COUNCIL ROOMS.

EUGENE CITY, Oct. 14, 1878.

Council met pursuant to ordinance.

Present—Councilmen Underwood, Dunn, Edris, Hendricks and Sloan, Marshal Farrell and Recorder Alexander, the Recorder presiding.

Absent—President Dorris and Councilman Cooper.

The proceedings of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Judiciary Committee reported the following bills correct, and the Recorder was instructed to draw warrants on the Treasurer for their payment, to-wit:

S. A. Ogden, \$6 50; M. C. Felch, \$2 50; F. B. Dunn, \$25; Dunn & Stratton, \$21 50; J. B. Alexander, \$6; P. H. Farrell, \$18; James Warnick, \$12.

The Judiciary Committee reported on the petition in regard to peddler's license without recommendation, and report accepted and ordered filed.

The Committee on Fire and Water asked for further time to report, which was granted.

On motion, the Fire Warden was authorized to employ an attorney to prosecute all infractions of the fire ordinance, at a fee of \$10 before the Recorder, and \$25 before the Circuit Court.

On motion, the Chairman of the Committee on Fire and Water was instructed to make further inquiries in regard to the purchase of a No. 5 fire engine at Portland, and report at his earliest convenience.

A petition for the graveling of Seventh street, between Olive and High streets, was received, and, on motion, the prayer of said petition was granted; the gravel to be three loads wide in the center of the street.

On motion, the Street Commissioner was instructed to examine the sewer opposite the brewery, and cause it to be repaired; also to gravel Oak street from Ninth to the public grounds; also the alley between Oak and Willamette streets, from Ninth street to the public grounds; and also the alley between Willamette and Olive streets, from Eighth to Ninth streets. The gravel on Oak street to be four loads wide, and in the alleys two loads wide.

On motion, the Committee on Streets were authorized to order such repairs to be made on Willamette and Eighth streets as they may deem necessary.

On motion, Dunn, Lockwood and Walton were allowed an extension of one month's time for the completion of the fence ordered, as per contract with the County Court.

On motion, it was ordered that a new sidewalk be built from Pearl street to the mill race, on the south side of Ninth street.

On motion, it was ordered that cross-walks, three feet wide, be built on the west side of Charnelton, across Ninth street, also across Charnelton on the south side of Ninth street.

UNIVERSITY.—The Regents of the University purchased a first-class Steinway piano, and placed it in the chapel for the use of the students. The instrument was purchased of Mr. Albert Bartsch of Portland, and is said to be a fine toned instrument. It will add very much to the interest of the school. The Board of Regents and Faculty are leaving nothing undone that will make the State University the first institution of learning in the State, and the most desirable place for students to go for a thorough education.

The Oregonian says: Monday afternoon a man named Harris employed at the ice works in this city met with a very severe accident. Harris was attempting, unassisted, to manipulate a heavy iron retort that rested upon an incline several feet from the ground. The effort was too much for his strength, and coming from the incline, the unwieldy instrument rolled down the incline, and one of the long sharp horns with which it was ornamented, tearing its way through Harris' flesh from the thigh to the ankle, inflicted a deep ragged wound a couple of inches deep and nearly two feet in length. The agony he endured obliged him to retreat still further, when the monstrous weight fell upon his foot and crushed to a jelly the bones of the great toe.

DEATH OF THOS. M. GALE.—Thomas M. Gale died at his residence in Ashland, Jackson county, on the 10th inst. He was born in Davis county, Iowa, September 2d, 1842. Came with his parents to Oregon in 1852. Lived with them in Lane county until he was 21 years of age. He and his brother Henry edited and published the Ensign at Roseburg for a number of years. He was a young man of more than ordinary ability, a sprightly, witty writer, which made his paper readable and pleasant. He was appointed Deputy United States Revenue Assessor for this district, and held that position until the office was abolished. He had a warm heart, a genial and kind disposition, which made him a host of friends. He leaves many friends and relations to regret a mourn his untimely death.

Arrest of Johnson.

The Standard says that it will be with no small degree of satisfaction, our readers will learn of the capture of Johnson, the last of the O'Shaughnessy robbers. The authorities at once after the affair promptly offered a reward, and took immediate steps to prevent their escape by publishing complete descriptions. Swards and Avery were captured, a photograph of Johnson was obtained and numerous copies taken from it, and distributed, together with his description, throughout the States and Territories. Time passed and no Johnson turned up. Some of the officials concluded that Johnson had wandered back into the mountains, and becoming weak from want of food, had perished. Not so, however, he was too sharp for that. He must have made his way to some point on the river and taken passage on a steamer, sailed for San Francisco. Friday night last Captain Kelly, of the police force, was astonished to receive a telegram from Emil Harris, chief of police of Los Angeles, saying: "I have James Johnson. Do you want him?" This answer went skipping along the wires: "Yes, there is \$500 reward and full for his apprehension." Kelly, to make sure of no mistake, sent another as follows: "Are you certain he is the right man. Look for 'F. T.' on left leg." Chief Harris responded: "I am sure. He has acknowledged everything, and has the letters 'F. T.' on left leg." Kelly again telegraphed, "Keep him safely. We will forward a man with the necessary papers immediately, who will return with him to Portland." The uncertainty about Johnson has now ended and the ruffianly trio, Johnson, Brown and Swartz will together answer the terrible crime charged. Officer Hudson has gone to bring him up.

Mr. Eugene Shelby, Wells Fargo & Co.'s express agent on the O. C. R. E., says the Statesman of the 16th, related to us yesterday that as the train stopped at Harbursburg he was informed that the community was considerably excited over the news that the body of an unknown man had been found a short distance from that place, in a straw stack which had been lately burned. The charred remains presented a ghastly appearance when discovered. Who the man was, or how he came to be in such a condition, as yet remains a mystery.
