It seems that Barr kept a country store and claimed to have received the money in the regular course of his business, not knowing it to be spurious. After having accumulated a considerable amount, he offered it in payment for goods to furnish his store, when he was arrested, tried and convicted. The petition was signed by a great many prominent citizens and business men of Douglas county.

**A BEAT.**—The Mercury says: "A worthless bummer calling himself Crocker, who is imposing upon the people by representing himself as having been banished out of Eugene. His wife dropped dead, leaving four motherless children, for whom he is trying to find homes. His appeal is always wound up by asking for shirts and other clothing for himself, and he seems to make a point of going to houses when the head of the family may be absent, the better to work upon the sympathies of the ladies. This man needs locking after by the city officers and placed where his vagrancy will not give annoyance to the citizens." This same bummer was tramping through the country in this vicinity a few weeks ago, making the same representations, only that he then led from Douglas county. The fellow is an unmitigated hulk, and should be assailed by the energetic application of a No. 13 boot.

### COLD NEWS.

A man by the name of Geo. Johnson, residing in East Portland, hired a span of horses of Sir. John Sawyer, last Saturday noon, and brought them back Sunday noon in such a demoralized condition from hard driving that one died that night.

From the Mountain Sentinel we learn the following particulars of an accident that happened to Jasper N. Matteny, formerly Sheriff of Marion county. He is at present stopping at the residence of J. T. McComas, near Casser City. The ball, it seems, entered the right thigh near the groin and came out just above the knee on the right side, cutting the main artery and causing a great loss of blood. Dr. Lloyd did the leg open in order to allow it to sluff the collected matter, which operation immediately relieved him. We are pleased to learn that Mr. M. is doing well, and it is hoped he will be able to walk in a few days.

From Dr. Weatherford, says the statesman, who has just returned from a tour of the mines on the Santiam, we learn of the progress of a mining enterprise in which Messrs. Dancy, Brown and Ed. Santa, of Albany, and Jas. A. Smith, of Astoria, are interested. The place of their operations is at a point where the canal fork of the Santiam cuts a gorge through the mountain. This Canal Fork empties into the North Fork of the South Fork of the Santiam. In the gorge above mentioned are great holes or ketts, thought to be from twenty to thirty feet deep, and in the bottom gold is expected to be found, and some of them that were easy of access have already been cleaned out and packed with the company having dug an average depth of fifteen feet for the purpose of turning the river. The last work done on the ditch was to plant a mine of several kegs of giant powder around it. The explosion was sufficient to blow out the head of the ditch and allow the water to rush through, which it did. Dam were then built, both above and below the ketts so that no water could get in. Eight hundred feet of hoise has been borrowed from the Albany fire department, with which the mine is to be sprung of the water in the ketts. By this means they will get at the ore where the gold is stored up, waiting to be taken by these enterprising seekers.

The Jacksonville centinel of the 1st inst. has the following: "This community was startled on Monday evening by the report that Peter Ottoboni and Herman Kirnie had both been found dead. They have been partners in a mining claim on Gull's creek for a number of years, and are both well known in this place. It seems that on Monday afternoon about five o'clock the Peter brothers, who live about a half mile from their claim, went up to spend the afternoon with them, and when next their place was seen Kirnie lying outside of the claim with a newspaper before him, apparently reading. They called him and asked what he was doing. In the location, and receiving no answer, they went to him and found that he had been shot in the neck with buckshot and was dead. They then called Ottoboni, and not seeing or hearing anything of him, they went into the claim and found him on the floor, in a sitting posture, with a shot-pipe leaning against him, still pointed at his head, and life extinct. Goodfell went to town immediately to notify the coroner, who went to the scene of the tragedy the next morning and held an inquest. The verdict was that Kirnie came to his death at the hands of Peter Ottoboni, and that Ottoboni then committed suicide. Both parties have always borne the reputation of being law-abiding citizens, but they have quarrelled between themselves on late and this is probably the cause of the sad affair. They were both natives of Saxony; Ottoboni was about 54 years of age, and Kirnie was about 40. Their remains were brought to town on Monday evening in a cart of horse-drawn machinery.
