Dr. Bowen Lester returned Monday from Portland, having been absent attending the session of the annual convention of Oregon dentists. Many prominent dentists from abroad were in attendance and assisted materially in making the convention both interesting and profitable to those in attendance.

Miss May Lilly, aged 37, died at her home near Wren early Monday morning. The burial was in the Old Fellows cemetery Tuesday. Rev. Isaac Peart conducted the services. She was a estimable young lady and had the affectionate respect of all who knew her. She was a sister of Geo. E. Lilly.

The cider factory runs now on full time. Mr. Horsfall ships to San Francisco and the demand there consumes the whole output of the factory. He has some difficulty in obtaining proper barrels. While the factory is run solely as a private enterprise, in making a market for the surplus of our apple orchards, it is a public blessing.

At the night meeting of the grand lodge, Knights of Pythias, J. Fred Yates was appointed grand orator for the coming year. This appointment is considered quite an honor by members of the order and there was a deal of rivalry among the boys for the place. J. Fred, however, secured the prize and is to be congratulated on his success.

At Methodist Episcopal church Lord's day morning: "Five rich and beneficial lessons from a Nobleman." This will be a helpful discourse. Evening: "Our young people's societies, and how to attract persons to the devotional meetings and how to hold them." Sermon will be made interesting and helpful by telling illustrations and anecdotes.

President Gatch and Superintendent Denman have been co-sponsoring the matter of the admission of Benton county public school graduates into the freshman class of the Agricultural College, upon the evidence of their diplomas. Prof. Gatch has agreed to list the schools as accredited schools if the graduating examinations are held by Prof. Denman—a sensible suggestion. The superintendent will therefore divide the county into school precincts, and at stated times will be at the most central point in each precinct and examine candidates for graduation.

Quite an excitement was caused Sunday afternoon by the supposed find of a body in the river near the incline. Some boys fishing there caught their hooks in something and brought some substance they thought was decayed human flesh and hair. They reported their discovery and soon the bank was lined with people. Men with grappling hooks worked diligently and finally brought to the surface the object which proved to be a beef hide. County School Superintendent Denman has in his office a handsome silk banner, which will be presented to the public school of the county, outside of Corvallis, that has the highest per centage in attendance of the children of school age in the district, and the lowest per centage of tardiness each month. The winning school holds the banner for a month and then it is given to the next successful school. The contest begins next month, and Prof. Denman has furnished blanks to the various teachers. This is an excellently devised plan and shows that our school superintendent not only is active but has good ideas that he knows how to carry out.

To-night the Monroe local teachers' institute opens. The chief feature of the programme is the address, "Nansen's polar expedition," by Prof. F. Berchold. The exercises will be held in Wilhelm's hall. Among those taking part to-morrow are Prof. Hornor and Cordley, of the O. A. C., Principal Pratt, Miss Wicks and Mrs. Denlinger, of the Corvallis public schools, Supt. Denman, Prof. Thompson, Sinclair and Holm and Mr. R. J. Nicholas. To-morrow night Mr. B. F. Irvine, editor of the Times, will make the principal address. Mr. Geo. L. Paul and Miss Edna Irvine will recite and Messrs. Fulton, Johnson, Pritchard and Holgate, sing.

The Corvallis chief of police having time to spare from his amours and his official business has generously undertaken to be the recording angel of the other officer's doings. Chief Wells had left a pickaxe and other tools in the main room of the jail and George, with the pick axe had a hole in the wall and was free. The chairman of the board of directors, backed up by the clerk, has agreed to disagree with the two other directors. The latter signed a contract with Prof. Perrin, engaging him as teacher for the school, and he commenced teaching last Monday. The president of the board objects and claims the election of teacher is illegal, and has called a special meeting of the school voters to upset the act of his colleagues. The clerk went to superintendent Denman to ask his opinion. Prof. Denman replied that he did not know all the particulars, but, according to State Superintendent Irwin's decision, if two directors sign the contract with the teacher, the act binds the district, and the contract cannot be annulled except by consent of the teacher.

Killed.
The Monroe correspondent reports a sad accident whereby a well known young man met his death, as follows: "Another one of those peculiar workings of providence occurred last week. Fred Wheeler, a son of John Wheeler, who resides east of Monroe, has been engaged at work in eastern Oregon for some time past and recently concluded to return to his father's home. Friday last was to have been the date of his arrival, but a sad alteration was to be made ere the visit took place. Fred had promised to ride a wild horse for his employer and just before starting on his trip he undertook to fulfill his contract, and in so doing was thrown from the animal, kicked in the head and killed. The body was sent down at once, the funeral taking place Saturday at 10 a. m., Rev. Skaggs, of the Christian church, officiating. Rev. A. B. Minton then took charge of the services, and the body was laid to rest in the cemetery near town, at 1 p. m. The father, half brothers and sisters and numerous cousins mourned the loss of this untimely death."

Don't Care Adam.
Dickens's cheerful locomotion must have been such person as Adam Asell, who celebrated his 66th birthday Tuesday. Adam has been sailor, miner, butcher, hotel keeper, contractor, and followed many other occupations during a long and busy life. He has made comfortable fortunes and lost them. To-day, when the almond tree flourishes, and he is well down the western slope of the mountain of life he finds it necessary, that he gain an independent livelihood by doing unconvengial work. Yet he is as sprightly and light hearted as a boy, nor does he indulge in lamentations over his lost fortune.

Adam went to sea on a man-of-war at the age of 14, and from 1842 to 1852 was on the ocean. Then he left his vessel at San Francisco and for 20 years prospected and mined for gold. He is well known all over the coast.

In politics Adam is a democrat and rather favors free silver, yet he voted for Palmer and Buckner. One incident in his life may explain why he refused to endorse Bryan's unreasoning attack on capital.

Having made up \$12,000 in mining, and being yet a young man, he decided to visit his old home in New York, and sailed from San Francisco. It was a stormy and eventful voyage. Three times the vessel took fire and during nearly the entire trip some of the passengers, headed by Asell, assisted the crew. Arriving at Hellgate, the captain called up the passengers who had been of so much service and the purser repaid their passage money (\$250 each) and asked them what else they would allow him to do for them. They simply thanked him for the passage money and declined further pay. But when Adam called to get his ticket for the return trip, when he mentioned his name, the agent told him he had instructions to refuse pay for the passage, and if Asell wished to travel on that company's ships he would have to travel free. Adam says that corporations may not possess souls but some of them have something that is a great deal warmer than some people's souls.
