Tilden Before the Potter Sub-Committee.

There has been a long and persistent effort by the Republicans and Tammany rings of the country to drag Mr. Tilden before the country in some undignified manner, with the hope of falsehood and otherwise to demolish him and his future prospects as a candidate for 1880. It may look like a strange combination, but it is no stranger than true that it does exist in New York. Mr. Tilden brought upon himself the most bitter wrath of the Tammany Ring, by his unceasing and successful efforts to bring the chiefs of that ring to grief and shame. His next great enemy was the Republican party. They have persecuted and persecuted this great man from the day he was made a Presidential candidate to the present time. They never dare say he lacked capacity or ability, but they first alleged that he had bribed the St. Louis Convention, next he made false returns of his income assessment, and next that he had been guilty of attempting to corrupt the returning boards in some of the Southern States. Permit us to say just here, God save the mark, to think of corrupting the returning boards in some of these States is one of the wonders of the age. All efforts thus far having failed, his enemies came forward with a storm of old manipulated cipher dispatches, which had been in the hands of Republicans and his Tammany enemies for more than a year, and it was in evidence before that committee that two or three callings had taken place from time to time. And finally Mr. Tilden seeing there was an extreme effort being made to blacken his good name, broke silence on the 18th of October last, by simply giving the lie to these charges all in a pile; but the Republicans and Tammanyites succeeded in carrying New York by disfranchising 8,000 or 9,000 adopted citizens. This cipher dispatch assault emanated from the Tribune office, and it might be proper to state that the New York Tribune is owned by Mr. Gould, the old partner of old Tweed himself, and here lies the secret of that extraordinary effort by that paper to stab that able counsel, who dragged Tweed and his comrades from their dark places of crime and disgrace, and held them up before the public in all their deformities. And now comes the testimony of this distinguished witness and he comes to the front with that degree of pluck and grit that would be calculated to win the admiration and respect of all good men. And it would appear from the evidence that the committee was very courteous, and in fact, it would seem that they had a witness on the stand that over-awed them. Mr. Tilden started off in a clear dignified manner and did just as he had done before, by giving the whole thing a sweeping denial so far as he had been concerned. He said he had been informed by Mr. Cooper, that he (Cooper) had a proposition to obtain electoral votes for money. This Cooper is no less than Edward Cooper, the Mayor of the city of New York, and a son of Peter Cooper, when Mr. Tilden told Mr. Cooper that he would authorize no transaction, nor spend money for any such purpose. In regard to the Oregon dispatches Mr. Tilden says he did not know they came in cipher until after a meeting of the committee to investigate them. We believe that one or more of the Oregon dispatches, as translated, purports to have been addressed to S. J. Tilden, and Mr. Tilden says he did not know anything of them till the committee met to investigate. And Senator Grover stated, we think, under oath, that he did not send the "Gobbler" or "Gabble" dispatch, which was at tempted to be palmed off as his dispatch, and to our mind it is a clear case of forgery and the thing will at some day all leak out. The telegraphic offices at that time were almost universally in the keeping of the Republicans, and there is no doubt but in many instances they betrayed their trusts of secrecy, and there is but little doubt, but that this was the case in Oregon. It would be a very easy matter, where all was agreed, to send any kind of a dispatch and sign any kind of a fictitious name to it. Mr. Tilden says most emphatically that "from the 7th of November, 1876, until December 6th of

the same year, under no circumstances did I enter into any competition for seeking certificates by venal inducements. There never was an hour nor moment that I entertained such a thought," and he farther says, "Whatever evils may result from this subversion of the electoral system and of free government, I resolved that I would enter into no auction for the purchase of the chief magistracy. I was resolved that I would continue to protest against the wrong by which the people were defrauded," and Mr. Tilden's testimony shows that Pelton ceased to be the clerk of Mr. Tilden after he found that Pelton had acted imprudently, and still further on in his testimony the distinguished witness said, "I declare before God and my country that the votes of Louisiana and Florida were bought, (meaning by Republican.) I would scorn and condemn my righteous title, if the Democracy had secured my seat by fraud." Then all things should be set at rest so far as Mr. Tilden is concerned, unless his enemies are so persistent and bitter against him that they will attempt to convince the American that he has committed perjury, and it would seem that this would be the next effort. The Oregonian of the 10th starts off in a rather weak and shy manner to accuse Mr. Tilden of falsehood in his evidence before the committee, by saying that "Edward Cooper testified that he got a dispatch from Pelton at Baltimore asking for \$60,000 or \$80,000 for the purpose of purchasing of the South Carolina vote and Cooper told Tilden of it," but Tilden testifies that his answer to Cooper was that he would authorize no such transaction nor spend money for any such purpose. The Oregonian then tries to make it appear that this admission of information from Cooper is a contradiction of his general denial of his knowledge of cipher or translated dispatches. Nobody supposes Cooper telegraphed this to Mr. Tilden. He says Cooper called on him and gave him such information and he sent for Pelton to come home, and afterwards Pelton was discharged from his services as clerk in the bank. In fact it is unnecessary to pursue this question any farther more than to make a few straight out and out statements that there was doubtless some most scandalous things done in connection with the last Presidential election, but we do not believe that Mr. Tilden had anything to do with them, but it would be simply wonderful if his friends did not do things that they should not have done, when they had such men to contend with as old Wells, Anderson, and the half civilized negroes of the South, and as to the purchase of those returning boards it is useless to spend a moment's time about it, for we all know they were for sale and we also know as well as we know anything that took place out of our sight that they were knocked off to the highest bidder for cash or office. This stands out so prominently in every feature of that contest that it would be foolish to attempt to conceal or palliate it, if we were disposed to, every sneak thief down South who has anything to do with the dirty muddle, has held, or is holding a Federal office under a President who purchased the office of them. But some of them did not get such an office as they would like, and true to their instincts of treachery, they divulged and demanded that they be sworn to their own crimes, and did testify that they made false returns. It should be the work of good men to all condemn such conduct.
