The railroad is already beginning to affect McMinnville. A saloon is to be started in the vicinity of the depot grounds.

McMinnville is brightening up. Sidewalks are being repaired, fences built, houses repainted and generally overhauled.

The hotel keepers at Amity are annoyed by loafers and tramps, who slip in, get a meal or two, and then slip off without paying.

There are not enough dwelling houses in McMinnville to supply the demand, and many families desiring to settle there have been compelled to go to other towns.

The name selected for the new depot near Perrydale, on the west side railroad, is McCoyville. It is named in honor of Mr. McCoy, who was generous enough to give most of the land on which the town is to be built. Surveyors will lay out the streets some time during the coming week.

To Head Off Opium Smuggling.

The Treasury Department is devising means to counteract the effect of opium smuggling upon the revenue. It is pretty well understood that the product of the two opium factories in Victoria, Vancouver Island, is mainly smuggled into the United States, by way of Washington Territory or ocean transportation to this city, and it is difficult to prevent this illicit traffic. As a means to the country, therefore, it is proposed to require that it shall be stamped, the same as cigars, and between three hundred thousand and four hundred thousand dollars can thus be raised yearly from the drug. It is used mainly for smoking by the Chinese, who are also the most expert in using it. Probably the admirers of the Mongolian heatens at the East-Böcher, Talmage, Newman and that ilk will object to the Treasury Department interfering in the matter, on the ground that this Government or the American people have no rights which the Chinese are required to respect, under the Burlingame Treaty.—S. F. Examiner.
