J. W. Ingle Indicted.

Yesterday morning the grand jury returned an indictment against J. W. Ingle, of Philomath, charging him with forgery. The case will come up for trial at the April term of court. The indictment is an outgrowth of the action brought by Ingle against his sons-in-law, Nichols and Holm, suing them for over \$7,000 and closing their store under attachment, precipitating an assignment.

The firm, in buying out Ingle's stock of goods, gave him eight notes of \$1,000 each, payable in different years, and one smaller note. Ingle recently sued to collect the whole amount, although only one note was supposed to be due if all conditions were complied with. But according to the complaint filed in each note but the one first due were the words, "interest payable annually, and if not so paid, then the whole note, principle and interest, shall become due and collectable." Nichols and Holm claim that the part "and if not paid," was put in after their signing the note, and without their knowledge or consent. They say that only \$1,000, and the interest on the whole amount is really due.

FOR SENSATIONALISTS.

An Article not to be Read by Calm, Prosaic and Perfect People.

This paper and other papers have been criticized for publishing certain happenings that might be deemed to "reflect on the town." If anything unusual happens that is not creditable in all things to one or more of the participants, and the facts are printed in a paper, there are those who will train their fingers into a caricature of righteous indignation and make it their business to go about the streets damning the paper as being dangerously sensational and unfairly partial. But they read the paper and read first the articles they criticize.

There was an occurrence on the street Wednesday morning that was really a sensation. This paper, being a newspaper, will of course publish the facts, and in order that those who live in more sanctified atmospheres may not learn, unaware of the exciting affair, this introduction is made. It is hoped that this unusual effort to please everybody will be properly appreciated.

The incident was a fist fight between Chief of Police Bird Wells, Lee Wells, his son, and Jas. L. Skipton, who resigned his position as night watchman Monday night. It occurred on Main street in front of Kline's store Wednesday morning. According to all witnesses Skipton and John Buchanan were talking over some business matters, when the chief stepped up and said, "John, if you knew as much about this man as I do, you wouldn't be seen talking to him." Hot words followed between the two men, and Mr. Buchanan tried to pacify them, but without success. Wells and Skipton soon came to blows, and later, Lee Wells joined issues with his father, and Skipton engaged alternately with each. Accounts vary slightly as to the first blow, etc., but the chief, doubtless, in a rage contest, would have been the decision as to the result.

The fight caused considerable commotion and is yet the subject of street conversation. Nightwatchman Beach arrested Bird and Lee Wells, and they were fined \$10 each.

Machines Knocked Out.

The nickel-in-the-slot gambling machines can be played no more in Corvallis. Chief of Police Wells ordered them all withdrawn last Monday, and the owners, quietly, and indeed rather gladly, submitted. The machines are fairly profitable, but the playing is not a legitimate business transaction and becomes more or less of a nuisance. As long as one house had them, others felt compelled to do likewise; but it is safe to say that all who owned them are glad that the machines are to be henceforth prohibited.

The patrons of the machines certainly are benefited. Those combinations of iron and paper have a fascination all their own, and often tempt their victims into losing more than can really be spared. President Gatch told the college boys the other day that it was beneath the dignity of a college student, possessing mind and intellect, to match himself against a mere machine, and especially when the machine was bound to be victorious. And in the long run the machines always do win. They are built for that purpose.

The action of the chief is commendable and contrary to the usual result in such cases, seems to suit somebody.

LATER.—The above seems to have been written under a misapprehension. The proprietors of the machines are not so fond of the order and say that the machines are not more harmful than dice throwing for cigars. The legal aspect of the matter will soon be determined, the firms of Small & Son and Hodes & Hall having cases in the city court next Monday, being charged with operating a gambling device.

Four Years for Scott.

Ed. Scott pleaded guilty to the charge of larceny of a horse and buggy, and Thursday morning stood up in the court room to receive his sentence. Thin and pale, trembling in limb, haunted by the fear of threatened insanity, a long term of dishonorable confinement before him, with an unhappy past and an unhappy future, he was a pitiable object. It seemed to the spectators that in such cases, life is less merciful than death.

When asked if he had anything to say before sentence was passed upon him, Scott replied: "I took the rig, but did not intend to steal it. I was going to visit a friend with another party and both of us were intoxicated. The other party was to bring back the rig, but I went to sleep and when I awoke I was in the buggy alone. I did not want to get into any more trouble, but I hardly knew what I was doing." His attorney, Ed. L. Bryan, then briefly addressed the court, asking the court to temper justice with mercy.

Judge Patterson, in passing sentence, said that his personal and judicial knowledge of the defendant's career precluded him from giving a light sentence. The prisoner's former experiences in the penitentiary ought to have warned him sufficiently. The court then sentenced the defendant to four years in the penitentiary.

Friends of the home team are pleased to learn that Gallagher is practicing with the boys. Ganit is able to play again with comfort and the other members of the team, with the exception of Holgate, are on the field daily. Holgate will not be able to practice this week and will probably go as a sub. on the 20th.

The football teams belonging to the intercollegiate association are variously named. The Agricultural College lads are known as Corvallis, O. A. C., Hayseeds and Farmers; the State University eleven, are Eugene and Dudes; the Pacific University are termed Forest Grove, Congregationalists and Coogs; the Monmouth Normal are termed Monmouth, Teachers and Profs.

A NEW NIGHT-OFFICER.

City Council Holds an Interesting Session.

Mayor Woodward presided over a full council Monday night—the adjective applying to the body itself, and not to the individual members. Visitors, also, were plentiful.

The committee on fire and water, which had been instructed to inquire as to whether or not the electric light company and the water company are charging exorbitant rates, reported that the light company's charges are reasonable, but that the water company should make a general reduction of 25 per cent on all rates, and if it refuses, the council should pass an ordinance, properly regulating the matter.

Bills on general and street funds were allowed.

Report of chief of police read and filed. An item in the report, relative to the dismissal of two cases of violating the "bi-cycle on sidewalks" ordinance aroused some debate, and the council finally voted that the police judge draft an ordinance prohibiting cycle riding on any walk.

Communication from Attorney Pipes relative to certain court fees in the water case, read and matter went over.

A strong resolution relative to Yaquina bay improvement was adopted and copies ordered sent to each member of the Oregon delegation.

Petition for street lights at the new United Evangelical church and at the creamery, read and referred to the fire and water committee with power to act.

Liquor bonds of J. Westefeld, Thos. Whitehorn and B. Woldt read and approved.

The resignation of Nightwatchman Jas. L. Skipton, in which he referred unpleasantly to the chief of police, was read and accepted. There were two candidates for the position and the election resulted, Eph Beach, 6; W. J. Moore, 2; blank, 1.

Upon request of Rev. Kelly, sidewalks were ordered laid near the United Evangelical church.

The council cautioned the chief of police against exceeding his authority in the matter of street and walk work, and then adjourned.

Flowing Wells.

Monday night the resignation of Nightwatchman Skipton was read to the city council. In his letter, the retiring officer gave as the chief reason for his action, the conduct of the head of the department, whom the letter characterized as unfit for the position mentally, morally and otherwise.

The chief was present and the chief replied. Unheeding the quiet remonstrance of the mayor, the commander of the army of Corvallis stirred up the atmosphere, hurling chunks of eloquence in vindication of his "gentlehood." He transfixed Mr. Skipton with a few strokes and then unexpectedly attacked the GAZETTE, which has not resigned and which is not going to resign.

He knocked the GAZETTE down, he spared it, he damned it, and then made faces at it. If this paper had any sense at all, it would retire from public gaze, wiped out, extinguished.

The councilman sat in solemn silence, awed into speechlessness, while the visitors swayed to and fro, responsive to the magnificent oratory that controlled their thoughts and feelings. It was a sublime scene. And when in the grand peroration he asked in tones that frightened the goddess of justice over the court house door, "Did any councilman hear me complain of Skipton?" Geo. Smith and "Dad" Hall could stand the strain no longer. They waved their hands, shouted "No!" and saved the crowd.

The GAZETTE hardly understands how it deserved to be so immortalized, nor does it comprehend the meaning of all the present outpouring of last Monday night, but is surprised to learn that some people do not like the paper. This is indeed a grievous state of affairs.

A Chicago Girl's View.

Miss Cora Elizabeth Campbell, of Chicago, who recently was in Corvallis on a visit to her uncle, Alex Campbell, has written a letter describing her western trip that appears in the Ogle County Republican, published in Oregon, Illinois. The letter is too long to be reprinted, but Miss Campbell's impressions of Yaquina bay, are given below:

"After resting several weeks we took a trip to the seashore, to the coast. And the journey there, over and through the Coast range, with its little rivers and tiny cascades and its huge forests of evergreen was long to be remembered. Because the way was sacred to us on account of the attachment to it of one whose memory is precious, and because we were with such dear friends and lastly, because of the magnificent scenery upon all sides the entire trip. At the end of the railroad journey we took the boat for the little village across the bay. I was very eager for the first glimpse of the sea, you may be sure, and it seemed a long journey of 20 minutes before we turned the arm of the bay. When one has waited for years for anything, the last twenty minutes one waits is almost indurable. But at last out there a mile away beyond the harbor but the Pacific rolled and tumbled with silver crest under the brilliant sunshine. Standing quite alone and still in the bow of the boat I had this quiet contemplation all to myself. Gaily and laughter and the brightest side of life was what I felt the first moment I looked at the ocean. But I saw it in many moods during my stay. Sometimes in a towering rage, sometimes sullenly angry, sometimes tenderly solemn, but always real—always hungry for victims, ever ready to engulf a pebble or a ship. Of the delights of this bit of coast I could write long pages. But we will only look up northward along the shore to Yaquina head, where the Cape Foulweather Light stands; across the bay at the jetties which a beneficent government begun to build and never finished; southward along the shore to the U. S. life saving station. Take a peep into the Devil's punch bowl, a huge cave which the persistent waves have hollowed out of the basaltic rock. Look up at the bluffs back of the beach covered with acres of rhododendrons which make a garden worthy the envy of royalty. In the Prince of Wales's London house there are eight rhododendrons in boxes in the Porte Cochere—here at Yaquina bay we may gather bushels of the blossoms at our own sweet will. Then the agates on the beach to be had for the hunting. But all these are minor attractions. The two prime delights are the smell of the sea and the sound of the surf."
