State on this subject provides as follows: The electors for President and Vice Presi dent shall convene at the seat of government on the first Wednesday of Dec ember next after their election, at the hour of twelve of the clock at noon of that hour of twelve of the clock at noon of that day, and if there shall be any vacancy in the office of an elector, occasioned by death, re-fusal to act, neglect to attend or otherwise, the electors present shall immediately prothe electors present shall immediately pro-ceed to fill, by viva voce and plurality of votes, such vacancy in the electoral college, and when all the electors shall appear, or the vacancies, if any, shall have been filled as above provided, such electors shall proceed to perform the duties required of them by the constitution and laws of the United

The votes for the electors shall be given, received, returned and canvassed as the same are given, returned and canvassed for members of given, returned and canvassed for members of Congress. The Secretary of State shall prepare two lists of the names of the electors elected and affix the seal of the State to the same. Such lists shall be signed by the Governor and Secretary, and by the latter delivered to the college of electors at the hour of their meeting on such first Wednesday in Decem-

To make this matter still more plain it is necessary to say that the law makes it the duty of the Secretary of State, in the presence of the Governor, within thirty days after an election, and sooner if the returns be all received, to canvass the vote for member of Congress; and the Governor shall grant a certificate of election to the one having the highest number of votes, and shall also issue a proclamation declaring the election of such
