The Tilden Income-Tax Suit.

The Albany Argus holds up to public censure the base conduct of the Government officials who are endeavoring to cast odium on the action of Mr. Tilden in connection with the income-tax prosecution, and remarks that he is one of about 10,000 citizens of New York City who let the revenue assessor compute his tax from his books and who draw a check for the amount. About 1,000,000 people in the United States paid their tax in the same way. Mr. Tilden's was the only one selected for a test case, and his was singled out because he was elected President of the United States, a fraudulent Administration wishing to destroy his character, after he had been cheated out of the office. Mr. Tilden has, for months, tried to force the Federal attorneys to a trial of his case, in vain. It is just as certain, when that trial shall come, that Mr. Tilden will be vindicated, as it is that next Christmas will come on the 25th of December. The Federal attorneys who disgraced themselves by bringing this trial have been busying themselves by running away from it. The people of the United States pretty well understand the meanness of the suit against Mr. Tilden, and know it is a part of the policy of the fraudulent Administration to war on his character as long as his body is above ground, and on his memory afterward, in order to qualify the effect of the crime against elective self government certified to the observation of the world by the existence of the Republican party.

A Comparison of Wealth.

It has been a popular belief that the United Kingdom of Great Britain was the wealthiest Power on earth, but comparative estimates have lately been made by English and French papers, which go to prove that the latter nation takes the lead of the former in this respect. Quoting from these we find the estimate of the value of private property, real and personal in France \$43,110,600,000, and of public property, including highways, the navy, palaces and the public buildings, \$3,000,000,000; making a total of \$46,110,600,000. The estimate of the same values for England, Scotland and Ireland is \$42,500,000,000. In the English estimate the highways are not included, while in France they are valued at \$1,525,000,000. The comparison shows values to the amount of about \$2,000,000,000 more in France than in the United Kingdom. The real property in France greatly exceeds that in England, while in the latter the personal property largely prevails over that in France. The increase of wealth in France during the last ten years has been \$7,500,000,000, or at the rate of \$750,000,000 a year. At this rate of increase the German indemnity of \$1,000,000,000, enormous as it was regarded, was overcome by the savings of sixteenth months.

The Silver Question in Europe.

Ex. Governor Fenton, of New York, was one of the Monetary Commission sent to Europe by the Government; to arrange with Powers there an International plan concerning the remonetization of silver. He returned last Saturday, and has given a forecast of his report to a delegation which welcomed him on his arrival. He says England, France, Belgium, Holland, Italy and other countries which have demonetized silver, are discussing whether that was not a mistake. Germany, also, is manifesting a disposition to remonetize silver. It would be, if remonetized in Europe, Governor Fenton thinks, held as a medium of exchange in secondary place, next to gold. He is of the opinion that the United States cannot stand alone in its silver policy but believes that some of the European countries will join in the remonetization of that metal; and recommends another Commission for next Fall or Winter.

Our Public Schools.

OBSERVATIONS OF THE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

The school in district No 6 under Mr. Mr W C Taylor has an attendance of 40 pupils of an enrollment of 57; this is the largest enrollment and the best attendance in this district for a number of years. I visited this district several times in 1875 and 1876 and find it in a good deal better condition now than then.

In district No 7 Mr. J. L. Linsley is teaching a very good school with an average attendance of 22; but I find the young ladies of this district have rejected all mathematical studies from their curriculum. This should not be the case; as all should possess at least the rudiments of a business education. Miss Elsie Hale a student of the State University is conducting the school in district No 52. I found every thing in neat condition. The black board needs a coat of paint badly. In its present condition it is almost entirely useless. Miss Hale has 17 in attendance of an enrollment of 19; Miss Hale has had but little trouble.

The school in District No 12 has an average of 25 and an enrollment of 28, and is taught by Miss Nellie Stevens of the State University. This is the first term that grammar has been taught in this district for several years.

Mr. G. H. Hale, a state university student, is teaching a school in the vicinity of Irving he had some trouble soon after the commencement of the school but he promptly settled it and was nobly sustained by the directors. If more of the school officers would lend their influence in the same direction we would have less insubordination in our schools. This district and also several other have built good substantial houses within the past year.

District No 25 a small district east of Springfield reporting 24 pupils has an average attendance of 18 in their school and doing good work, under the supervision of Mr. H. T. Bristow. The citizens have planted the school ground in maple trees which will shortly make a fine shady place.

The clerk of district No. 19 reports 83 person of school age, and the record of the teacher, an enrollment of over 50 with an average attendance of only 15 to 17. One teacher has been discharged for being too slack in government, and fault is found with the present incumbent for being too strict. In consequence of the irregularity in attendance, the schools in this district have not been what they should have been, the best average shown by the register for any term during the past three years is about fifty-five or sixty per cent., of the enrollment; another difficulty experienced by teachers is to get the pupils to pursue the requisite number of studies or enough to keep them out of mischief and until these difficulties are overcome no school will amount to much. What is needed is the hearty co-operation with the teacher, of both district officers and parents, then we will see a change for the better.

Mr. James Gearhart in district No. 22 has an average of 21 to 23 pupils with good order and good honest work, and the pupils are making fine progress. This district has had no school the past two years on account of sickness amongst the children which almost broke them up. Miss Cora Owsley is giving very good satisfaction as teacher in district No. 78. Her school is small, only 15 in attendance. The Speer creek divides this district and the rains during the Spring have made it somewhat troublesome to the pupils who live on the south side of said stream.

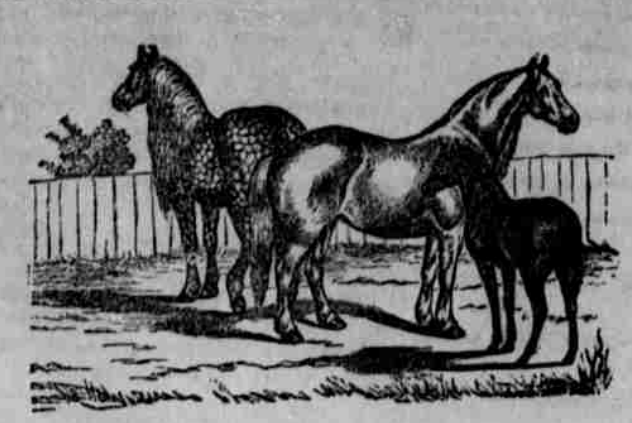

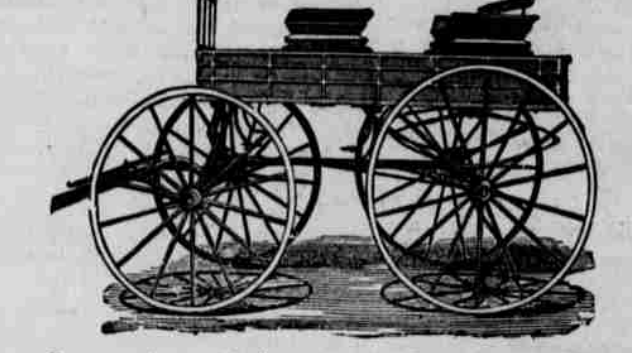
