The O. A. C.'s Football Record.

The football season is again here, and the O. A. C. boys have commenced active work. All of the former suits were burned when the McMechanical Hall went up in flames, causing some little delay, but the boys took immediate steps toward getting new outfits and are now ready for work. For the last four or five evenings the boys have turned out well, and show that they mean business. Some good material is noticed among the new students. Hedges with proper training will make a good line man. The team is to be captained by Grant Elgin, the star guard of last season. Elgin played in every game engaged in by the O. A. C. last year and proved that he was worthy of the place in the team that he now holds. Among the Prune Dryers.

The Prunot orchard company have dried sixty tons of first class fruit which has all been sold at good prices and have closed down for the season having lost 4000 bushels of fine fruit because their dryer lacked capacity to dry all the crop before it spoiled.

D. C. Rose has finished drying his crop and considerable for others.

Henry Stone has finished drying a large amount of fine fruit.

Charles Blakelee's dryer has done a large business in taking care of grunes for small growers.

All of the above named dryers are now closed for the season. The honey that will be distributed in this section for this season's crop of dried prunes will no doubt reach \$25.00. Much more will be dried next season if frosts early in the spring do not interfere with the setting of the fruit. In the near future the section adjacent to Corvallis will send to market train loads of evaporated prunes, apples and pears, largely supplementing the amounts received from wheat. Up to this time the growers have not made any money out of fruit, but with larger yields and a better knowledge of how to care for the orchards and properly prepare the dried products for market, together with economical methods pursued, will ensure good profits for their years of toil, waiting and large expectations.

News and Comment.

It has been announced that two new daily papers are soon to be started in Portland to compete with the Oregonian and Telegram.

Uncle Ichabod Henkle who has just celebrated his eighty seventh birthday, was in town recently, pretty hale for a man of his age.

Col. Roosevelt has been nominated by the Republicans for Governor of New York, and he will be elected without doubt. He will make a capable chief executive for the Empire state.

The La Grande best sugar works have started up and are now turning out the saccharine products. The plant cost \$500,000 and will prove a great boon to that region should the beets raised prove to be as rich in sugar as they are said to be.

The Tillamook Headlight came out last week under the editorial management of Fred C. Baker, formerly of Troutdale, where he published a small paper. It is new and republican in politics. It promises to appear in a new dress soon, and Tillamook county ought to give it a liberal patronage.

The GAZETTE suggests that it might now be in order to read Brother Driver to hades, for the senate journals of the 1898 session, where he has said they are to be found, and urged the propriety of sending all the opponents of ex-Senator Mitchell there for them, saying they would never get back. Now since he has voted for Senator Simon, he has made himself eligible to the mission to the Philistine regions, for the purpose above mentioned, and if the same fate should overtake him as he was certain would to the ones he suggested sending, the Oregon State senator would be relieved of all the carbonic acid gas that has so polluted the atmosphere in the upper house for—these many days.

State Supt. Irwin has issued an address to the schools in regard to the Lafayette memorial fund, and asks the co-operation of teachers, pupils and citizens in raising funds for the object. It is designed to erect a monument in Paris to be paid for by the youth of America and unveiled July 4th, 1900 during the world's exposition that day being set apart as Lafayette day. Supt. Irwin recommends October 19th as Lafayette day for the schools of Oregon. Our citizens will gladly aid the school children in thus honoring the young Frenchman who so materially aided our forefathers during the Revolution in securing freedom. The monument is to cost \$250,000 and will be an emblem of the high regard in which Lafayette is now held by all Americans.

Regents Met.

Last Tuesday the Regents held a meeting in this city, eight of the thirteen members being present.

An able building committee, consisting of Apperson, Killin, Keady, and Yates, were at once elected, charged with the duty of erecting the new Mechanical Hall, being instructed by the board to build it of stone if possible.

This committee met at once and decided to begin the work immediately, and have advertised for preliminary plans and drawings. The work will be prosecuted with vigor, and the state's interests carefully guarded.

The Board of Regents passed a vote of thanks to the committee on agriculture and to Benton's delegation in the legislature for effective aid rendered in securing a liberal appropriation for this important object.
