The Law Governing Swine.

There has been one shooting affray the direct result of a misunderstanding of the law relating to swine running at large in Benton and Lincoln counties. Under the laws of this state in existence in 1886, it was made the duty of the county clerk of Benton county (which then embraced Lincoln county) upon the petition of two citizens to submit to the voters at the June election of that year the proposition, "For swine running at large." All this was done and the vote stood as follows: For swine running at large, 623; against swine running at large, 712; being a majority of 89 against swine running at large. That law is now void in all the territory embraced in Benton and Lincoln counties.

The grand jury failed to find an indictment against Oscar, familiarly known as "Doc" Tom, for shooting Trenholm. The grand jury investigated the matter thoroughly and evidently concluded that Mr. Tom was justified under the very law above cited.
