Oregon's Exhibit at the Mechanics' Institute San Francisco.

The Oregon exhibit, says the San Francisco Chronicle, which consists of a collection of cereals, native woods, wild grasses, vegetables and a number of mineral products which have been carefully selected and arranged under the supervision of P. Schulze, Land Commissioner of the Oregon and California Railroad. The display of woods was contributed by the Oregon Furniture Manufacturing Company, and comprised alder, laurel, oak, maple, spruce, myrtle, cedar, ash and fir, the latter is which is commonly but erroneously known as Oregon pine. The exhibit contains about seventy varieties of wild grasses, the average height of which is about six feet. One specimen has attained the enormous growth of eight feet and a half. All of these grasses abound in the Willamette and Umpqua valleys and are highly nutritious for the purposes of forage. Several fine specimens of flax in the collection are of excellent quality, the fibre being strong and fine and of a peculiar silky gloss. The collection also embraces contributions from a large number of salmon canneries on the Columbia river, and some fine samples of wool collected from the sheep-raising districts of the State, the climate of the Willamette valley being peculiarly adapted to this line of industry. Some samples of pig-iron from the Oswego Iron works, in Clackamas county, have been declared by experts to be superior to the imported article. The display of wheat, which is the staple product of Oregon, is one which the State may feel proud. There are a large number of varieties, embracing both Winter and Spring wheat, the most noticeable and attractive display being that of George Belshaw of Lane county. This branch of industry has reached such perfection in the webfoot State that Oregon wheat now commands a better price in Liverpool than the California article. Among other interesting products from this growing State now on exhibition at the Fair may be mentioned several fine samples of fish oils, specimens of sandstone, granite, basalt, and some mammoth blocks of Coos Bay coal. This exhibit has a tendency to give one a better idea of the rapid strides which our sister State is making in agricultural industry and commercial prosperity than a whole volume of books upon the subject.

## Its Hypocrisy.

The worst thing about the Hayes Administration the Philadelphia Times declares, is its hypocrisy: This is exemplified now even more than it was last year by the manner in which the political assessment business is carried on. The President makes a semi-official announcement every day or two of his rigid adherence to his Civil Service Reform principles, but the members of the Cabinet tip the wink to the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, and then go off on an inspection of something or other for recreation, while the important assessors descend upon the poor Department clerks like the plague of locusts. A correspondent says it is noticeable that "there is a kind of sub-rosa air about the proceedings of those who have undertaken to collect the 'voluntary contributions' that suggests consciousness on their part of the questionable legitimacy of the work." The collector simply steps up to a desk and whispers in the confidential ear of the clerk that if the others are subscribing and hints that he had better do the same if he knows what is good for him. There are few who have the moral courage to refuse, considering it is Ohio election that is to be carried and that the fortunes of the Administration candidate for the Presidency are at stake. On the whole, the old "stand and deliver" method of political assessments is better than this sneak-thief process. The Grant people bulldozed the clerks, but they did not do it in a mean way. The mask worn by the Administration had better be thrown off; it does not conceal its repulsive visage.

Arthur Nelson, says the Coos Bay News, the boy whom we took from the "bilk" showman, Morling, about two years ago, left for his home in New Zealand on the 1st steamer, from whence he was kidnapped by Morling when he was quite small.

## Kentucky Election.

The telegraph has failed to give the result up to this time of the election in Kentucky, which took place on the 4th instant. Our exchanges, under date of the 5th, give the following:

The Courier-Journal has unofficial and definite returns from fifty counties which show about one-third fall in off in the aggregate vote, but about the usual Democratic majority. The Republicans have made legislative gains; but the general assembly, that two years ago was 115 Democratic majority on joint ballot, continues Democratic over 100. Blackburn's majority for Governor is variously estimated at from 20,000 to 40,000. The vote recommending a call for a constitutional convention, though supported by both parties, has undoubtedly failed of the required constitutional majority. The election was unusually quiet all over the State, no serious difficulty being reported. The Greenbackers have certainly elected two members of the lower house of the legislature, but their aggregate vote is insignificant. In this county Blackburn gets 6,961, Evans, 4,049. At the last gubernatorial race McCreary, Democrat, received 9,706; Harlan, Rep., 7,460.

Gov. Bishop says that the Ohio election will be close, but he has reason to believe that Ewing will be elected.

A boy named Peterson, living near Lebanon, while riding double with another boy, last week, fell off the horse, and catching in the stirrup, he was dragged a considerable distance, resulting in his death.
