Martin Grain, a Swede, comparatively a stranger in Astoria, but employed in the Astoria fishery, lost his life on Wednesday night by an effort to fish on the bar, or by accidentally drifting to that locality in a small boat. It appears, says the Astorian, that he threw out his net on the south side of Sand Island, and drifting down past the island, was caught by the breakers, and the boat which was one of the largest and best ones of the large Kinney cannery, was completely turned over end-wise, throwing both men and every movable thing into the sea. The cries of the men were distinctly heard, and one of J. J. Melger & Co's boats near by went to their relief, saving the boat puller, the net and boat, but Martin Grain was lost.

We clip the following from the Sacramento Record-Union:

Winnemucca, July 24.—C. C. Small has arrived from Harney. He was at Catalina valley when the hostiles were in that vicinity, and in company with Peter Delore started to Harney, the nearest place of safety. On the way they discovered the hostiles near Stein Mountain, and in endeavoring to avoid them met Colonel Bernard's command. They informed the troops of the whereabouts of the Indians, and Bernard attacked them at 10 o'clock at night. The Indians were taken by surprise, and being camped near a hill the troops had the advantage of position. Though they were greatly outnumbered by the Indians, who were estimated to be 800 strong, with at least 1,000 horses. The fight lasted two hours, when Bernard withdrew, leaving three soldiers and one citizen dead on the field. Thirty-five Indians were found dead next day, among them one who lay beside a horse belonging to Tom Dixon, who was killed by the Indians a few days before the fight. The Indians abandoned their camp in the night, leaving many horses, among them, twenty-five stolen from French Pete, about sixty beavers, and much sugar, coffee and dried fruit taken from despoiled ranches. Small says a team of horses which Tom Dixon had been driving at the time he was attacked by the hostiles was sold to the Government at Harney by a white man. Settlers who have sought refuge at the post recognized the horses before the seller had time to escape, and he was arrested. This is almost conclusive evidence that white men are with the hostiles.

The Bee of the 14th says that two Chinese boys, one of whom had his head terribly bruised and the skull fractured, appeared at the city jail yesterday, and informed the officer that they had been discharged by the man for whom they had been working, near Conner's landing, on the Willamette river, about eight miles above town; and, while walking to the city at one o'clock in the afternoon, they were attacked by a man, who came out of the brush. He struck one with a large rock and knocked him down, several times repeating the blow, and when his victim was rendered unconscious, robbed him of \$39—all the money in his possession. The other boy, seeing the conduct of the highwayman, fled swiftly and hid in the woods until the ruffian departed, when he assisted his comrade to town. A description of the marauder was given, and the police are endeavoring to discover his whereabouts. There are several of these scoundrels in the city, and the public is warned against them.

HOOD RIVER, July 8, 1878.

ED. GUARD.—Dear Sir: In passing through Albany some two months ago I met several gentlemen of the Albany B. R. club, and in conversation with me they expressed themselves very sorry that any misunderstanding had occurred between them and the Eugene base ball boys. In speaking of the articles which appeared in the Albany papers, they assured me that the club was only responsible for one—the first, in the Record; and that they entirely and unanimously disapproved of all others. This they wished me to say through the columns of your paper, and even at this late day I ask permission to do so and believe that the "boys" have told me the plain, unvarnished truth. Mr. Editor, I am convinced if it had not been for the intermeddling of persons who had nothing to do whatever with playing the game, there would have been no unpleasantness between the members of the two clubs. I know that the Eugene "boys" did everything in their power to make the Albany "boys" at home, when the latter went to Eugene, because I was an OUTCAST with the entire proceedings. I am quite sure that the Albany boys appreciated their kindness and entertained no other feeling towards their opponents than that, which, tinged with the bitterness of defeat everyone, under similar circumstances, always experiences. I know the Eugene boys meant right; I think the Albany boys did. Hood River empties into the Columbia about 20 miles from the Dalles. It comes rushing and tumbling direct from Mt. Hood, cold as ice and abounding in excellent fish. The principal part of the valley lies on the west side of the river. It is all, more or less, timber land, but when cleared is excellently adapted to the raising of fruits. The Hood River peaches are the finest in the market. There is plenty of room here for enterprising families. Land can be bought at a low figure, and I am convinced will eventually be valuable. The climate in the summer is the most delightful I ever saw; it is never hot. The wind blows most constantly, and the air is so dry that one cannot catch cold. Cultivation is carried on by means of irrigation, as no rain, to call rain, falls throughout the summer. Settlers are coming in all the time. We have heretofore had two saw mills here. One, the large steam one, owned by the Lucky brothers, formerly of Eugene, burned down the other day. The loss was considerable, but I understand from Mr. Lucky that they intend rebuilding. Lumber can be had at the mill, rough, for \$10 per thousand. We celebrated the 4th here, we did. The Dalles came down and helped us celebrate. We played the Dalles boys a game of ball. It was a hard match. Score 16 to 17 in our favor. Time two hours and thirty-seven minutes. After the match, four of the prettiest of the Hood River girls, dressed in appropriate costume, prepared a handsome table with every delicacy, thereon under the spreading branches of a majestic oak for the hungry players. Did we do justice? Echo answers—Yours truly, JOHN L. HENDERSON.
