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No MONEY.—About a month ago it was announced that Messrs. Dorris, Humphrey, Walton and Hendricks had been appointed a committee to receive donations from the citizens of this county for the purpose of transporting the products of this State to the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia. The limit of time fixed for receiving donations was April 10th. Yesterday we were informed by one of the committee that not a dollar had been received. The proposition was to advance money as a loan, with the hope that the next Legislature would pass an act appropriating funds to repay the lenders. While we do not believe the Legislature will pass such an act, there is no doubt but that a good display of Oregon products at Philadelphia would be of great benefit to the State, and the work could have been assisted by even small contributions.

Council Proceedings.
Council Rooms, April 10, 1876.
Council met pursuant to ordinance.
Present, B. F. Dorris, president; councilmen Cooper, Ogden, Van Houten and Gray. Absent, Messrs. Dunn and Laurer.
Minutes of preceding meeting read and approved.
Finance Committee reported favorably on the following bills, and warrants were ordered drawn for their payment.
Robert Patterson, \$12, G. J. Boys, \$3 50; Miller & McCornack, \$7 50.
The report of the city treasurer was read and ordered to be placed on file.
The Recorder submitted a report showing the present financial condition of the city to be as follows:

The report of the President and Recorder on the election of April 3, 1875, was read, from which it appeared that the following persons were elected to the various offices, to-wit:
Trustees—S. A. Ogden, Jas. McClaren and J. F. Robinson.
Recorder—G. J. Boys.
Treasurer—Mark Stevens.
Marshal—Root Patterson.
The officers elect were duly sworn and took their seats as members of the Council. The President of the Council submitted the following:
Gentlemen.—As required by law I submit the following report for your consideration together with such suggestions as seem to me necessary and for the best interests of the city at this time.
For a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the past year I refer you to the reports of the Recorder and Treasurer. Taking the expenses of the past year as a basis for our calculations, we must provide by tax this year for the payment of \$2,600, the receipts from other sources being \$600 and over.
In order that we may arrive as nearly as possible to the sum we must provide, I respectfully recommend the reports of the Recorder and Treasurer be referred to the Finance Committee, who may possibly discover wherein our expenses may be curtailed, and how the prospective receipts of the coming year will compare with those of the year just closed.
The Council, Judicial, Police and other officers of the city frequently require legal advice and as yet no attorney has been employed to give such counsel.
Improvements were ordered and made at the expense of the city last spring and are unpaid. Street Commissioner Patterson told me this morning that he had no attorney to advise him as to the course he should pursue to recover these claims by law. In view of these facts I think the interests of the city and true economy demand the appointment of a City Attorney.
The corporate limits of the city were extended by the last Legislature, but some who were thus brought in propose to contest the legality of the act, bringing them in against their consent. If under the extension act we have the right to tax one it is our clear and bounden duty to tax all which has not been done this year. An issue is now made that in all probability must be determined by the courts. I therefore bring the matter before you that you may take such action in the premises as the case demands.
Within the last month complaints have been made to me against the Marshal for non-performance of duty in permitting the hogs belonging to the Mill Company to run at large. I have long since discovered that it is much easier to find fault with an officer than it is to perform his duties. The difficulties of the Marshal in this case are not well understood. While the law makes it his duty to take up certain animals found running at large, it also contemplates some provision in the way of a Pound to put them in, and none has been made. So if course is deserted, and I think it is, it should attach to the Council and not to the Marshal in order to obviate the recurrence of this complaint, and meet another very great evil, I would suggest that permission be obtained of the County Court to enclose the block fronting the jail, this enclosure to be aged as a pound and also by farmers when they come to town with their rags. By this provision we would prevent animals from running at large and the farmers from swarming through our streets from year's end to another. If we will not prevent cows from running at large, justice demands provision to the farmer.
I know of no contemplated improvements this year that will call for a material increase of tax, and hope none will be made so absolutely necessary. Being however on your prudence, I have concluded no expense will be incurred that will not receive the approval of a large majority of the tax-payers.
Having nothing further to suggest at this time, the foregoing is respectfully submitted for your consideration.
