#### Our Public Schools.

OBSERVATIONS OF THE COUNTY SUPERINTEND-ENT OF SCHOOLS.

The school in district No 6 under Mr Mr W C Taylor has an attendance of 40 pupils of an enrollment of 57; this is the largest enrollment and the best attendance in this district for a number of years. I visited this district several times in 1875 and 1876 and find it in a good deal better condition now than then.


