### Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL ROOMS, EUGENE CITY, Jan. 14, 1878.  
Council met pursuant to adjournment.  
President Durris in the chair. Councilmen all present. In attendance, Marshal Farrell and Recorder Fagan.  
Minutes of December 10th, 1877, read and adopted.

On motion, the following bills reported by the Finance Committee, were allowed, and warrants for their payment ordered:  
E. J. McClanahan, \$10 50; Dunn & Stratton, \$37 65; J. W. Christian, \$22 50; Astor House, (DuBois), \$6; Robt. Fagan, \$6 25; Robinson & Church, \$7 25; M. C. Felch, \$3; T. G. Hendricks, \$26 75; S. A. Ogden, \$51 50; William Smith, \$45; P. H. Farrell, \$85.

The petition of Jas. Humphrey and others, for a sidewalk on the south side of Fifth street, between Olive and Charnelton streets, was read and granted.

The proposition of Fitch & Fagan for the use of their office as council room, was received and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

There being no objection, all new bills against the city, were referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion, a crosswalk on Eleventh street, at the west side of Willamette street, was ordered.

The business of the evening having been completed, the Council adjourned to the 24 Monday in February.

MURDERER ARRESTED.—Nearly nine months ago Henry Wheelock, a wealthy farmer residing within three miles of Chico, California, was murdered under peculiar circumstances and the body hidden by the murderer, who succeeded in making his escape to this State. Ever since the commission of the murder detectives have been working the case up. Two or three months ago the skeleton of the murdered man was found, and from certain circumstances connected with the disappearance of Wheelock, suspicion pointed to a man named John Green, who disappeared about the time of the murder. After a long search it was ascertained that Green was living at Loon Lake in Douglas county. Deputy Sheriff Hagan, of Butte county, California, was dispatched to make the arrest, who, accompanied by Sheriff Noble of Douglas county, started from Roseburg last week, and after traveling 60 miles found the old man living in a cabin, thirty miles from any neighbor, and arrested him. Green is 65 years old, and our informant, who came down on the train with him last Tuesday, says he very carelessly remarked that if they did hang him it would not rob him of many days, as he already had "one foot in the grave."

CAUGHT.—Last Tuesday night three burglars broke into the office of Mr. G. W. Gray, in Salem, and while working to open the safe were surprised by officer Minto, of Salem, and officers McCoy and Day, of Portland, who succeeded in capturing one, the others making their escape. All the thieves are known and without doubt will be eventually captured.

CAVORTS.—These pests have been very troublesome in some parts of the county this winter and the farmers in several neighborhoods have organized a crusade against the "varmints." We learn that there have been quite a number trapped on Cayote Ridge, one carrying the trap off, and two or three days afterwards was taken in while chasing a band of sheep, the trap still hanging to his leg.

The Salem Daily Record of the 13th, says that from parties who came over from Dallas last evening we learn that a great deal of excitement exists over there in regard to Grayson; that a few nights ago two persons came to the hotel by the long bridge on horseback, and inquired where a certain Mr. Grayson resided at, in that place. The parties seemed somewhat excited, and acted rather curious. After obtaining the desired information they left the hotel, and at an early hour in the morning one of the parties passed the hotel, riding one horse and leading the other, with a saddle or. It is now supposed that one of the parties was Grayson, the murderer, who escaped from officer Cherry, in Portland, a few days ago. Cherry has given up the chase and gone to Frisco, and Grayson is still at large.
