Protection Against Capital.

Following is the text of the resolution introduced by Gov. Whiteaker: WHEREAS, It is the duty of the State to protect its citizens against the injustice and oppression of accumulated capital,

Resolved, by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon: First, That the creature of the law can not be above nor free from the control or restraints of the law; that the Legislature cannot create a body, person or thing which shall be above the control of the State;

Second, That the carrying trade of this State is chiefly in the hands of two corporate companies, who have entered into a combination, whereby charges are made, unjust to the shipper, ruinous to the farmer and oppressive to the productive industry of the State;

Third, That there be a Joint Committee appointed by the two Houses, consisting of two on the part of the Senate and three on the part of the House whose duty it shall be to once take the subject of these resolutions under consideration, and at their earliest convenience, prepare a bill which will remedy the evils herein complained of, and report a copy of such bill to their respective Houses.

Col. C. F. Rogers of Jefferson city, has been placed under \$5,000 bonds for complicity in the war claim frauds. The committee appointed by Congress to confer with railroad men and others concerning fast mail, is now at Chicago.

An earthquake visited Springfield, Ill., Evansville, Ind. and Louisville, Ky., at midnight on the 24th inst. No serious damage done. A scheme for manufacturing crooked whiskey in vinegar works has been discovered in Chicago, and the various works seized.
