American Hops.

In the American Agriculturist for February, we find this :

The growing of hops in the United States is becoming a staple business. It has been lifted out of its previous unsettled, specula-tive character by the demand for foreign ex-port, which has now become settled and permanent. Foreign markets are now opened in to be expected that hop growers will in future taking good and bad seasons as they come, sure on an average of a fair profit for their labor. The past year's crop amounts to 130,-000 bales of 200 pounds each. Last year 60,ter of the American hop trade, and the prom-ising future that may be expected for it, we may look for a considerable increase in the processes of curing and preparing for market. The prices for the past year have averaged 27 cents per pound, which has given a very profitable result yielding from \$250 to \$300 per acre. This is not by any means the high-est yield per acre, but there are seasons when prices are much lower, and it is only by steadily perservering with his crop, through a series of years, that the grower reaps his profit, which then on the whole is satisfacto-
