What is good for the aggregate of wealthy, brainy and selfish men of Portland is good for the rest of us small sized fellows. What is the use of eternally fighting Joe Simon. It is contumacious to accuse Joe Simon with being a fiend incarnate because he is a successful politician. Joe Simon has more ability and is by far a better citizen of the commonwealth than many of his detractors. He is one of the best presiding officers the Oregon senate has ever honored with the position. His opponents give him credit for being impartial and fair in the making up of the senate committees, and strictly impartial in his rulings. THE SENATORIAL CONTEST.

The Oregon Legislature has not yet disposed of the Senatorial matter, but sufficient progress has been made in the contest to warrant the statement that Mr. Corbett is likely to be defeated. In fact there was never any enthusiasm manifested over his candidacy, and among the rank and file of republican voters of Oregon his aspirations met with little favor. In this connection it is noticeable that from Multnomah county, where everything is subservient to Bossism, Mr. Corbett has a solid delegation, while among the unfettered members from the "free counties" he has developed comparatively little strength.

He is the candidate of the few residing principally in Multnomah county, and it is therefore not surprising after exhausting every resource at the command of himself and his wily managers, that he has been unable to muster more than 35 votes—40 less than enough to elect him. Opposed to Mr. Corbett, are thirty republican members, who really represent the best interest of the republican party. They insist upon the election of some capable man, who will be a credit to the party and to the State, one whose energies will be directed towards the promotion of an era of peace and good will among Oregon republicans.

They take the position, and rightly too, that the election of Mr. Corbett will be a triumph for a faction, and that a factional victory will be disastrous to the party. They want a man who has no enemies to punish and no friends to reward; whose political methods are above reproach and who has the ability and capacity to fittingly represent this young, prosperous commonwealth.

There is no dearth of senatorial talent. Among those mentioned and who would be generally acceptable to republicans, who are the peers of senators from any other State in the Union are Judge M. C. George, Genl. Geo. H. Williams, Judge Eakin, C. W. Fulton, Claude Gatch and many others. With such men to choose from there is no good reason why the republican members should not soon come to an agreement, and settle the senatorial contest satisfactorily to all concerned.

The Assembly.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 5.—The legislative assembly has not as yet decided on a United States senator, and this in itself will explain tardiness in putting through any of the more important measures, since these bills are used by the wire-pullers to force voters into line. As stated in these columns before, Mr. Nichols, of Benton, and Mr. Davis, of Lincoln, who were counted by the Corbett management as favorites of their cause, did not vote for the Multnomah candidate, and the present status of the senatorial problem is that no candidate for the position who has had a hand in the recent political muddle can secure a majority of the votes of the assembly. It is the general impression here that some person will be named for the responsible place just before the close of the session.

The bill providing for a free ferry at Corvallis, to be operated by Benton county, passed the senate Wednesday and as there is practically no opposition in the house, it will likely become a law. The committee on agriculture reported on the loss by fire of the Mechanical Hall of the O. A. C. and recommended an appropriation of \$25,000.

The state at large is greatly interested in the O. A. C., the best school for training our young people in the state, and will expect the present legislature to make a suitable appropriation. The general government has made liberal provisions for the O. A. C., and experiment station connected therewith, and this rich and growing state cannot do less than to fully meet the expectation of the nation in so fostering and building up the institution, that it will fully reach the requirements of this progressive age. No niggardly policy should be pursued. Nothing less than a generous appropriation will satisfy the needs of the hour. This college has done and will do more in the future than all the colleges in the state, toward encouraging and fully equipping the young men and women of Oregon for the industrial pursuits. Corvallis feels an honest pride in this grand institution of learning and has shown her appreciation by liberal donations in the past.

It depends upon the legislature now in session in a large measure, to say what shall be the future of the industrial department of this grand institution of learning. We are amazed that the people throughout the entire state will sanction the action of the legislature in making a large appropriation for the present need and future development of this unexcelled seat of industrial training.
