The "Sentiment" in Favor of Mr. Tilden.

If Mr. Tilden should be nominated by the Democracy next year, it will be a most significant instance, the New York Sun declares, of the popular will asserting and enforcing itself against the most powerful, the most cunning, and the most resolute opposition. It Mr. Tilden is nominated it will be because the people want him, and will have no other man.

It is not unnatural that this should be so. The truth that he was elected in 1876, and that through fraud and audacity on the part of the Republicans, and cowardice and treachery on the part of certain Democrats, another man who had not been elected was put in his place, has impressed itself deeper and deeper upon the popular mind with every day that has since elapsed. That truth men naturally desire to vindicate. They feel that they owe this to the cause of republicanism institutions, the cause of self-government, the cause of right, of justice, of liberty. The Presidential Fraud first triumphant in American history must be condemned and branded, and this cannot be done in any other way so effectively—so people reason—as by electing Mr. Tilden in 1880 and putting him at the head of the Government. Now, this is a sentiment a feeling, an idea, capable of developing an enormous degree of zeal and enthusiasm in those who entertain it; and if Mr. Tilden should now again be selected as the Democratic standard-bearer, it will be the work of this sentiment. It will also, though in a far less degree, be the work of a still existing popular belief that he is a man of extraordinary ability, and that, if inaugurated as President, he will reform the Government.

This is a most interesting situation, and the question whether the evident resolve of the politicians to crowd Mr. Tilden out is to be met and overwhelmed by such a manifestation of public feeling as above described, forms a problem of a peculiar nature respecting which new light will be gained as the campaign advances.

Defeated by Radical Filibustering.

The Bill introduced in the House of Representatives to prohibit the collection of money from the officeholders for campaign purposes was defeated by Radical filibustering. No action could be had on the measure. What the party has been doing for many years it is still doing—the President's civil service order to the contrary notwithstanding. The Washington correspondent of the Journal of Commerce writes as follows: "Agents of the Republican Campaign Committee are exacting unusually large contributions from Government clerks. Last Friday, pay day, these fellows were on hand, and as officials and clerks were paid off they were asked to turn over a liberal amount for the Ohio and Maine elections. In the Third Auditor's office of the Treasury Department alone \$700 were thus raised. All the clerks of the Second Controller's office except one responded, and that one's name and political record was asked for and noted. This sort of thing is going on throughout the Departments. The 'bleeding' process is being applied with extraordinary vigor and success.

Jefferson's Patriotism.

The Legislature of New Jersey, toward the close of President Jefferson's Administration, asked him to accept a third term. The following is Mr. Jefferson's patriotic reply: "If some termination of the services of the Chief Magistrate be not fixed by the Constitution or supplied by practice, his office, nominally for years, will, in fact, become for life, and history shows how easily that degenerates into an inheritance. Believing that a representative Government, responsible at short periods of election, is that which produces the greatest sum of happiness to mankind, I feel it a duty to do no act which shall essentially impair that principle, and I should unwillingly be the person who, disregarding the sound precedent set by an illustrious predecessor, should furnish the first example of prolongation beyond the second term of office."

Old Zack Chandler Still Lives.

ORDINANCE NO. 18.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the city of Eugene:

SECTION 6, TITLE I, CHAP. 3, OF THE published laws of Eugene City be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

In case any person shall fail to pay any city tax when the same is due the Marshal shall levy the same by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of such person and if such person have no personal property within the city the Marshal may upon and sell any real property of such person situated within the city, and such levy and sale shall be made in conformity with the provisions of the State law for the collection of State and county taxes.
