The California Election.

From late returns it appears that the Republicans have elected Perkins and all their State ticket in California.

Kaloch is thought to have been elected Mayor of San Francisco.

A Sensible New England View.

Commenting upon the very valuable array of facts and figures presented by Representative Whitthorne of Tennessee, in respect to the condition of the South, and the growing prosperity of that section of the Union, in which he shows that the production of staples and the area of land cultivated are greater than ever; that population and manufactures have largely increased; and that labor wages are higher than in the North, thereby bettering the condition of the working class, the Boston Journal though Radical, remarks: "These are well-substantiated facts. They do not coincide with the malicious and slanderous Republican asseveration that the South is given over to idleness, proslavery men, and general devilry. Yet Republican politicians, among the people who derive great benefits from the results of Southern enterprise and diligence, are to-day doing all they can to injure the Southern people and place them among the worst of the bad. These figures appeal with special force to our Massachusetts merchants and manufacturers, and afford a most powerful argument against any and all attempts to perpetuate sectional animosity and retarding the old political strife. Before emancipation, those who made any such suggestions were pronounced as proslavery men, dough-faces and the like. That day is past and gone, nor have we any disposition to fight over again the old battles of anti-slavery times. Now such imputations have no foundation. It is not only rightful, but imperative on all who desire thrift and prosperity to return to New England to urge the incitements of an enlightened self-interest upon our section. Massachusetts has more at stake to-day in the prosperity of the South and in the cultivation of fraternal relations than any other State. The drift of business westward of us is tending to insulate New England. Our commerce has fallen off, and we must necessarily rely on our trade and manufactures to maintain our former condition and prestige. We must retain our hold on the Southern markets, and ought to have new ones. It is the height of folly to think these possible unless there is a reformation among our dominant politicians. This is not to be looked for. The great need of our day and condition is to place men in positions of power and influence who understand fully our business relations, and who will make them a speciality for study and improvement. The sooner this is learned the better. But it ought not to be a dormant sentiment."

A Millionaire's Death.

Mr. R. B. Woodard, proprietor of Woodward's gardens, San Francisco, died in California recently. The estate of Mr. Woodard is estimated by those who are conversant with his affairs, at fully \$2,000,000. The gardens on Mission street are valued at \$1,000,000, besides which he owns the What Cheer House, which he was running at the time of his decease, ninety-five per cent. of the stock of the city railroad, better known as the Mission street road, and his home near Napa, surrounded by nearly three thousand acres of valuable land. He leaves a wife and four children, one boy and three daughters.

Senator Blaine estimates.

Senator Blaine estimates, the Buffalo Courier asserts, that there will be 135,000 votes cast in Maine at the coming State election. Of this number he gives 70,000 to the Republican candidate, 50,000 to the Greenbacker, and 15,000 to the Democratic candidate. In reaching these figures he estimates that there were 11,000 Republicans who did not go to the polls last year who will vote this year; that there are 13,000 Republicans who voted the Greenback ticket last year who have returned to the Republican party, and will at the coming election vote the ticket of that party. It will be interesting to compare these figures with the actual result.

The Le Younz Kalloch Affair.

On very rare occasions has the city of San Francisco been the scene of so much popular excitement as that witnessed on Saturday. Nor is it entirely quieted yet. Everybody is acquainted with the cause. Charles De Young, the senior of the two brothers who own the Chronicle, shot the Rev. Dr. Kalloch dangerously, perhaps mortally, at an early hour of the day. The course of the Chronicle towards Dr. Kalloch, in connection with his candidacy for Mayorality, has been distinguished by all the vigor of vituperation for which that paper is noted. In retaliation, Dr. Kalloch, in the course of a speech on Friday evening, at the Metropolitan Temple, characterized Charles De Young by the vilest term a man can be called, and to this added the most infamous stigma which can be applied to woman, in mention of his mother. The Chronicle had gone far beyond the domain of respectable journalism, or of proper assault upon a candidate for public office, in its treatment and denunciation of Dr. Kalloch; but nothing could justify his attack upon the mother of the De Youngs. In a layman, such retaliation would be atrocious; in a clergyman, it is diabolical. Dr. Kalloch had been greatly stirred to anger and enraged almost to desperation by the vicious and venomous attacks of the Chronicle. Much of all that was published in it about him, however, was but the rehash of similar publications of charges long ago made by papers in Boston, Kansas, and all through the United States. Had the Chronicle confined its assaults to Dr. Kalloch, its fault would have been very much less. But it aimed by the outrage of a scandalous mention of his father, who died years ago. Yet it that was said in that paper cannot be justly held as provocation for the monstrous stigma put upon the mother of the assailant by Dr. Kalloch, on Friday evening. To uphold or justify such outrageous vilification, especially by one who stands as a religious instructor and moral teacher, is to sap the foundation of all that is sacred in family, and to strike at the principle of decency in community.
