**The Veto.**

President Hayes has submitted himself for once to the will of the "stalwarts" and vetoed the army appropriation. In his veto he insists that under the law now on the statute books that the army cannot be used for election purposes yet vetoes a bill that only provides that troops may not be sent to polling places to intimidate and influence elections. He objects to the political clause forbidding the use of the army as a "rider," but seemingly forgets that these same laws were passed as "riders" by the Republican Congress during the administration of Johnson, and that he was forced to sign the bill under protest by this same class who now exercise their powers on a president, who has lost their confidence, and on whom they have passed the most bitter censures. The gush in the message in regard to his desire for honest elections is not worth the paper on which he wrote it. The thoughts of the means by which he attained his position should have closed his mouth in regard to honest elections; the taint that is upon his title should ever remind him, that empty assertions of respect for honesty of elections will only meet with the bitter scorn which they deserve. The tendency to centralization which under the Republican party has been fostered, and protected, should be fought and detested by all, who wish to see our government remain on the basis on which its founders built.

**Soldiers in Congress.**

On the subject of "soldiers in congress," the Philadelphia Chronicle-Herald of a recent date says: "We regret to see that the republican organs are drawing invidious comparisons between the ex-confederates and ex-union soldiers in the senate. They write because there are nineteen who wore the gray and only four who wore the blue—Logan, Plumb, Burnside and Kellogg. Logan was a good, if not a great soldier. Burnside never inflicted any overwhelming damage on the enemy. Kellogg was Kellogg in the army as he was out of it. Plumb was a head devil in the army and a traitor. There is now in the senate a document room committee report that shows what kind of a Plumb he was. Besides that, is it fair to blame the south because the north doesn't think enough of its soldiers to send them to the senate? Pennsylvania has just had opportunity to send a soldier to the senate, and her republican legislature sent Don Cameron, a man who is neither a soldier nor a representative civilian. What may be said of the south, it cannot be denied that she sends to congress her representatives. It is also true that the representative men of the south were in the confederate army. Not many of them skulked at home behind family contracts."

**For Grant.**

The lost of officer-holders who expect to be turned out, and the army of contractors who in losing Grant, lost their occupation, will rally to a man to welcome with fulsome adulation him who made the civil service of the United States a trench in the nostrils of all decent men. Grant was an able and successful soldier. His military services were important, but they have been paid for with equal political and far higher pecuniary reward than for the services of George Washington. If Grant cares for preserving a shred of political decency he had better begin to pray to be delivered from the further pollution of the mob of political bunners who threaten by their presence on the Pacific Coast to make Chinese immigration and the sand lot orators respectable by contrast.

SENATOR VOORHEES has started an investigation in which the people of country, if not the politicians, are interested. It is to discover what means are observed to prevent fraud on revenue in connection with goods in bonded warehouses. The resolution should be made to apply to an investigation of frauds in connection with all manner of revenues. The people of this country pay revenues enough to maintain their government in the most princely state, but the leaks between the taxpayer's hands and the U. S. treasury are enormous.

**The Great Electoral Fraud.**

In a lecture before the Iron City Tilden Club of Pittsburgh, Pa., Mr. J. H. Hopkins strongly endorsed Mr. Tilden as the Democratic Presidential candidate, which elicited tremendous applause. The following despatch was read:

NEW YORK, April, 1879.

To the Lecture Committee of the Iron City Tilden Club, Pittsburgh, Pa.:

Please communicate to your club my thanks for their invitation to attend the lecture of Mr. Hopkins, though my engagements render it impossible to be present. In 1876 the Democracy achieved a victory in the name and for the sake of a reform Administration which would restore the Government, in spirit and substance as well as form, to the benign character in which it was created by our patriotic ancestors. They were defrauded of the fruits of their victory by a false count of the electoral votes. That wrong casts upon this generation the responsibility of a far greater question. The great duty is to vindicate the rights of the people to elective self-government. If the subversion of the elective system proves successful and prosperous, those who are in power may count themselves in at every election, and prolong their dominion indefinitely. Such a question ought to be divested of every personal aspect. The wrongs to individuals become insignificant in comparison with the crime against the people, against free government, and all the best hopes of mankind.

The Pittsburgh Telegraph says: The blacks are feeling impulses not of freedmen, but of free men. They are consequently aspiring to a greater independence than can be had in old communities, their competition on keeping wages, and were prejudices against the position in life which as really free men they desire.

In a recent letter General Sherman speaks of himself as occupying the post of Commander-in-Chief. Section 2 of Article II of the Constitution provides that the President shall be Commander-in-Chief of the Army, but Sherman probably alludes, the Chicago Times suggests, not to the theory but to the fact. The Shermans are Commanders-in-Chief of the President.

LaGrange merchants pay 20 cents per doz. for eggs.

The body of Wm Cook was found floating near Gardiner and decently buried.

A road is to be put through this season from the Nehalem valley to Astoria.

A vessel sailing a few days ago from Coos bay for San Francisco carried among her freight apples, eggs, hides, tallow, potatoes and coal. These with lumber, are fair samples of the articles produced in that section.

Richard House, Edward Ryan and R. A. Dunlap, passengers by the Great Republic, join in a letter to the Oregonian, saying that they cannot agree with its representation as to the hospitality of the people of Astoria. They assert that except the throwing open of the doors of the Episcopal church there was act of no humanity shown, and that in some cases exorbitant prices were charged for food. One restaurant is named where it is asserted that the keeper actually refused five times for a half dollar, stating as a reason that he never took his pay in such small change. We give this statement publicly, since it is requested, through we cannot but think there is some mistake about the charge that the people of Astoria showed indifference in any instances whatever.

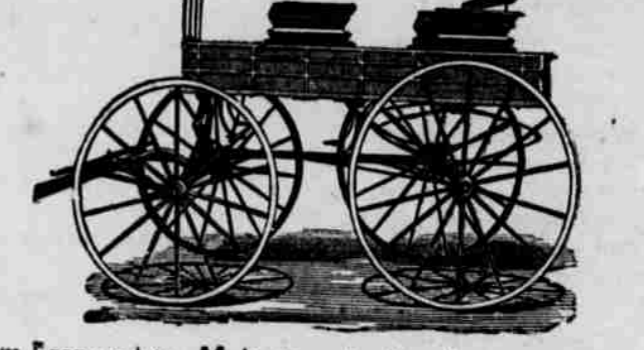
