Important Matters.

We call the attennion of those of our resders who own lands, the title to which was originally obtained from the government by reason of settlements made under the old Donation law of Sept. 27, 1850, to the necessity of seeing that their titles have been perfected by the filing of the proper evidence in the Land Office, and the issue of a certifi-

cate and patent for the lands claimed. In July last the Register and Receiver of the U. S. Land Office at this place, pursuant to instructions from the Commissioner of the General Land Office, published a notice to such claiments that they would be given six months in which to perfect their proofs, and failing to do that, their claims will be held for cancellation.

Upon inquiry at the Land Office, we are informed that about eighty of these claims remain in the office for which certificates have not been issued, and in almost all of which the evidence is imperfect.

These claims are of long standing and should have been perfected years ago, and it is the desire of the Government to have them settled up and closed out as speedily as possible-a special agent of the General Land Office having been sent out here for Wm. We advise all therefore to examine their titles and ascertain if the patent from the United States has been issued, and if not to take the steps necessary to secure' its issu-

More than a thousand patents remain in the Land Office undelivered through the negligence of claimants in not calling to get them; all of which are liable to destruction in case the Land Office should be burned.

This matter is of interest, not only to land-owners in Douglas county, but also to those in the counties of Lane and Linn .-Independent.
