This bridge is very much needed, and will be a very great convenience to the traveling public.

There is considerable feeling manifested in regard to this case in the community where regard to this case in the community where that a great many of the most respectable citizens of that vicinity shout the idea that he had any evil intent whatsoever, and express surprise that he was held by the magistrate making the preliminary examination. The prisoner's counsel applied for a new hearing in the case but the motion was denied by the Court. It seems unreasonable that a man fifty years old, and having little girls of his own, would attempt such an outrage, and if he did, is a more fit subject for the insane asylum than the State Prison. We learn that some of the citizens intend immediately taking the inquiry steps to secure executive clemency in his case.
