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## The Old Tax Lists.

Sheriff Rickard and Deputy Burnett are the buffers between indignant tax payers and the old tax rolls. Since assuming the duties of their office they have collected about \$400 of the ancient taxes and \$1,000 sheriff's assessments.

The other day Mr. Starr paid taxes of 1887 charged against S. R. Hawley. The amount was \$29. It is possible that this had been previously paid, as many people whose taxes are not marked paid on the old rolls have brought in receipts in full. The great trouble seems to be in the roll of 1890, when the abstracters added to the taxable property of the county much that had been hitherto overlooked or wrongly described.

N. Castle, of Philomath, saw his name in the delinquent list. He hurriedly sought his receipts and found he had one in full for that year. He came to town post haste and the present sheriff gave him proper credit. His taxes amounted to \$129 and the receipt showed he paid that amount. On the roll, in the proper place, the word "paid" did not appear, but written in another line was the information, "paid \$119, balance due \$10."

Mr. Rickard hopes to have the old matters settled up soon. It involves extra, unremunerated work upon the officers and is a source of annoyance to the people interested.
