The excitement that usually attends commencement week ran high in our little city during the entire present week and the auditorium of the University was filled to its utmost capacity during each evening's exercises. The opening exercises of the week was the exhibition of the preparatory department under the charge of Mrs. Spiller and Miss Lizzie Boise, on last Wednesday evening. Long before the hour for the exercises to commence had arrived, the large and occasional auditorium of the University was crowded by the citizens of our town and surrounding country, and promptly at 8 o'clock, the hour appointed, the members of the preparatory department marched into the room to dwell the keeping exact time to the music of the Eugene String Band. The exercises were opened with a song by the members of Miss Boise's room; then followed declamations, recitations, essays, papers, music and various other exercises. The literary exercises closing with a recitation in concert by the members of Mrs. Spiller's room. The whole concluded with a calisthenic exercise by the entire school, marching and counter-marching to the music of the string band. We regret that space forbids our making special mention of each one upon those who participated in the exercises, but can only say that the entire exhibition was a decided success and reflects great credit not only upon those who participated in it, but also upon Mrs. Spiller and Miss Boise who had charge of the training of the school.

TWO YEARS FOR FORGERY.—T. J. Blake, who is quite widely known on this coast, and who taught several terms of school in this county several years ago, was sentenced to the Penitentiary last Monday for two years for Multnomah county for the crime of forgery. Blake is a man of good education, and years ago was a fine talker and writer, moving in the best circles of society. He has traveled extensively on the Pacific coast, and was an excellent mining expert. For a long time, however, he has been on the downward road, accelerating his speed as much as possible by spending all he could earn or "bum" for whisky. He is about sixty years old, and two years will be about time enough for the bad whisky which he has taken in the last fifteen years to get out of his system.

DOUBLE HOMICIDE.—Particulars of a double homicide which occurred at Salmon river, over on the coast, last Saturday, has just been received: A white man named Perry Dodson, formerly a resident of this county, it appears had a quarrel with an Indian about some beef cattle. The Oregonian says the two men met on a narrow trail near the coast when the altercation began. Words led to blows, when Dodson and the Indian grappled. The Indian was armed with a knife which he used with murderous purpose. He stabbed Dodson several times about the shoulder and back of the neck. Finding that he was getting the worst of the fight, Dodson drew his revolver and shot the Indian, killing him instantly. The affray was witnessed by two white men and ten Indians. Several of the Indians assailed Dodson after he killed his antagonist. They grappled and struggled for some moments, when one of the Indians picked up a shotgun, heavily charged with buckshot, and discharged it, the contents taking effect in Dodson's back. Death followed instantaneously. The two white men who were witnesses attempted to interfere to protect Dodson before he was killed; but they were immediately set upon by a number of the Indians who overpowered them and held them until the fatal shot was given. No violence was offered the two men, the Indians simply holding them fast. After Dodson was killed, the Indians let the two white men go, mounting their poles, rode rapidly away. Chief Sam, of the Nestucks, was present during the affray, but did not offer to interfere to prevent bloodshed. Soon after the double tragedy the men left the scene. One of them mounted a horse and rode post-haste to Dallas to notify the authorities there of the affair. On reaching that place it was ascertained that the crime had not been committed in Polk county, so he rode on over to Salem to procure a bench warrant from Judge Boise. It is not improbable that serious difficulty may result from the tragical affair.

Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL ROOMS, EUGENE CITY, June 17, 1878.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. Present—Councilmen Cooper, Dunn, Sloan, Underwood, Hendricks and Edris, Marshall Farrell and Recorder Alexander. Absent, President Dorris. Council organized with Recorder Alexander in the chair.

The Finance Committee reported favorably upon the following bills and the Recorder was ordered to issue warrants for their payment: Robt. Eagan, \$4.00; William Christian, \$7.00; Alexander Bros, \$6.50; Robinson & Church, \$6.00; Jas. Belval, \$2.00; P. H. Farrell, \$4.00; J. W. Christian, \$6.00; J. B. Alexander, \$3.80; Wm. Christian, \$5.00.

On motion it was ordered that an eight-foot sidewalk be constructed from the northeast corner of Oak and Ninth streets to the Journal office, and the Street Commissioner was ordered to have the same constructed immediately.

The petition of A. Lynch for the construction of a cross walk on Tenth and Olive streets, and also on alley crossing between the property of the Petitioner and Killingsworth's was granted.

On motion the Street Commissioner was instructed to have all the streets cleared and sidewalks and crossings repaired upon the line of march advertised for the Fourth of July procession before that time.

On motion the Committee on Streets (at their option) are authorized to sprinkle the streets on the morning of the Fourth of July.

The following bills were presented, and on motion were referred to the Finance Committee: P. H. Farrell, \$39.02; T. G. Hendricks \$32.75; J. M. Christian \$6.00.

The Recorder filed his report of the assessment of the city. Report accepted and ordered on file.

On motion a tax of four mills was ordered for current expenses of city government, and two mills for fire purposes.

On motion Council adjourned till Monday evening, June 24th 1878.
