Inexpensive Custom-Houses.

Representative Luttrell has caused the publication in the *Congressional Record* of a statement from the Treasury Department which shows the number of ports at which the collection of customs costs more than the total receipts. The statement is for the years 1873, 1875, and 1878. The first named year there were forty five of these non-paying ports of collection, of which eighteen were in New England, five in New Jersey, one in New York, and a total of seventeen in the South. The remainder were inland. In twelve the receipts were nothing, while the expense of maintaining the customs force at each ranged from \$200 to \$7,000. In 1875, the number of ports was twenty-four—nine in New England, one in New York, two in New Jersey, one in Indiana, one in Iowa, nine in the South, and one in Alaska. There were thirty last year, of States nine, and the South nine. In Erie, Pennsylvania, the total receipts for the year were \$7, and it cost \$2,221 to collect that insignificant sum. The year's receipts at Dubuque, Iowa, were \$1 95, and the cost of collection, \$265. To collect \$27 36 at Teche, Louisiana, where two of John Sherman's Returning Board gang are stationed it cost \$7,186. The average of receipts and expenses shows that it costs, in all these places, ten dollars to collect one dollar. The Treasury has to provide berths for its swarm of Radical plunderers and leeches, whose chief employment is to manipulate elections, and to these harpies more than a quarter of million is annually paid. In this and similar ways the people's money is lavished on Treasury favorites, rogues and corruptionists, and the other Departments have their hirelings of like character to fatten upon the substance of the country. Mr. Luttrell has done well in exposing the waste in Sherman's office.

Holding the Mirror up to Nature.

Before the Potter Sub Committee, last Saturday, Mr. Tilden said: "When a certain party sets up a high standard of morality, he proposed to analyze that standard and see if they lived up to it themselves. Colonel Pelton thought it excusable to fight fire with fire, and adopt the tactics of the enemy. Pelton's act was an inchoate offence. The acts on the other side were consummated, and gave the Presidency to a man who was not elected."

There stands the condensed truth. No Radical can deny it. The leaders of that party gained the Presidency for Hayes by bribery, force and fraud. At the very worst they can make of Pelton's conduct, he committed no bribery. What he proposed doing was to pay the Radical scoundrels the price they demanded for returning an honest count of the legal votes. But the Radical leaders—the foremost of the party, too—actually bribed the Returning Boards to return a false and fraudulent count. They consummated the crime. And Hayes has made himself a party to the crime by rewarding the perpetrators of and accessories to it with the most lucrative offices in his power to bestow. Hayes received the stolen goods, knowing that they were stolen, and started in business with them to pay the thieves their stipulated share.

The Worst Possible Meaning.

The fact being established that the Republican ciphers were equally as voluminous as those that have been credited to the Democrats; that they were sufficient importance to justify the theft, such as Bullock admits he committed, the Washington Post, suggests that we are at liberty in law and good morals to attribute the worst possible meaning to them. There is not a particle of doubt that they would show that five hundred thousand dollars were raised in New York to purchase the State of Florida alone. Taken altogether, we do not at all regret the energy of the Tribune in bringing to light the evidences of Democratic wrong-doing. Even if all that it alleges be true, it has killed but one man, while the Democratic gun is loaded with grape and bids fair to mow down "leading Republicans" by platoons. Call Tyner, Brady and the two Chandlers, but more especially Zachariah.

How the Errors Creep in.

A lady, who recently published some verses on "Autumn" in these columns, writes to ask, "who is responsible for the typographical errors in your paper? Lean down here, while we whisper in your ear: "sh; nobody is. The editor writes so plainly that even a blind man can spell out his words, the compositors are college men who have edited papers of their own, and they set up the matter exactly as it is written and correct what mistakes the editor makes; the proof reader is a professor of rhetoric and philology in an Iowa college, and never made a mistake in his life, and he corrects what few mistakes the compositors may make; the foreman is a Göttingen graduate, who has nothing to do but see that the matter is perfect when the forms go down. There isn't a mistake in our paper when the type reaches the press. But we'll tell you, as a professional secret, how the mistakes creep in. The pressman told the manager, and the manager told us; it's the ink—it's the ink. We pay out thousands and thousands of dollars a year for good ink, and we can't get an article that won't fairly meale the paper with typographical errors.—*Hancock.*

Tilden and Hayes.

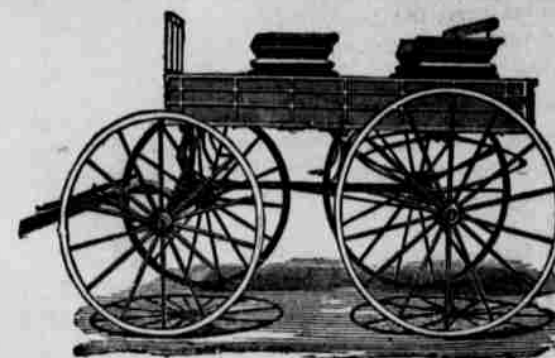
