following, which, together with his lodge affiliations, gives him a good chance for success.

Brady Burnett returned from Portland Saturday covered with glory and wearing a handsome gold medal. In the mile race at the 1st regiment contest he proved a surprise to the Portlanders, and won easily in the splendid time of 5:12 2-5. The race was run indoors on a 16 lap track, the floor being made of asphalt. If the judge can run as well, the political complexion of the supreme court will be mixed. Fred Colvig, also of the O. A. C., competed in the 22-1/2 yard race over the same track, and won the first heat neatly, but unfortunately his unfamiliarity with the track lost him the final heat and the race. He would have won on a straight-away track with ease. The boys are to be congratulated and so also is their trainer, Prof. Ed. Lance.

Miss Nona Smith met with a very peculiar accident last Friday afternoon while riding her wheel to the college. When near the ditch which crosses the farm about midway to the institution, she was seen to fall. She remounted, however, and proceeded on to the girls' dormitory, where, in conversation with some of her girl friends, she talked in an incoherent manner, and for some time they were unable to account for her strange actions. They noticed several bruises about her head and chin, indicating that she had met with an accident of some kind, but Miss Nona was unable to explain the matter to them. She was taken home, and medical attendance summoned. At first her condition seemed serious, but the following day she was out of danger, though she is still unable to remember any of the incidents connected with the affair.

The Portland Elks are anxious to have an excursion to the bay this summer. This matter was talked up considerably last fall and most of the arrangements for the excursion had been made, but the movement was started rather late in the season, and before all the plans had been consummated the fall rains set in and the matter was dropped. This week, however, Manager Stone received a letter from Max Shillock, of Portland, editor of the Pacific Elk, stating that the Elks were already talking the excursion over and if favorable transportation rates could be secured, it would be a go. Mr. Shillock says that many of the members of the lodge are enthusiastic over the prospects, and once the matter is settled that Yaquina is the place, the excursion will probably be the largest one ever run over the road. He estimates that fully one thousand persons will make the trip. The Elks are great hands for clams, crabs and oysters, and of course, a big clam bake on the beach will be one of the main features of entertaining the excursionists. Mr. Shillock thinks the excursion should be fixed for some date during the month of July.

The McKinley republican club of Philomath held an enthusiastic and well-attended meeting Monday night. The Acme republican quartette, consisting of Fred Oberer, H. L. Holgate, Chas. Wheeler and B. W. Johnson drove out and several Corvallisites, including the war horses, S. G. McFadden and Thos. Samuels, were in attendance. Geo. Denmann, who will have a big majority as school superintendent, was also present and Messrs. W. W. Bristow and E. R. Lake made excellent addresses. Part of the program, including a recitation and a violin solo, had been rendered before the Corvallis delegation arrived. The Philomath republican band discoursed good music, and the Philomath quartette pleased the visitors with a lively campaign song. Mr. T. G. Robinson sang a comic song about an Irish matron's biscuits, and the Corvallis quartette sang, "They're All Going Back On Tammany." Dr. R. O. Loggson presided at the meeting, and at the close invited the visitors to come again. The McKinley club is all right, and Philomath is endeavoring to be once more the banner republican precinct of the county.

The Benton county republican central committee held a meeting last Saturday afternoon at the office of its chairman, J. Fred Yates. The committee members present were: Chris. Hacker, T. H. Cooper, M. T. Starr, Scott King, Minor Swick, Geo. Bayne, W. D. Prettyman, Robert McFarland and W. S. Tomlinson. A communication from C. P. Fullerton, committeeman for Alsea precinct, was read, in which he expressed regrets at his inability to meet with the committee. He also stated that the Alsea republicans were enthusiastic over the prospects of a grand victory for the loyal in June, and would give the ticket loyal support, reports to the contrary notwithstanding. All the other committeemen reported favorably over the prospects for success in their various precincts and in their judgment of the situation is not badly at fault, the whole ticket will be elected by handsome majorities. The matter of arranging a joint canvass of the county was discussed at considerable length and finally left in the hands of the chairman with instructions to confer with the chairman of the populist and democratic committees and arranged a schedule favorable to all parties.

Miss Maud Hoffman leaves the latter part of this week for New York, where she has several flattering offers from leading theatre managers of the United States. Should none of these offers be accepted, she will go on to London and resume her former place with Wilson Barrett with whom she has been playing leading roles for the past two years with splendid success. But for Miss Hoffman's decided preference for America she would doubtless turn a deaf ear to the offers of American managers, as she is well satisfied with Mr. Barrett and his excellent company, but she naturally dislikes the idea of following her chosen profession among foreigners and on foreign soil. Miss Hoffman will be accompanied by her mother who will probably remain with her throughout the coming season. Both have many warm friends in Corvallis and their departure will be a matter of general regret.

LUXURY OF LAW.
The ownership of a blue wagon, or trucks, estimated value \$15, was the issue in a lawsuit which occupied nearly all day in Justice Holgate's court Tuesday. It seems that Wm. Parson sold the trucks to O. J. Treese two weeks ago, claiming them as his. Andrew Emrick, the plaintiff, considered that he was the rightful and legal owner and had given Parson no authority to transfer them and so sued Treese for the possession of them, and for damages. Judge Hufford appeared for the plaintiff, and A. L. McFadden and E. E. Wilson for Treese. A jury consisting of S. L. Shedd, Jas. Osburn, T. M. Hamilton, Elmer Baber, Taylor Porter, and Sherman Ward listened to the evidence, and after deliberating two hours returned a verdict giving Emrick the trucks, but allowing him no damages. The costs amount to more than \$20, and Mr. Treese, who has them to pay, will doubtless require an abstract of title and a warranty deed with every nail or foot of rope he may hereafter purchase.

ANOTHER PIONEER.

After an illness of six weeks Mrs. Ira Hunter died at the family residence in this city last Monday afternoon, aged 81 years, 8 months, 27 days. Mrs. Hunter's maiden name was Martha A. Bowers. She was born in Carter county, Tenn., July 30, 1814. Nine years later, with her parents, she moved to Johnson county, Missouri. Remaining there until 1832, the family moved to Jackson county, settling in Kansas City, where she was married three years later to Ira Hunter, who was at that time in the employ of the American Fur Co. In 1849 Mr. Hunter caught the California gold fever, and leaving his family in Kansas City he visited that state, returning home Christmas, 1851. While in California he had formed a favorable opinion of Oregon, and the following spring started for Corvallis, arriving here Oct. 22. Two weeks later Mr. Hunter located a donation land claim about six miles north of town where the family remained until 1871, when they moved to Corvallis where Mr. and Mrs. Hunter each lived until their death. Mr. Hunter died in 1890.

Mrs. Hunter joined the Baptist church soon after her arrival in Oregon, and always lived a steadfast and conscientious Christian life. She was a person of great force of character, but full of kindliness. Like her husband, she was noted for her charitable acts. Mrs. Hunter was a typical pioneer woman, sturdy, fearless, energetic, always ready to do her share and more of the heavier duties as well as the household work. She was a loving wife and a devoted mother. Of her seven children only one—Joseph—survives her, the others having died during their childhood.

The funeral occurred yesterday forenoon at the family residence, Rev. Mark Noble officiating. A large number of pioneers and old friends of the family followed the remains to their last resting place in the Locke cemetery.
