A POWERFUL, QUIET ISSUE.

There is an issue in the Oregon gubernatorial election that has not appeared in the newspapers. It has not been raised by public speakers; yet it is an issue that will have much to do with the majority that the successful candidate will receive.

This is not an age, nor is ours a nation of religious intolerance. Men do not usually, when casting their ballot, have in mind the creed of the candidate. The American citizen is broader minded and more just than that.

But most men, though they do not profess religious convictions, have an instinctive reverence for the name of their Creator and are repelled by boasting infidelity. And many an apparently ungodly man will object to having as governor of his state one who must leave God out of his Thanksgiving proclamation.

FOR HOME AND COUNTRY.

The condition of our home affairs demands the re-election of Thos. H. Tongue to congress. It should not be necessary to convince any intelligent citizen of Benton county that Benton county needs Mr. Tongue in congress. That he is the best man for our material interests is acknowledged.

Then a vote for Tongue is a direct vote in favor of sustaining the administration in our war with Spain. That is the leading national issue. While the opposition parties are not opposed to the war, republican defeat will be construed to mean dissatisfaction with the present administration. And the action of the administration that is foremost before the public today is the prosecution of the war.

A vote for Tongue is therefore a vote for home and country. Let every voter be candid with himself and true to his real convictions, and Tongue's majority will be so decisive that the world will know we, of Oregon's first congressional district, believe in home and native land.

THE NEEDED MAN.

Prof. J. H. Ackerman is not the candidate of any book company. Mr. Lyman is the candidate of Ginn & Co., a New York book trust that is seeking to overthrow the system of books now used in the public schools, at the expense of parents and guardians.

Prof. Ackerman is a trained and devoted educator. Teaching is his life work, and from his ability in institute work he is known as the "teacher of teachers." He is a splendid organizer and administrator.

Nearly every teacher of any note or particular success in the state, without regard to politics, is working for the election of Prof. Ackerman. These teachers are familiar with the needs of Oregon's school system and know that Prof. Ackerman is the right man to put at the head of our common school system. The voters can rely upon the judgment of these men and women, who make teaching their life work.

TWO MEN.

Frank I. Dunbar, the popular candidate for secretary of state, is a competent, straightforward, intelligent and earnest man. There is no trace of the demagogue in his make-up and he commands the entire respect of those who differ with him politically as well as of his political associates.

Mr. Dunbar will get a magnificent vote in Benton county. The GAZETTE is of the opinion that democrats and populists as a rule are honest and endorse political honesty as they view it, and no intelligent, honest man of any party can endorse the actions of Kincaid.

Indeed a politician like Kincaid, an any-thing-for-office fellow, inspires as much disgust in the democratic and populist as in the republican breast. The people of Benton have a special reason for disliking Kincaid and this reason will be effective at the polls next Monday.

Judge Frank Moore has been a strong man on the supreme bench and will be re-elected.

DUTY TO THE PARTY.

There is danger sometimes in success. Time is a powerful debater and has proved in every contest that might itself is not right.

The republican opponents of Mr. John Daly are told that their opposition is almost certain to defeat him and that duty to the party demands his election. One or two Lincoln county democrats have been sent here to help instruct these republicans as to their party duty.

The republicans who oppose Daly reply that it is their duty to rid their party of wrong. It is their duty to defeat harmful political conspiracies even if this requires the defeat of a republican candidate. The crack of the party whip is heard in Lincoln and Benton counties, but it frightens none but the timid.

This contest is not one of personality. The opponents of Mr. Daly base their opposition on something which is much more substantial than personal dislike. A few silverite supporters of Daly are publishing their personal grievances against Judge Blue. On either side such political warfare is deplorable. We are not concerned in the man, but in the methods and policies he represents.

The fact that Mr. Daly is the candidate of Portland interests and will, if elected, represent Multnomah county instead of Lincoln and Benton has been fully established this week. Several hundred dollars, not less than a half a thousand, was sent to Benton county to be used, not legitimately, not for speakers, etc., not for the state or congressional tickets, but for the election of John Daly. It will be used to buy votes. This is a serious statement and the GAZETTE makes it deliberately.

Who sends this money? It is not John Daly. He has no money. It is not the citizens of Benton and Lincoln counties. It is not the candidates on the state ticket. They have no money to spend to buy votes for Mr. Daly. It is not a candidate for U. S. senator. Any one such candidate's chances are too remote to induce him to furnish funds for the election of legislators. It is furnished by politicians of Portland who believe they own the republican party and by railroad and other companies interested in legislature, who work through those politicians.

But those politicians do not own the republican party and it is most probable that the use of money in Daly's behalf will hurt him instead of helping him.

The legislation that the Portland concerns will ask is legislation that the people of Willamette valley do not want. It will be legislation for Portland and against the farmers and merchants of the rest of the state.

When the republican party has been imposed upon, it is not the duty of the republicans to allow that imposition to go unrebuked. And it may be found, when the vote are counted Monday night, that Benton and Lincoln counties have a great many solid, intelligent and independent republicans, who will not swallow poison simply because it is coated with republican sugar.

GEO. M. BROWN.

One of the most effective prosecuting attorneys this district has ever had was Mr. Brown, who is again a candidate for district attorney on the republican ticket. He is a good lawyer, a good speaker, a good reasoner and has good judgment. These all combine to make a good state's attorney.

On this office there seems to be no party lines drawn so far in the campaign. Mr. Brown has been receiving assurances of support from all classes of citizens. They know his past and have every confidence in him.

Prediction of success is not argument, but we only voice the general belief in saying that such is Mr. Brown's strength that he will easily overcome the political majority naturally against him in this district and be elected by a substantial majority.

NOT ACCIDENTAL.

Mr. Daly's paper claims that its support of King for governor was accidental. But Mr. Daly's support of Kincaid a few weeks ago was not accidental. And of all men whom any republican ought not to support this same Kincaid is the chief. Elected to the best paying office in the state, as a republican by the republicans, he betrayed the party upon the first opportunity, yet Mr. Daly wished the republicans to nominate him.

It is rather curious that Mr. Daly's strongest opponents should be gold standard republicans while his most active workers are silver democrats.

A REMARK OR TWO.

A few kind friends of this paper make it their business lately, to go about the streets making certain predictions as the fate of the GAZETTE after the election. These prophetic gentlemen have made a mistake. It is not this paper whose editor and "proprietor" is running for office.

The GAZETTE on politics and political patronage. It has managed to survive for over thirty-five years and has formed such a strong habit of existing that it probably will overcome whatever fatality there may be in this election, and whatever effect the prophecy of loving "capitalists" may have.

It is rumored, however, that the "accidental support of Fusionist King by Daly's paper may be an opening wedge for the consolidation of that organ with the TIMES after the election. There is no need of two union papers here and Daly's venture is operated at a loss, as any one knows.

Mr. Daly will have no use for his paper after election. He will return home to Portland whether elected or defeated.

LOOK A LEEDE OUDT.

We are informed by those who ought to know, that parties interested in the election of a certain fusion candidate are working up campaign scandal to spring tomorrow and election day against the republican candidate for the same office.

These stories, in their present shape, do not concern any candidate himself, but are attacks on one or more supporters of a nominee. Whose vote they expect to influence by such means is a mystery. But it may not be judgement but revenge that prompts the tales. Voters are requested to look out for these "last day" libels and brand them as they deserve. It is not necessary to warn sensible men to not be influenced by them.

ONE WE NEED.

Benton county needs Dick Nichols in the legislature. He will be a strong aggressive man for our interests and we will have interests to be looked after.

The agricultural college has no better friends anywhere than has in Dusty precinct in the person of Dick Nichols. He is a warm friend, an intelligent friend, and an effective friend of the farmers' college. Mr. Nichols will prove a capable and sensible legislator, economical and sound.

George Lilly is the only republican candidate for sheriff in the field. The men the Times is fighting are not candidates. George Lilly is running on his own merits and when elected George Lilly alone will be sheriff.

The GAZETTE "knives" no one. This paper refuses to support a Portland man for a Benton and Lincoln counties' office, though he is on the republican ticket, but makes its refusal known. We have nothing to hide, nothing to apologize for. The GAZETTE has tried to treat the opposing candidates and their friends decently and avoid personalities, but has endeavored to help all the republican candidates—with one exception.

The results of the election will be known Tuesday. That the entire republican state ticket will be elected is certain. Mr. Tongue's success is assured. Mr. Woodcock for judge is overcoming the opposition and Geo. Brown is certain to be our prosecuting attorney. In the county affairs, the outlook for the republican ticket generally is very good, but some of the races will be close.

The selection of Mr. Hilleary as master of the state grange is a square endorsement of his attitude in the freeing the state agricultural college from political influences. The master of the grange is ex-officio member of the board of regents of the college and the Oregon grange evidently believes in separating schools and partisan politics.

Republicans throughout the county should be on their guard election day against the unlawful use of money in behalf of one candidate on the legislative ticket and directly or indirectly against other republican candidates.

It is estimated that Prof. Denman will be re-elected school superintendent of Benton county by more than 400 majority. That he deserves every kind of endorsement is possible for people to bestow is admitted by his political opponents.

About Nothing.

The report is being circulated that Supt. Denman furnished the graduating class of the Blodgett school the list of questions upon which they were to be examined for graduate certificates, two weeks in advance, to let the class prepare, or in other words, the charges that the examination was a fake.

It is hardly necessary for a newspaper to defend Prof. Denman. He has friends enough all over the country to do that. But it is proper to say that the examination papers for each school are different from those of any other school. The pupils of the Blodgett school did have examination papers some time before they were examined, but not the papers on which they were examined.

The teacher of the Blodgett school desired the questions used in the examination at the Barclay school, to use as a special exercise or drill for her scholars, and they were sent to her. But the Blodgett pupils were examined on another set of questions, that they had no opportunity to "crum" on. The rumor which is circulated industriously, hardly deserves an answer, but we take the trouble to make one.

The Outlook for Wool.

The cloud on the horizon at present seems to be the uncertain attitude of the senate on the war revenue bill. There is still some dread in financial circles of flat money legislation and its serious consequences upon business. This feeling has been recently increased by the action of those members of congress who were most active in forcing the government into war before an army had been provided, and who now are subordinating to partisanship by refusing to provide the necessary war funds in a way that will enable the government to preserve its excellent credit. Owing to these causes, the timidity of capital has already resulted in failures among woolen manufacturers whose credit heretofore had been good. This would have been avoided if the splendid confidence that prevailed from the time of McKinley's election until the early part of this year had not been interrupted by the war.—Wool Journal.

Late War News.

American fleets bombarded Santiago, demolishing Morro Castle and doing much other damage. Spanish reports declare that the Iowa was injured seriously, but their claim is not confirmed. Sampson has not been heard from since the fight so the object and result of the bombardment is not known.

The invasion of Cuba by U. S. soldiers has begun; 20,000 men are now moving and 50,000 more will follow.

Spain is reported to be about at the end of her resources financially and the war will probably be brought to a speedy close.
