Examination at the University,

The first term of the University closed last eek, and the classes in the different departnents passed through an examination. We were not present to witness the closing exer-cises, but are informed that the examination was very creditable, showing that so far as the students have advanced they have made thorough work. This being the first term the examinations could not have been as thorough in many respects as they will in the fu-ture, for all the classes had to be organized and many of the students did not enter the school until the term was half out. There are three classes in Latin and two in Greek, which recite to Prof. Johnson, the President, and they were pretty thoroughly examined, or as our informant says, literally picked to or as our miormant says, invrany pieces to pieces. The two advanced classes in Latin are reading Virgil, and the other the Latin reader, just ready to commence Caesar. They certainly did great credit to themselves and to Prof. Johnson. The class Caesar. They certainly did great credit to themselves and to Prof. Johnson. The class just commencing in Latin is composed of about thirty young ladies and gentlemen. They are well advanced in grammar and are in the first Latin reader. They were each singly examined by Prof. Johnson on the lessons they had gone over in the grammar and reader and stood the test of a thorough hackling admirably. If they go through a course of four years as thorough as they have a support. ling admirably. If they go through a course of four years as thorough as they have com-menced they will be masters of the language. The classes in Greek are equally as thorough as the class in Latin. The examination in mathematics was very fine and thorough, considering the opportunities the classes had during the term. The classes in Algebra had both oral and written examinations, and each student indicated that they thorougly understood all they had passed over. All the classes in mathematics did great credit to themselves and much honor to Prof. Baily, who has that chair in the University. It was impossible for us to know how each at the same place on Saturday, March 10th, student succeeded in the written examination, at 1 r. M. for we could not see all the work, but we are R.R. Rounns, Sec'y. informed the standing was generally as high as in the oral examination. The problems in Algebra given to the class to solve were the

Algebra given to the class to solve were the same given to the freshmen class at Yale College last year.

The advanced class in Geography under the charge of Prof. Condon did splendidly. The class numbered about thirty and each one was required to draw a slip of paper from that with a number written on it and then a hat with a number written on it, and then was handed by the Professor a slip of paper containing the name of some state, continent, sea or lake which they were required to draw on the black board from memory, put-ting down all the mountains, rivers, lakes, and chief cities; then bound the same and tell the names of its rivers, lakes, mountains, and cities. It was very pleasing to see how correctly the maps were drawn The fact is they are perfect masters of the part of geography they have passed over. Prof. Condon makes thorough work, and in his department that we have been applied in the State. in science cannot be excelled in the State. The examinations in the Preparatory department were equally as good and thorough as in the Collegiate. We cannot name each class of this department, but all examined in grammar, arithmetic, reading and geography indi-cated that the work had been done thoroughly.
