COUNCIL ROOMS. EUGENE CITY, Feb. 10, 1879.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. Present.—President Dorris; Councilmen Underwood, Dunn, Sloan and Hendricks, Marshal Farrell and Recorder Alexander.

The Finance Committee reported favorably upon the following bills, and the Recorder was instructed to draw warrants for their payment, to-wit:

Geo. Fisher, \$5; B. F. Dorris, \$6 50; Robinson & Church \$23 50; P. H. Farrell \$16 50.

The Committee on street reported adversely on the proposition of J. B. Rinehart to put up the names of the streets at the corners of intersection. On motion the report was approved.

The prayer of the petition of J. B. Rinehart and others for a sidewalk on the west side of Pearl, from Ninth to Eleventh streets was granted.

On motion the proposition of Shelton & Wilkins to furnish the City with oil and furnish a suitable building for storing the same was accepted for one year.

On motion F. M. Wilkins and others were authorized, at their own expense, to lower the bottom of the culvert on Willamette street not to exceed one foot.

On motion, the Committee on streets was instructed to have a box culvert constructed in the alley on the south side of Fifth, between Oak and Pearl street to the brow of the hill.
