VAGS, TAKE NOTICE.—The City Council, on Monday evening passed an ordinance for the arrest, fine and imprisonment of all persons loafing around town who follow no employment nor have any visible means of support, and our city officers are determined to strictly enforce this law.

Somewhere in his travels he picked up a deputy U. S. Marshal, and consequently came back in good company.

THE WYMAN.—According to notice published last week, the Wyman gave one of their unique entertainments at Lane's Hall on Thursday evening to a good house. Alf's personation of the Dutch Peasant Girl, and little Lulu's song—"Too Sharp for Me," and "Pretty as a Picture"—were worth the price of admission, and their personation of Irish character was inimitable. Every act elicited bursts of applause from the audience.

CARTOIS.—The City Council passed an ordinance at their regular meeting on Monday evening requiring all peddlers and itinerant dealers to take out license before selling their wares within the corporate limits of the town. Such an ordinance should have been enacted long ago for the protection of the permanent business men of the town who pay taxes, or license fees, to sustain the city government.

THE WHEAT CROP.—We hear complaints from all parts of the country of injury to the wheat crop by rust. Fall sown wheat was not affected, or at least not enough to do any serious injury, but the spring sown, almost without exception, is badly damaged, very late sown wheat, in many cases, not being worth harvesting, and that which is, the grain is very much shriveled and of an inferior quality.

Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL ROOMS, EUGENE CITY, August 13, 1877. Council met pursuant to ordinance.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and adopted. The Finance Committee reported favorably on the following bills, and warrants were ordered for their payment: P. H. Farrell, \$1; Journal, \$6; S. H. Christian, \$10, and Abrams Bros. \$15 25.

The Marshal reported progress in the collection of taxes, and on motion, he was allowed sixty days additional in which to make his final returns. A duplicate warrant for \$17 50 was ordered in favor of Mr. Geo. Humphrey, and measures to secure the cancellation of the last original, were adopted.

All new bills against the city were referred to the Committee on Finance. C. W. Fitch, Esq., as attorney for the city to collect the claim against the Bloomfield estate, reported the receipt of sixty-five dollars, and on motion, he was allowed \$20 for his services.

An ordinance to prevent and punish vagrancy, was unanimously adopted, and a further ordinance to license peddlers and other itinerant vendors.

The business of the evening having been completed, the Council adjourned to meet on the 2d Monday of September, 1877.

Mrs. Rubell came in from Roseburg on Monday, after an absence of several months. Billy Lemons, formerly of this place, but a resident of Nevada, came to town last Saturday.

Mr. Charles Lauer and family returned on Monday from Clatsop, where they have been sojourning for several weeks. Messrs. T. G. Hendricks and family, and A. Goldsmith, started to San Francisco on Monday, to replenish their stocks of goods.

Prof. Condon and Charles Waitaker, who went east of the mountains on a scenic excursion several weeks ago, returned this week, with a valuable collection of fossils. Hoodlumism.—One night this week, while an itinerant vender of soap was crying his wares on the street, some hoodlum or hoodlums, who had no regard for their own reputation nor the credit of the community, threw eggs at him.

It is their fault as much as his. It is his business to fish for gudgeons, and if they are silly enough to nibble at his bait, it is their own fault if they get hooked. If one of these fellows comes to town and violates the law, the law is amply sufficient to set him right without resorting to any blackguard means to accomplish the purpose.
