### CITY AND COUNTY.

#### Gov. Whitaker's Lecture.

The lecture for the benefit of the Library last Friday evening by ex-Governor Whitaker was one of the most interesting of the course. The subject, "Vagrant Thoughts on Unsettled Questions," was enough of itself to attract an audience, and the Court House was well filled. The speaker stated that he had not had time to write his lecture, and spoke off hand, which made it all the more interesting. The speaker opened by showing that Nature's law are immutable, illustrating by citing many examples which are familiar to all. He showed that some objects in nature were governed as to form by surrounding circumstances—these are the minerals generally—and that rocks are a familiar illustration. Rocks presenting a regular surface have been abraded into that form, and water is the mechanical agent, as is observed on the banks of rivers. Sand is the abradings of rocks, produced by violent action of water. The sea shore is an illustration. Washed rocks and sand beds on the tops of mountains and on the high plateaus where there is now no water, prove that at some day in the past water did exist there in sufficient quantities to produce these effects. Water may be said to be the mechanics of nature—it is the active agent in producing all the changes in the earth's form. The cold age in connection with the lake theory is not satisfactory without an accepted cause of the change of temperature—no satisfactory explanation has yet been given. The rational solution is to suppose a change in the earth's polarity. The speaker adopted the Nebula Cosmogony theory of formation and supposes the magnetic poles to have been identical with the geographic poles in the earlier ages of the earth—that thousands of different masses were thrown off from the sun while but few found stable orbits, the others uniting to form the present planets or returning to the sun. In this early period the earth's equator coincided with the sun's equator—that there was a summer belt on either side of the equator and a winter region surrounding each pole—that vast quantities of snow and ice would accumulate in these winter regions, materially depleting the summer belt; animal and vegetable life appeared and one of those bodies which had been wandering through space seeking equilibrium, came in contact with the earth changing its polarity about twenty degrees. With the new relative situation of the earth, the sun's heat would stack these mountains of ice in the polar regions and send a flood into the equatorial regions, sweeping every thing before it and account for all the phenomena, and without violating nature's laws.

**DISCRIMINATION.**—The Albany Democrat is reliably informed that the O. & C. Railroad charge 50 cents per hundred for freight from Portland to Junction—a distance of 115 miles—and charge \$1 per hundred from Portland to Eugene—only 15 miles further than Junction! This is a most outrageous discrimination, and calls for wholesome legislative remedy. The Democrat might by prosecuting its inquiries further find still more discrimination. The same rate per ton is charged from Eugene to Portland as from Roseburg to Portland, about seventy-five miles further.

**TO BE DISINTERFERED.**—From the Albany Democrat we learn that the man who recently committed suicide at the depot in that city is now supposed to have been Mr. O. M. Mitchell, who left his home near Cloverdale, in this county, several weeks ago in a demented state of mind. He was last seen about the date of the suicide, near Van Wert, since which time no trace of him can be obtained. The body will probably be disinterred to determine whether it is him or not.

We are reliably informed that the suicide was not Mitchell of this county. A resident of this place who is acquainted with Mitchell saw the body at Albany, and says there was no resemblance.
