THE MAN FOR THE PLACE.

Frank Irvine Dunbar, of Clatsop county, the republican nominee for secretary of state, was and is one of the best nominations ever made for that important office in this state.

Mr. Dunbar was born at sea, September 14, 1860, under the American flag, on the ship Mattipan, of which his father was captain, while enroute from the West Indies to Boston.

Mr. Dunbar's parents trace their ancestry to the sturdy Puritans who came to the bleak shores of New England on the Mayflower early in the seventeenth century, to secure for themselves and posterity the blessings of civil and religious liberty denied them in the land of their nativity.

While still young his parents removed to Brooklyn, N. Y., where he attended school until he was fourteen years of age, when having lost his father he left his school for good, to battle with the realities of life. His first position was with Geo. W. Bruce, one of the largest importing hardware establishments of that day in the city of New York.

For eight years he remained with this concern, working himself through successive grades until he mastered the intricacies of that important branch of commercial trade.

At the age of twenty-two Mr. Dunbar severed his connection with his new York employers and came to Astoria in 1882, where he had some distant relatives.

His first engagement in that city was with Mr. A. V. Allen, who was then, as he is now, one of the leading grocers of that city. He continued with Mr. Allen eight years as book-keeper, when he left his position in 1890 to fill the office of recorder of Clatsop county, to which he had been elected. He was re-elected county clerk of the same county and re-elected in 1895.

As an indication of Mr. Dunbar's popularity, each time that he was before the people for their votes he was elected by increased majorities.

Mr. Dunbar in 1889 was united by marriage with Miss Lillian C. Crosby, a most estimable lady, a daughter of Captain Albert Crosby, one of the first and best known bar pilots at the entrance of the Columbia river.

During his residence of sixteen years in Astoria he has been interested and has taken an active part in many of the institutions of that city. He was for several years a director and is now president of the Astoria building and loan association, an institution that has been successful since its organization for the purposes for which it was established. He was an active member of the Oregon National Guard and received an honorable discharge after five years service; a veteran fireman; is a member of the Chamber of Commerce; an energetic member of the Progressive and Commercial Association, and of other local business and fraternal organizations.

As a public officer Mr. Dunbar is manly, courteous and obliging. Should he be elected secretary of state the same disposition will prevail in all the departments of that office. A gentleman by birth and education, methodical in his office accounts and records, conscientious in his dealings, he will be a valuable officer for the state and a worthy successor in that office of such of his predecessors, as Gov. S. F. Chadwick, Hon. Rockwell P. Earhart and Senator George W. McBride.

HIS RECORD.

Mr. Veatch may be a good man but he would be a bad congressman. Dr. Hill, the populist nominee, has far more ability and would accomplish more for the state. But Tongue, has the advantage of experience, is a tireless worker, and an intelligent observer. Aside from political consideration, the people of the district need in congress a man who can and will do more than vote "no."

STULTIFICATION.

It is the policy of many country papers to shout "hurrah" over every nomination made by their party. They pronounce good everything that has the party label. Their endorsement of every candidate of their ticket is looked on as a matter of course and has little effect.

Such newspaper's cannot stultify themselves for they have no genuine opinions and their praise is but prate. A machine cannot stultify itself and an indiscriminate "whooping up" of the whole ticket, regardless of any fact but that the candidates are on the ticket, is but machine work.

This paper proposes to have a substantial reason for every editorial utterance. We do not fear that the republican party will be injured by truth speaking on the part of a republican journal.

THE CONDITION THAT CONFRONTS.

The attention of this paper has been called to the fact that several hundred republicans in Lincoln and Benton counties are not supporting the republican nominee for joint senator. But that is not the fault of this paper. The men who brought about the nomination of Mr. Daly know that these republicans could not support him, and the responsibility is upon them.

Why is there any republican opposition to Mr. Daly? This is a legitimate question and it is proper for a republican newspaper to answer it. It is charged by the republican opponents of Mr. Daly that he is not identified with the interests of Benton and Lincoln counties but his sympathies and affiliations are with Portland people and Portland enterprises.

It is charged by the republican opponents of Mr. Daly that his nomination was brought about against their earnest protests, and regardless of the suggestion that some bonafide citizen such as Marion Hayden, C. B. Croson, Elmo Davis, Olin Wilson, Jerry Henkle, Dr. Loggan, Willis Vidito, Miles Starr and Judge Moor be selected for the position—some sound republican on whom all republicans could unite. It is claimed that the "Daly only" attitude of certain men, were maintained because Daly only could be relied upon to carry out certain pledged propositions.

It is charged by those republicans who oppose Mr. Daly that there will be matters before the incoming legislature in which the interests of Portland and the railroad lines centering there will conflict with the interests of Astoria and Yaquina.

It is claimed that Mr. Daly owes his nomination to the influence of Joseph Simon who is attorney for the Portland corporations and who is a large stock holder in the Northern Pacific Terminal Co.; that Mr. Daly is and will be under such obligations to Mr. Simon and the interests he represents that he cannot avoid voting as Mr. Simon requests; and that a vote for Mr. Daly is a vote against Yaquina bay and the best interests of the Willamette valley.

It is charged by those republicans who oppose Mr. Daly that the policy he advocates, "tariff for revenue only," is not sound republican doctrine.

Other reasons are given but enough are here outlined to show the motives that actuates these men.
