There were many straight ball lots cast in Benton county Monday, and many curiously scratched. The republican state ticket had majorities that showed good work on the part of the republicans.

The county ticket was mixed. E. Woodward was elected county judge by a good majority. George Denman's opponent was a fine young man and a good teacher, but Prof. Denman was re-elected school superintendent by the almost impossible majority of 650.

The number of bills was so large that it is impossible to get the list in time for publication. Among the number of those allowed were those of C. B. Ingle and W. P. Ingle, \$110 each, for witness fees and mileage in the case of State vs. Ingle.

The contractor for the Brown bridge over Mary's river was let to Geo. E. Smith for \$261,722. The contract for the two new bridges over Greasy was let to S. H. Peterson for \$100.
