The Governor having been notified that the Union University Association had complied with the law locating the State University at this place, Secretary Chadwick and State Treasurer Brown were appointed a board to examine the building, which they proceeded to do on Friday of last week. On the 1st inst. a meeting of the State Board authorized to receive the building, presided over by Governor Grover, was held, and on the report of Mesers. Chadwick and Brown the building was formally accepted. The report shows the building to have cost \$52,000. A meeting of the Board of Regents will be held no. & Monday for the purpose of fixing a time for opening the first term of school in the building, which will not be later than the third Monday in Sep-

THE ACCIDENT TO MR. HANDSAKER .- The son of Postmaster Handsaker at Goshen: While riding on the Des Chutes with his cousin, Mr. G. W. As soon as the wound was dressed, the young man was conveyed to the residence of his father, making in all a ride of ninety miles in a two-horse wagon. Dr. Shelton informed us on Tuesday he had hopes of saving the limb, and that the young man was getting along as well or better than would naturally be expected under the circumstances. About eighteen months ago Dr. Shelton amputated the leg of a younger brother of the one now injured. Mr. J. T. Handsaker has been a citizen of our State only about a year.
