**Senator Grover's Speech on the Chinese Bill.**

We take the following account of Senator Grover's speech before the Senate on the Chinese bill, from the Chronicle of February 14th: Senator Grover of Oregon reviewed at length the treaties with China and argued that in no one of the articles of the Burlingame treaty of 1868 was there to be found any privilege of substantial value to any American citizen which could not be enjoyed under former treaties, while to the Chinese it gave every privilege of the country except citizenship. He spoke of the resources of our country and said if we preserved our heritage and developed the plans which our fathers marked out for us there could be no failure in the United States attaining the highest and best civilization. Grover spoke of the habits of the Chinese and their entire difference from our people. China had no army, no navy. Her people never built ships, never sailed them. When a Chinaman came away from his country he brought everything with him, including his unclean habits. He next referred to a recent description in a New York paper of a Chinese laundry in that city, and said it meant that, before long, 50,000 washerwomen would be out of employment, and thousands of children would be crying for bread in the metropolis of the nation. The Chinese paid no taxes, and in no manner helped to bear the burdens of Government. If it should be understood that the Chinese could come here and stay in peace, it would not be half a century before they would outnumber the white people on this continent. He would have much preferred to have had a modification of the treaty than that Congress should take action upon the matter; but the people demanded action, and he believed the constitutional power of Congress to be ample to enforce the bill. It was not all it should be, but it was a step in the right direction. Let the step be taken, and Europe would rejoice with us that America was to remain Anglo-Saxon and not Mongolian.

**No Explanation Yet.**

More than a week ago the Virginia City Chronicle, Democratic, stated that there came to it a private dispatch, in connection with the regular dispatches, of the day from the New York office asking that the editor should especially note certain mentioned discrepancies between the testimony of Mr. Tilden before the Potter Sub-Committee and his prior statements as to the cipher dispatches. A plain demonstration that the Associated Press is a Radical concern is not required. And it is against an insidious and unscrupulous engine of this kind that the Democratic party has to contend, in campaigning times especially. But the point now is, the disposition and use of the telegraph to misrepresent Mr. Tilden and the Democratic party. It is clear that the Press dispatches are twisted and perverted to this end. It is equally clear that the Radical organs which receive the dispatches are very well aware of the abuse of the telegraph by the Press Association. They know the dishonesty of the reports. But, so far, not one word in admission of the gross outrage has been given in a Radical organ. The inference is not to be mistaken. They are not only pleased with, but they abet and approve it.

**Feathered His Nest.**

Mr. Seward is the American Minister to Washington for practices which will not bear the light. China. He is now under investigation at Washington. One of the witnesses, the Consul at Shanghai, makes this statement as to Seward's possessions: "He owns about fifty houses in Shanghai, at least of which are Chinese brothels, which bring the highest kind of rent. He owns the buildings of the American Consulate. He has also purchased the large and handsome residence of the Austrian and Hungarian Legation, and rents it to that Empire. He has bought a plantation in Louisiana and a farm in Orange county, New York. The salary of the office is only \$5,000 a year."

**Strange Inconsistency.**

Conspicuous among the Senators and Representatives in Congress who favor the maintenance of the Burlingame Treaty and the utmost limit to the immigration of coolies for cheap labor are those who refuse to allow citizens of the United State the privilege of purchasing steamships and sailing vessels in whatever country they can buy them the cheapest, and enter them under American registers, so as to compete with British ship-owners in the ocean carrying trade. While they are determined that American citizens shall be crowded from ocean traffic by foreigners; at the same time they insist upon opening American ports to the Mongolian swarms that drive white workingmen from employment. They restrain our shipping merchants from competition with British rivals, and thus impair and cripple American commerce, on the one hand; and then, on the other, allow residents who have labor to award to import from China the hordes of heathen coolies who flock hither to take it from our own people because they can subsist on wages on which white laborers would starve. In other words, they use the power they are invested with as a double edged sword against their own countrymen and the commercial and industrial interests of the whole land—cutting off the ocean trade with one sweep, and slashing down labor wages as they swing the blade the other way. But sooner or later they will fall by their own weapon. With the hundred millions or more which ought to be reaped by American ship-owners, together with the millions of dollars which enriched coolies carry from the Pacific Coast to their native land, as the fruit of their labor here, annually, the drain will not only exhaust the wealth of our people to the evils entailed by the presence of an unassimilating, degraded, detestable and heathenish race, seriously affect the moral and political and social condition of the Republic.

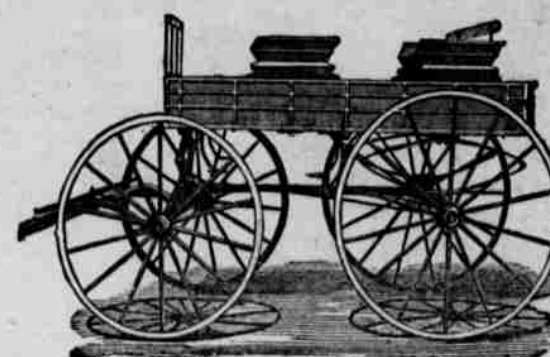
