CINNABAR MINES IN DOUGLAS COUNTY.—The attention of the public is called to the ad. in our columns of the quicksilver mining company just started, under the auspices of some of our own citizens, in Douglas county, Oregon.

Wheat, flour and other products exported to the Sandwich Islands, Puget Sound, British Columbia, Alaska, and elsewhere, valued at \$637,636.

Gold and silver products of Oregon mines for the year ending August 1 1878, valued at \$1,280,866.

Other products, principally cattle, to the Eastern States, valued at \$270,000.

This shows a total export trade for 1877-8 of \$14,644,975, an increase over 1876-7 of \$3,073,618.

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Exports from Oregon.

The following, from a recent report of the Portland Board of Trade, is a synopsis of the exports from Oregon during the years 1877-8:

Salmon exports to San Francisco for 1877-8, 171,324 cases, valued at \$980,956.

Wheat, flour, oats, hops, potatoes, lumber, hides, pickled salmon, treasure, and all other domestic products, except coal and wool, from the Columbia river to San Francisco, valued at \$3,765,687.

Coals, lumber and other products from Coos Bay and the coast of Oregon, valued at \$369,687.

Wool, via San Francisco, value, \$908,303. A grand total via San Francisco of \$6,124,491—an increase over the exports of 1876-7 of \$735,299.

Wheat and flour exports direct to the United Kingdom—112,697 tons of wheat, and 32,617 barrels of flour, valued at \$4,872,327.

Canned salmon export direct from the Columbia river to Great Britain, valued at \$1,326,056. Beef and mutton-canned and un-canned—valued at \$143,895.
