

Political Infamy.

The editor of the Baltimore Gazette, in alluding to the practical workings of the great fraud, says: True to its promise, the New York Tribune came ambling down to the footlights, fired off a horse pistol, and then proceeded to unpack its wonderful stock of cipher telegrams—those marvelous messages which are claimed to have passed between Mr. Tilden's headquarters in 1876 and his agents on the skirmish lines, who were trying to prevent the thieves of the Radical party from stealing the Presidency from the man who had been elected. The Tribune afterwards devoted itself to explaining the keys by which it was able to translate its "captured" correspondence.

We will take the bold ground that a good many cipher telegrams were flying about the country in 1876-'77, some of them a little questionable from a moral point of view; but with the simple remark that "they all do it" in a closely contested campaign we will proceed to say that no array of cipher telegrams saddled upon the agents of Mr. Tilden, will ever offset the knives who stole the Presidency for R. The Tribune may print its alleged cipher dispatches until its tall tower falls into ruin, and is sketched by some traveler from New Zealand, but it will never be able to efface the record which shows that Mr. Hayes' agents employed fifty-five rascals to steal the Presidency for him, and that he confirmed their acts by paying every mother's son of them out of the treasury of the United States.

The New York Herald says: In view of all the promises and pledges and professions in regard to civil service reform, we had hoped that the detestable system of employing the Federal office holders to pay the expenses of political campaigns would be abandoned, but the managers of the machinery at Washington ordered otherwise, and this year this outrageous practice is continued in its worst and most objectionable form.
