Republican Hypocrisy.

Journals of the Republican faith continue to bewail the absence of the negro from the House of Representatives. From the lachrymose manner in which they treat the subject one would infer that the departure of the colored man from that arena is to be regarded as a National calamity of huge proportions, making a sad era in the history of the Republic. We cannot share largely in this grief, because we do not think the perpetuity of the Republic depends on having the negro participate in National legislation. The fact that a man is black, and that many of his neighbors are of the same color does not necessarily make him a statesman, or indicate that the best interests of the country will be promoted by sending him to Congress.

We do not suppose there is a District in the United States in which cannot be found better white than black material for Congressmen. We are very confident that there is no District in which the best man to send to Congress is a colored Democrat. The ablest representatives of the colored race on this continent are to be found in the older Northern States, where they and their ancestors for generations have enjoyed freedom and free schools. In Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New York and Ohio, there are hundreds of well-educated black men who have always been hard working Republicans since they cast their first vote. But did the Republican party ever think of sending any of them to Congress? Did it ever elect any of them to the Legislature? Did it ever give them any official position of honor or profit? If it did, the annals of the times show no record of election.

The plain truth is that the Republican party never gave an office to the negro when it could do anything else. The few negroes who have been sent to Congress from the South took the office in spite of their carpet-bag friends, and not by their help. These colored men had shrewdness enough to demand a secure part of the spoils, and in order to prevent a fatal split in the Radical party, the carpet-ladders had to submit to a division of "plunder." But at the North, where there are educated men of color, graduates from institutions of learning, and in the strongest Republican strongholds, the negro has been uniformly treated with contempt when he has hinted that he ought to be permitted to serve the public in any official capacity.

Negroes Emigrating to Kansas.

It appears that a good many colored people are emigrating from the South to Kansas. They do not go to New England, luckily for themselves, where the long range admirers of the race do not wish them. If they can withstand the rigors of a Kansas winter, of deep snow and intense cold, the emigration may largely increase in coming years, as there are vast tracts of land in that State to locate upon, for farming purposes, and it is good soil for corn—a crop the negroes generally know how to cultivate. It will be interesting to watch the effect of this emigration in two or three years, for it will show what tend to solve the problem of the colored people to manage for themselves in agricultural pursuits, away from cities, and not as hands in the employ of white men.

It Will Have Peace.

The country wanted peace in 1860; it wants peace in 1879 and will have it in 1880, the Philadelphia Times alleges, even if it has to be gained by the restoration of a distracted party to power. When there was actual war to be fought the people fought it manfully; when there is no war to be fought, the people tire of demagogues and organs insisting upon fighting battles over and over again which they mostly forgot to fight when it required courage and patriotism to do so. Honest, lawful, free elections are wanted by the great mass of the people, and just restraints upon fraud and the fullest protection to all citizens are the sincere desire of all good citizens; but bayonet elections, or any form of mixture of the sword and the ballot, are desired only by Electoral thieves and the reckless agitators. Business wants peace, and it will have it.

Another Gigantic Job.

The scheme, which has hitherto failed, to have Congress pass a bill to erect a Territorial Government in the Indian Territory, in the interest of the owners of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad, is revived by an attempt at this time, to bring it before the extra session. It seems that a number of Boston capitalists have got possession of the road, and are the parties to the movement. It is remarkable that the disposition to drive the Indians from the Territory, which has been specially set apart for them, comes from that portion of the Union which is always so ready to denounce honest and worthy frontier settlers of the far West or this Coast, whenever there is any trouble with the Indians. No settler ever wants to have a difficulty with Indians if he can avoid it. It is generally the rascality and desire for fresh plunder on the part of Indians Agents and Agency contractors, which provokes and causes the Indians to raid upon the settlers, and brings on wars between them. Yet the humanitarians at the East take no account of this, but invariably condemn the settlers, and aggravate the matter, their representatives in Congress always vote to sustain the outrageous Quaker policy of Great Britain, by which the Indian troubles and wars are continually breaking out. Now, however, from the same quarter, comes the removal of the scheme to forcibly wrest from thousands of Indians, in the only Territory appropriated to them, the lands they occupy, and to drive them from it into the wild and predatory life of the Plains, merely that the few who are behind the scheme shall possess lands by virtue of a railroad grant made years ago. This is a specimen of Boston philanthropy and justice.

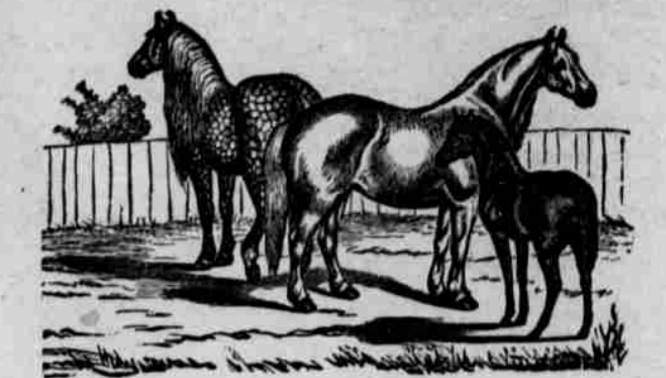
