Rev. H. A. Ketchum of the First Presbyterian church of Salem will occupy Dr. Thompson's pulpit next Sunday. Theme in the morning, "God's Care for Care;" evening, "The Supreme Purpose of True Patriotism"—a memorial sermon. A cordial welcome to all. Dr. Ketchum was a chaplain in the late Civil war.

One week from tonight the graduating exercises of the Corvallis public schools will be held at the opera house. The very small admission fee of 5 cents, reserved seats to cents will be charged, this being the only means of paying expenses. The surplus will be used for the purchase of a flag-pole.

A farce was admirably presented and caused a great deal of merriment, especially the parts of Mrs. Shearsgreen and Mrs. Helms. The dancing and singing of Miss Moore gave pleasure. After the program ice cream and cake were served.

The Young Ladies' Republican Club surprised the young men with a fire program and lunch Friday night. As the latter were not informed of the coming treat until a few minutes before the meeting, the invitation was not generally known, but still 30 young gentlemen partook of the young ladies' hospitality and spent a pleasant evening.

That picnic at Dusky was only postponed not wholly given up. Dusky does give things up. On Wednesday, June 1st the Belfountain. Cornet band, a musical organization of considerable merit, will hold forth in picnic style again. They expect to do only greater things on account of the delay and all who attend are promised a royal time.

The pupils of school district No. 42, Aisen Valle, are patriotic. They raised a fund themselves to purchase a flag to float over the school building. This school tied with No. 5 for the superlative banner for April, each receiving 100 per cent. No. 42 held the banner the first half of the month and No. 5 has it the last half. Mr. L. E. Cooper is the popular and proficient teacher of 42.

Corvallis Odd Fellowship was evidently ably represented at Roseburg last week. Miss Pauline Kline was elected president of the Rebekah Assembly, the first office in the lodge. A. W. Bowersox was elected high priest at the Grand Encampment, the second ranking officer, and Lado Dorris, a former Corvallis boy, was elected grand warden of the Grand lodge. Mr. Bowersox made the nominating speech for Mr. Dorris.

Several citizens have expressed themselves as feeling that Corvallis has not been fairly treated by the Oregonian in the publication of the Oregon volunteer roster. About twenty boys went from our town and we get credit for but two. This, however, is not the fault of the Oregonian, but was caused by the boys registering as from the places where their company was formed. If anyone will go to the trouble to get a correct list, the Oregonian will publish it.

Prof. Fulton writes to a friend that himself and Mrs. Fulton are pleasantly located at Washington, D. C., and that the expense of living is not nearly so high as they had been lead to expect. The weather was very warm when he wrote and he adds "gravitation seems to lose all jurisdiction over mercury here; but I am willing to suffer a few dripping inconveniences to be able to appreciate the many advantages placed at the disposal of the public by a more than generous government."

The annual teachers' institute of Benton county will convene in Corvallis on the 8th, 9th and 10th of June. Supt. Denman has secured Prof. E. H. Anderson of Salem, and Prof. W. A. Wetzel of Portland, as instructors. They are gentlemen of vast experience as institute instructors. The institute will be strictly normal in every respect and no teacher can afford to lose this opportunity of obtaining a short normal training. State Supt. G. M. Irvin and Pres. C. H. Chapman of State University, have consented to address the teachers and patrons at the evening sessions on the 8th and 10th respectively.

IN POLITICS.

Public Speaking by Prominent Men.

Several big political guns were fired in Benton county the past week. Space can be spared for but a brief review.

George H. Williams addressed a large and representative audience at the opera house Thursday night, May 19th. His discourse on the money question is practical and very convincing. Judge Williams was in the national senate when the alleged "crime of 1873" was supposed to have been committed, and he gave testimony that there was nothing hidden or suppressed in the financial legislation that the populists now condemn.

Mr. Schoonmaker, of New Jersey, one of the best orators that ever visited Oregon, addressed a hall full of people at Dusky Saturday night. Everyone was delighted with his magnificent address and able presentation of the political issues.

Mr. Veatch, democratic candidate for congressman and Geo. Chamberlain, of Portland, spoke at the court house Monday evening. A very small crowd was present, including about 70 voters. Mr. Veatch excused himself, and Mr. Chamberlain made the speech of the evening. Mr. Chamberlain is a good fellow but was not at home in his present political company.

Tuesday evening Chas. W. Fulton of Astoria, a magnificent speaker, a loyal republican and a grand citizen, addressed the citizens of Corvallis, the opera house being packed with men and women who enjoyed every word of the speaker. Mr. Fulton clearly showed that the republican party is the only real party in the field today; that the so-called union party is but a combination and that democrats and populists are not bound to support it. He spoke with great clearness and force against the free coinage of silver and in favor of upholding the present administration. Mr. Fulton closed with a tribute to the work of Congressman Tongue and appealed to his hearers to vote for their own interests and return Tongue to congress.

Tonight Dr. Hill, of Albany, an interesting talker and the populist candidate for congressman, will address the citizens of Corvallis, at the court house. Mr. Veatch has declined to meet Dr. Hill in a joint debate. Hill has several superiors as a sharp and pointed speaker.

Decoration Day.

Next Monday is a holiday. On that day the people of the United States decorate the graves of their dead and especially the last resting places of those who fought in defense of the flag.

John A. Lane, of the G. A. R., announces the following general program for Corvallis. The details are being perfected by the committees.

Union services at the M. E. church, 11 a. m. Sunday morning. Rev. Peart will preach the sermon and the other city ministers will assist in the exercises.

Monday at 2 p. m. the procession will form at the G. A. R. hall and march to Crystal Lake cemetery, the O. A. C. band and cadets head the procession.

At 8 p. m. Monday evening there will be exercises at the court house, including an address by Prof. S. I. Pratt.

Me and Sol.

We have no fault to find with personality of any candidate on the union ticket. Nor, in default of any such objection, do we have recourse to drubbing any supporter of those candidates.

The GAZETTE believes in calling a spade a spade and despises in-tendo. If the Times believes that the republican ticket should be defeated because Mr. Sol King and Mr. Norm Lilly supports the ticket, why does it not frankly so declare instead of hinting at it? Those "Me and Sol" articles are not witty, they are not sensible, they are not honest. The object of these petty attacks is to create dissension and distrust among republicans, to create among former republican candidates resentment against the present republican ticket. The attempt is as silly as it is unfair.

The GAZETTE has the reputation of telling the truth and our republican readers throughout the county will believe us when we state that there is not the slightest discord between the republican candidates on the county ticket, nor between their active supporters. They are working earnestly for the success of the entire ticket.

The Times without the slightest authority insinuates that Messrs. Cooper, Smith, and Jolly have some grievance against republican candidates on the county ticket. This is the very essence of absurdity. Does the Times expect any man to believe that these gentlemen have the remotest idea of voting for a paper that has desparately traduced them and against a candidate on their own party ticket who always supported them?

And now just another word. Mr. Linnville, Mr. Lilly and all the other republican nominees particularly requested the GAZETTE to avoid saying anything disagreeable of their opponents or their opponents supporters.

Anxious to Fight.

The president has called for seventy thousand more volunteers and Corvallis young men who wish to fight for Uncle Sam are anxious to form a company in Benton county. A meeting to inaugurate the movement was called for last night. The results were not known when the paper went to press but without doubt preliminary action was taken.

The young men at the head of the movement are not counting upon being anything but privates themselves, and are not organizing the company in order to be officers. They wish to fill out the company at once so that officers can be selected and all be in readiness to offer service to the governor.

The GAZETTE is asked to invite young men of the county, who will volunteer when the time comes, to join this company. If they will call at this office, or write, they will be directed to the committee or temporary officer appointed last night.

Governor Lord has already been notified that such a company is organizing and that it wishes to be recognized when the time comes.

The Oregon.

That was a grand and thrilling race—the steaming of the battleship Oregon around the continent to take part in the promised great naval battle of this generation. The Oregon has reported at Key West, and notwithstanding her tremendous voyage under full steam, she needed no repairs. The following poem was written by Sam. L. Simpson, of Astoria, who many years ago was editor of the GAZETTE, and was read at the launching of the Oregon near San Francisco, by Mrs. Narcissa White Kinney. It will be re-read with interest.

Oh ship, like certain Pallas armed,

Leap to his strong and proud embrace—
In Freedom's squadron take thy place!

Northward in sheen of crystal mail,

COLLEGE SPORTS.

Preparations for Field Day—Inter-collegiate Contests Saturday, June 4th.

The O. A. C. athletes and their trainer Mr. Eph. Cameron, are putting in their time in the most available manner now. The inter-collegiate field and track meet will be held at Salem one week from next Saturday and the boys realize that every day counts.

There will be four formidable teams at Salem on the fourth. Corvallis, Eugene, Newberg and Salem are making efforts to capture the cup. Billy Ray is training the Newburg sprinters and he is not slow. If the published records of the Quakers, when they met the Portland High school, are correct, Ray's men will have to be watched carefully.

Trainer Cameron knows his business and he is not making boasts, but he assured the reporter that his men are in good condition and are expecting to get a place or two.

The war has taken from the O. A. C. team some of its best men. But the boys are doing what they can to replace the loss. It is not known just how some of the material will develop, but the farmers' representatives at Salem will be about as follows:

Four hundred and forty yard run—Redd, Stiles, Edwards Saunders.

Bicycle—Krusse, Huddleston. Broad jump—Beach, Redd, Crawford, McBride, Buxton.

Shot put—Bedine, Sharp, Elgin, Pale, Walters.

Pole vault—McBride, Scoggins, Palmer Beach.

Hammer—Same as shot put. High jump—Palmer, Stiles, Redd, Beach, Smith.

Two hundred and twenty yard dash—Scoggins, Crawford, Stiles, Read, Saunders.

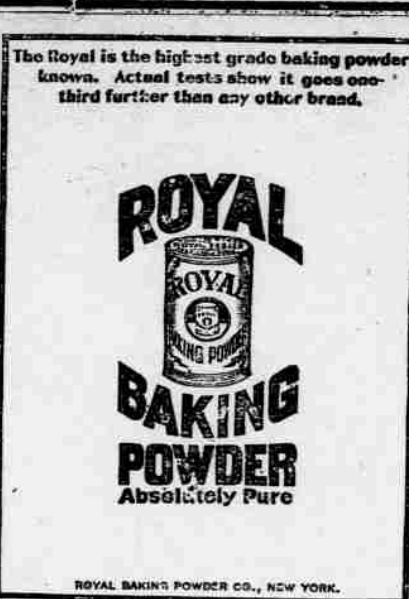
