## Springfield Correspondence.

SPRINGFIELD, March 28, 1878.

ED. GUARD.—During the past week we have been highly favored with lectures, sermons, etc. About a week ago, Mrs. Lake, claiming to be the relic of some deceased Catholic priest, and Mr. Peck, her present reputed husband, came to town. The first evening the lady was billed for her very able lecture, "Romanism," but owing to "there not being from three hundred to eight hundred" present, the lady excused herself from delivering the lecture and gave some readings—which probably suited the audience as well as could have been expected, especially when they were not looking for anything in that line. A couple of sermons were held by the pair, at which from eighteen to twenty outsiders were admitted, at the customary price of one dollar per head. The sermons were held in a dark room, and all searchers after truth sat in a circle, while the spirits would playfully pat them on the head, legs, etc. The couple left for the south on Monday or Tuesday. For nearly a week Dr. Busby, a blind phrenologist, has been feeling the bumps of our wise men, and delivering lectures. He has also delivered a couple of lectures against spiritualism.

The collector of customs arrived in town on Wednesday, and in all probability everything relating to the nomination of a ticket which shall do credit and honor to those concerned will be done. It is confidently expected that some of the eminent ability of Lane county sent to the Legislature at the last session can be prevailed upon to "represent" our people again. But if they cannot be counted upon to sacrifice their own desires for peace and quiet at home in preference to the arduous cause of State, why, then, we shall have to look somewhere else. But you can count upon Springfield in the future as in the past—she will furnish no second-class material; she will send the best men to be had, or else step modestly aside and allow the honors to fall to some other part of the county.

The position of sheriff seems to present more attraction than any other, judging from the number of would-be candidates; as yet, our town has only developed two—one on each side. If every precinct does as well the balance of the ticket will be arranged very easily. It is to be presumed that each one thinks his chances better for an election than any of the others; and that each one imagines he is the only one 'schin' for the position.

Several families here will start for the Palouse country as soon as the road is free from snow on the mountains.

Some of our farmers are about through seeding, and others, again, have not yet finished plowing. It is safe to calculate, however, that the crop will be put in much earlier than last year.

## CORRESPONDENCE.

ED. GUARD.—While there seems to be considerable interest taken concerning nominations for the various county offices, as yet there has been no intimation concerning the nomination for School Superintendent. It is my opinion that the people of Lane county, as a rule, vote not so much for party principles as for the competency of the candidate to fill the office for which he is chosen. Taking this view of the case, and remembering, as well, that our facilities for first-class teachers are superior to nearly any other county in the State, duty demands of us a wise selection for this very important station. Therefore we suggest to the voters of Lane county the propriety of making the present School Superintendent his own successor in the office he has filled to the satisfaction of all. But while making this suggestion, we do not know that Dr. Bolon would accept the nomination, having never conferred with him on the subject. But one thing we do know, judging from public sentiment, that if brought to the front again as a candidate his opponent is likely to become worse p. n. c. stricken than was the pioneer candidate on the Republican ticket two years ago, after canvassing the vote cast at Junction City, where the Doctor was at that time best known.
