Swamp Lands.

Congress has, at various times since, granted the State large tracts of land to aid in the construction of various railroads and military roads, and the case decided by Judge Boise goes to this extent: that grants of land to these various corporations did not include the swamp and overflowed lands previously granted to the State, but were to the exclusion of these lands.

The case of Mr. Owens is considered a test case, and with the above result, and should Judge Boise's opinion be affirmed, will result in great loss to these corporations, but in great gain to the State. We are informed that the late Oregon Central Military Road Company, commencing at Engage City and Company, commencing at Eugene City and extending to the castern line of the State, had some 250,000 acres of these lands, which has some years value by are very valuable, on the fine of the road which Mr. Owens has filed on.

It seems that about a year ago the road company disincorporated and sold their lands to a stock company in California who will find their investment an exceedingly profitless one, and the taxes which they have paid for years will be a total loss to them. Mr. Owens, I understand, has filed on some one and a half million acres of these lands in different portions of the State, and now deems himself the owner of these swamp and overflowed
