On motion, A. J. Doak was selected as chairman and A. J. Barlow, Secretary. The chairman stated the object of the meeting to be the election of two delegates to attend the County Convention. The Convention then proceeded to elect A. J. Doak and Thomas Jenkins as delegates. On motion, a committee of three, consisting of A. J. Barlow, Thomas Jenkins and James Heatherly on resolutions. The committee appointed submitted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we favor economy in the administration of the Government both State and National.
Resolved, That we are unalterably opposed to the foul, unlawful and unjust means through which R. B. Hayes was made President of the United States.
Resolved, That we regard the matter of finance to be of such vast importance that we concede to the Western States, where the commercial wealth of the Nation lies, the right to define the policy of the Democratic party on that momentous question.
F. M. Nighswander was nominated for Justice of the Peace, and Thos. Jenkins for Constable. A motion to organize a Democratic club was then unanimously agreed upon, and Saturday, the 20th day of April was selected as the day of organizing the club: F. M. Nighswander then made a way up speech, whereupon the Convention adjourned. A. J. DOAK, Chairman.
