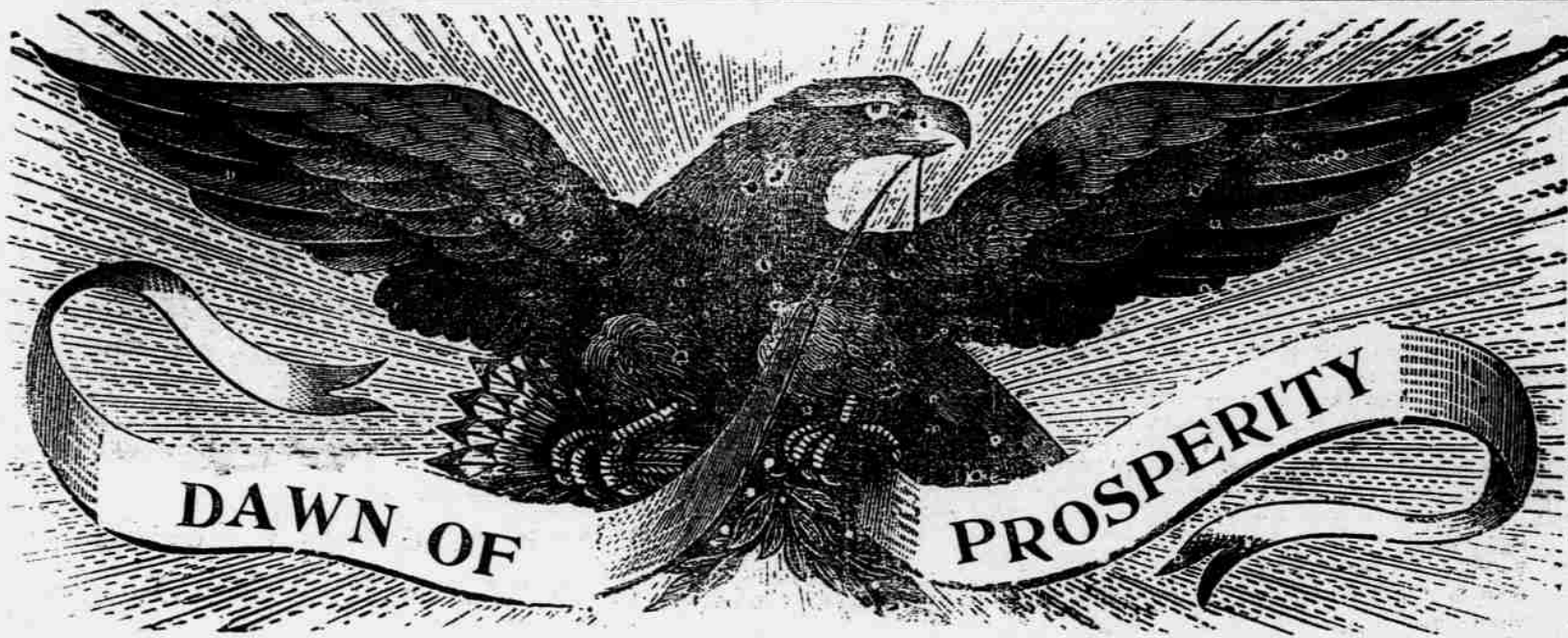

The Splendid Victory in Old Benton is a Matter of State Pride.

REPUBLICANS WILL HAVE COMPLETE SWAY IN CONGRESS

News of McKinley's Election Applauded by the Germans—American Securities Rise Rapidly in Europe—The Wheat Market Responds and American Product Advances.

An eager crowd waited for returns Tuesday night and when Corvallis returns showed a big McKinley majority, there was a very sorrowful. Virgil Waters explained and lesser lights wore thunder clouds. Some democrats did not look so blue. Gibson shook hands heartily with himself, Pun Avery, Pole Avery, Nolan, Hodes, Schmidt, Zeroff, Griffioz and others smiled a big smile.

Corvallis gave McKinley 178 plurality over Bryan. This is magnificent. It surprised the most sanguine republican. Then Philomath sent the good news that McKinley had 48 there. Dusty covered herself with glory and gave 61 majority for McKinley and Hobart. When came in with 17 more. The majorities in Benton county are as follows:

The vote in Corvallis was larger than usual. There was a number of Linn county voters here and many from outside precincts, and included both Bryan and McKinley men, probably a few more of the former.

There was a great deal of money bet in Corvallis. It is impossible to discover all the amounts, but they will aggregate over \$2,500. On general results the betting was 2 to 1; on the state the wagers were on even terms and most of the money was on Oregon. But little money was placed on the county.

A prominent republican county official has a wife with democratic sympathies. His little six-year-old girl is attending the kindergarten and Monday her mother gave her a dollar to pay her dues. Bessie took it, looked at it and without a word went up stairs. A little later her sister found her crying bitterly. "Why, what is the matter?" she asked. "Oh, mamma went and gave me a silver dollar when she knows I'm a goldbug. What made mamma be a democrat?" and she refused to be comforted.

The result in Benton county is a constant source of joy. There are numerous good workers who deserve credit. J. Fred Yates, chairman county committee, and E. R. Lake, president of the McKinley Club, are entitled to es-

pecial mention for their intelligent labor. Two of the most faithful workers in the general field were Wm. Hartless and Geo. Eglin. Of the gold democrats, R. E. Gibson and Pun Avery were very effective in their opposition to the Chicago combination. Hundreds of others did valiant service.

When the returns from the East began to show that McKinley was leading, sound money men shouted for joy. Popocrats looked glum. Illinois, early in the evening, seemed certain for the major. Sound money men went wild. Popocrats went home. Then thick and last came McKinley news, and by midnight it was very plain that the boy orator was a political corpse. A mighty joy filled the breast of many a man in Corvallis. "Thank God" came from many lips, and many feet, tired with the day's work and the night's waiting, went home to rest.

Judge McFadden claimed (before election day) that the "allied forces" would carry Benton county by 250 majority. It was not his fault that his prophecy proved false. The judge had his men well organized and at work. There was not enough of them. They made plenty of noise and had plenty of confidence and plenty of energy, but their guns were loaded with blank cartridges. The political Wellington's Benton county lieutenant fell into the ditch.

Wm. Tally was down from Monroe yesterday. He said he did not need to see any newspaper or hear any reports to know that McKinley had been elected. He stood on his front porch Wednesday morning and watched Wilhelm's flag pole. Messengers from Corvallis and Junction hurried to Wilhelm's store, but no flag fluttered from the staff. Tally waited and watched, but the pole pointed upward bare and dismal. Tally gave a whoop and ran to tell his wife that McKinley was, undoubtedly elected.

The "enemy's country" has repudiated Bryan, and the "enemy's country" is very wide. Bryanism received a fatal puncture Tuesday. Bryanism is dead.

J. R. Markley was awakened yesterday morning by a loud shout of "Hurrah for McKinley!" in his bedroom. He looked and saw it was his little boy. "What! you shouting for McKinley?" asked the astonished J. R. "You bet," replied the little fellow. "I ain't going to yell for anybody that's licked out of sight. Hurrah for McKinley!"
